Supplemental Bovine Somatotropin (rBST) RE: Study

Section 36.25(32)(f), Wis. Stats., requires the University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents to submit annually to the Governor and the Chief Clerk of each House of the Legislature, a report on animal health

and efficacy research results related to use of supplemental recombinant bovine somatotropin (rBST). (BST is also known as bovine growth hormone [BGH].) The first required report was submitted by the Board on March 1, 1991.

The second report on the requirements of the legislation as specified in s. 36.25(32)(a)-(e), Wis. Stats., prepared by the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences and the School of Veterinary Medicine, UW-Madison, is attached. This report was accepted by the Board of Regents on February 7, 1992 for submission to you.

The Legislature appropriated \$230,000 GPR in 1990-91 for rBST research, and the funding was allocated to UW-Madison. On July 2-3, 1991, the base budget for rBST research was eliminated by an amendment passed by the State Senate; however, the report is still required. The report contains a chronology of state-funded rBST research conducted by UW-Madison from July 1, 1990 to the present, and a summary of progress report of the activities. Note that since July 5, 1991, after the funding was eliminated, the research projects are either stopped or phased down, and the efficacy and health literature review is completed.
