To the Honorable the Legislature:

We have completed a financial and compliance audit of the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater's student financial assistance programs as required by federal regulations and as requested by the University of Wisconsin System. We also included the state grants in our awards testing for compliance with state statutes as requested by the Wisconsin Higher Educational Aids Board. Our audit period was July 1, 1986, through June 30, 1988.

The first and second sections of our report contain the University's student financial assistance programs' financial statements and the related independent auditor's opinion. The third and fourth sections contain the auditor's statement on internal control systems and statement on compliance, as well as our comments on internal control deficiencies and findings of noncompliance. The fifth section contains our comments on the status of the recommendations made

during the prior audit conducted by University of Wisconsin-System Internal Audit.

Except for questioned costs of \$710 and minor compliance errors, we found University of Wisconsin-Whitewater administered the student financial assistance programs as required by federal regulations and state statutes. The University needs to improve its procedures for collecting defaulted Perkins Loans to comply with federal regulations and reduce the number of loans in default.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater staff during our audit. The University's comments on individual audit findings are within the body of our report, and its overall response is the Appendix.
