GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE

December 13, 1991

To the Honorable Members of the Assembly:

I have approved **Assembly Bill 535** as 1991 Wisconsin Act 104 and have deposited it in the Office of the Secretary of State. I have exercised the partial veto authority in Sections 12 and 20.

Assembly Bill 535 increases the state's ability to both plan for and respond to hazardous substance releases. This legislation extends efforts of the federal government in a nation-wide program to improve the training and readiness of first-line responders. In giving the State Emergency Response Board (SERB) new responsibilities to form partnerships with regional emergency response teams, the health and safety of firefighters and the general public will receive greater protection.

Training dollars available to Wisconsin counties will be doubled by this bill through the use of the Environmental Repair Fund and the Environmental Transportation Fund. All costs of this legislation will be paid by sources other than the general taxpayer, and particularly by those whose activities pose the greatest risk of an environmental emergency.

In addition, the bill repeals the current exemption for businesses that employ ten or fewer persons from paying Superfund Amendment and Reauthorization Act (SARA) fees. While I understand that, with its new administrative rule powers, the SERB could reinstate lower fees or an outright exemption, I object to making small businesses the subject of additional state regulation. This provision is not central to the response team concept and is not needed to maintain the programs's financial viability. Therefore I have partially vetoed the bill to ensure that current law is maintained in this area.

RE: Report Under Section 36.25 (3m)(e) Wis. Stats.

Pursuant to action taken by the University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents during its regular meeting on November 8, 1991, I am transmitting the Report on Solid Waste Experiment Center, required under s. 36.25(3m)(e) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

1989 Wisconsin Act 31 created section 36.25(3m)(b) of the statutes which provides that:

"The board may establish one or more solid waste experiment centers for the purpose of developing, demonstrating, promoting and assessing the costs and environmental effects of alternatives to solid waste disposal. The board shall determine the location of the solid waste experiment centers. In

making the determination, the board shall consider the solid waste disposal needs of the various regions of the state. The board may establish, through cooperative agreements, solid waste experiment centers at existing publicly owned or privately owned storage, treatment or disposal facilities."

Section 35.25(3m)(e) provides that:

"Annually, the board shall submit a report to the chief clerk of each house of the legislature for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3) on all activities undertaken under this subsection."

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required by Wis. Stat. 119.23, enclosed for distribution to the appropriate standing committees is the first year report of the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program. Prepared by John Witte, professor with The Robert M. La Follette Institute of Public Affairs and the Department of Political Science, University of Wisconsin-Madison, the report is comprehensive, pointing out both positive and negative aspects of the program. Witte suggests that one year is too short a period to evaluate this program and recommends that the program be continued for at least several years to provide for a more adequate evaluation. However, he calls for a number of safeguards even with its being continued on the limited basis. He also acknowledges that this one program does not offer the solution to the Milwaukee problem.

The report did not address the effect the program has had on:

- The Milwaukee Public Schools, including the loss of revenue without an equal decrease in costs.
- The 63 Choice students (18 percent of the total Choice participants) who had their education disrupted in the middle of the year with the closing of the Juanita Virgil Academy
- The 35 percent of all students who did not re-enroll in the program this current year (nearly half returned to the Milwaukee Public Schools).

The report raises concerns about the program, including the following:

- Only seven private schools participated in the program, and at year's end, only 249 students were participating.
- One school, Juanita Virgil Academy, had severe difficulties, and closed in the middle of the year,



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leaving 63 students having to make other arrangements.

* Staff turnover was high, probably due to low pay.

- The schools had difficulty hiring minority teachers. Fifteen percent were African American, 13 percent Hispanic, and 72 percent white. Only 12 percent of teachers were male.
- The schools are not well equipped to meet the needs of learning disabled or emotionally disabled students.
- Achievement test scores showed as many students gained as declined; generally higher on reading; lower on math.
- Attrition was high: Of 249 students, 86 (35 percent) did not return in September. (40 of those returned to

Witte's recommendations to provide Professor safeguards within the program are not surprising. They are similar to the concerns I raised about the program from the beginning. More accountability is needed to assure that these children are receiving an adequate education.

I continue to oppose this program and believe this report provides evidence that a private choice program in not the answer.
