To the Honorable the Legislature:

Attached in accordance with the provisions of Sections 109.12(2) and (3) of the statutes is the annual report of the Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations on its activities related to the enforcement and administration of s. 109.07 (Plant Closing and Mass Layoff Notification) during the period of September 12, 1989 through February 28, 1990. This report is to be

distributed under s. 13.172(3) to the standing committees with jurisdiction over labor.

In summary the report shows that since September 12, 1989 the department has received 41 notices of actual or potential closings or mass layoffs under either the amended state law, the federal Worker Adjustment and Retraining Act (WARN) or both. Prior to that date the department received 36 notices under either the federal act which went into effect on February 4, 1989, the original state plant closing law or both. The department received 17 notices under the provisions of the original state law between January 1 and March 1, 1989.

The department has received three complaints under the law during the reporting period. Two of these complaints are under investigation and an initial determination has been issued on the third. At this time no determinations have been made by the department under s. 109.07(5) and (6) (Exemptions from notice requirements).

Section 14(1)(b) of 1989 Wisconsin Act 44 requires that the department establish the form for the notice required under s. 109.07(7) no later than February 1, 1990. Attached for your information are the materials sent to approximately 14,000 businesses in October, 1989 summarizing the requirements for employer compliance under the federal Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification Act (WARN) and the Wisconsin Plant Closing Law in fulfillment of that requirement. Section 14(1)(a) of Act 44 requires the department to submit the proposed rules required under the act to the Legislative Council staff no later than July 1, 1990. Those rules are currently being drafted.

To the Honorable the Legislature:

We have completed our evaluation of 1985 Wisconsin Act 56, the Abortion Prevention and Family Responsibility Act, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. The intent of Act 56 was to reduce the number of unintended and unwanted pregnancies, especially among adolescents, promote the use of alternatives to abortion, and increase services to pregnant adolescents.

The several programs created or amended by Act 56 can each be shown to have achieved some results. Increases have occurred in the number of community-based pregnancy prevention programs, enrollment in school age parents programs, and public awareness of adoption.

Despite the program accomplishments, it is less clear whether Act 56 has achieved its goals. The statewide birthrate among adolescents and the number of abortions has remained virtually unchanged since 1985, although whether these rates might have increased without legislative action is not known. The adolescent birthrate in the City of Milwaukee and in other urban areas is above the statewide average and evidence suggests this birthrate may be growing. Our analysis also indicates that most initiatives have been only partially implemented or could be better managed, and we recommend a variety of program improvements.

Although improvements can be made to Act 56 programs, many question whether these initiatives will ever have a substantial effect on the state's abortion and teenage pregnancy rates. Some believe strongly the Legislature needs to create and fund new programs to address these problems. Others vigorously object to further legislative intervention into matters they believe are best left to families to address. Legislative options for further action are discussed.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by Board members and staff of the various agencies responsible for implementing Act 56 initiatives. Responses from the Departments of Public Instruction and Health and Social Services are Appendices II and III. Procedural constraints prevented the Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention and Services Board from preparing and attaching a written response. The Board is expected to issue a response shortly.
