### *A Proclamation*

I, Tommy G. Thompson, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, pursuant to Article IV, Section 11 and Article V, section 4 of the Constitution of Wisconsin, do amend Executive Order #28 (dated 11/17/87), which required the convening of the Legislature at the Capitol in Madison on Wednesday, November 18, 1987 at 9:00 A.M., by adding to its business consideration and action upon the following specific legislative business:

1. To enact legislation relating to obscenity, defining obscene material and obscene performance and providing penalties.
2. To enact legislation relating to resolving conflicts between 1987 Wis. Act 312 and other acts and making those acts consistent.
3. To enact legislation relating to parole and probation for persons convicted of crimes punishable by life imprisonment.
4. To enact legislation relating to spearfishing enforcement aids and making appropriations.
5. To enact legislation relating to a supplemental school levy tax credit and vocational, technical and adult education district incentive grants and making appropriations.

In testimony whereof I have set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Wisconsin to be affixed. Done at the Capitol in the City of Madison this sixteenth day of May in the year one thousand nine hundred and eighty-eight.
