REMARKS BY THE SPEAKER

"Thank you ... Justice Bablitch ... Sister Cipress ... distinguished guests.

Welcome ... new and returning state representatives, your families, friends and supporters to this, the start of the 91st session of the Wisconsin Legislature.

My congratulations to those of you who, for the next two years, will represent your constituents in the Assembly ... the people's house of government.

In the past, Assembly members have taken this opportunity to thank those who stood by them through thick and thin. I call on the members at this time to stand

and give a well-deserved round of applause to relatives, friends and supporters who are here today.

To my Assembly colleagues ... I offer thanks for your support in electing me to a second term as Speaker of the 99-member Wisconsin Assembly.

It is a humbling yet inspiring honor.

I will strive to fulfill this honor by seeking your advice and counsel and acting on your guidance.

Each election is a new beginning. But as we enter 1993 I believe we are on the threshold of a promising new era. We have elected a new president.

He brings great energy and knowledge to the challenges that confront us.

To help meet these challenges ... he has called on two of Wisconsin's best to serve in Washington.

Our hopes and prayers go with UW-Madison Chancellor Donna Shalala and Congressman Les Aspin as they assume their new duties.

In addition, the Legislature will lose the talents of two bright, young lawmakers.

State Sen. Russ Feingold will become U.S. Sen. Feingold and State Sen. Thomas Barrett will become U.S. Representative Barrett ... Both will take their oaths of office tomorrow.

We are gathered here today to inaugurate a new Assembly ... we have members who represent a cross-section of Wisconsin.

They come to Madison from the sprawling farm country ... from the inner cities to the quiet suburbs and the bustling areas of the state's commercial and financial centers.

The election has given a new look to the Assembly.

We have the largest group of women in the Assembly brought together after one election ...

We have the largest group of African Americans in the history of the Assembly.

And many among us are newcomers. All in all, 23 first term men and women in the Assembly will bring a new outlook and drive to this body.

These newcomers join veteran lawmakers, seasoned by past legislative battles, who uphold the commitment to Wisconsin's tradition of progressive government. All who sit here today have heard the message of this new era: That message is change.

To strengthen our economy and set it on a course for the 21st century ...

To change government policies so they reward people who play by the rules ...

To change our health care system so that basic health care is available to all - not just the well to do ...

To change our education system to make it forward-looking and accountable ...

And, change the conduct of government, break the gridlock, and cast off partisanship.

These are times when great things can be done ... these are times when great things must be done.

We must be sober in reflecting on the problems that confront us.

But, we cannot deny the feeling of excitement in the air ... the sense that great accomplishments await our state and our nation.

It's time we re-discover a home truth and invest in the common genius of our people.

Our president-elect has shown he is tackling the challenges before us.

His actions have given us confidence in the future.

But we in Wisconsin must do our part ... we must be ready. When President Clinton puts forth the call to provide affordable and accessible health coverage ... we in Wisconsin should offer examples of how to do the job.

For instance, let us move quickly in the Legislature to strip away tedious regulations that hamper the delivery of health care.

Let's help midwives and physician assistants to work in underserved areas of our state.

And ... we can move forward on consumer-friendly health care reforms such as uniform hospital accounting and billing ... a system all of us can understand.

In many cases the interests of our citizens in small towns and big cities in Wisconsin are the same interests of small- and big-town America.

At the same time, we must acknowledge the differences that Democrats and Republicans bring to this house.

Between us - and among us - we represent different regions and sometimes competing and contradictory ideas.

We have a Republican governor who will run for reelection on much of what happens this year in the Legislature.

As one of the chief representatives of Democrats in Wisconsin, I will not let that hamper our efforts here.

At the same time, the desire to avoid partisanship should not discourage debate. Debate strengthens our ideas.

Indeed ... our Assembly rules lend themselves to vigorous debate. But, let it be thoughtful debate.

As the statesman Daniel Webster said: "Anger is not an argument."

What we need are sound ideas ... not sound bites.

After the debate is over let us do the best for our citizens.

Let us be workhorses instead of show horses.

Much difficult work awaits us to balance the budget, deal with crime, provide health care and move forward on a number of other high-priority issues.

I pledge to put aside politics of the moment and work for the long-term interests of the people of Wisconsin.

Let us ring in this new era in the spirit of understanding, tolerance and unity.

Let us join hands and hearts in common purpose.

As former Milwaukee Mayor Carl Zeidler once said: "Hats off to the past, coats off to the future."

Let's get to work.

ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION

To amend so as in effect to *repeal* section 10 of article V; and to *create* section 11 of article V of the constitution, relating to authorizing the governor to veto items of appropriation bills, replacing the existing partial veto (first consideration).

Resolved by the assembly, the senate concurring, That:

SECTION 1. Section 10 of article V of the constitution is amended so as in effect to repeal said section:

[Article V] Section 10 (1) (a) ~~Every bill which shall have passed the legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor.~~

~~(b) If the governor approves and signs the bill, the bill shall become law. Appropriation bills may be approved in whole or in part by the governor, and the part approved shall become law.~~

~~(c) In approving an appropriation bill in part, the governor may not create a new word by rejecting individual letters in the words of the enrolled bill.~~

~~(2) (a) If the governor rejects the bill, the governor shall return the bill, together with the objections in writing, to the house in which the bill originated. The house of origin shall enter the objections at large upon the journal and proceed to reconsider the bill. If, after such reconsideration, two thirds of the members present agree to pass the bill notwithstanding the objections of the governor, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two thirds of the members present it shall become law.~~

~~(b) The rejected part of an appropriation bill, together with the governor's objections in writing, shall be returned to the house in which the bill originated. The house of origin shall enter the objections at large upon the journal and proceed to reconsider the rejected part of the appropriation bill. If, after such reconsideration, two thirds of the members present agree to approve the rejected part notwithstanding the objections of the governor, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two thirds of the members present the rejected part shall become law.~~

~~(c) In all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by ayes and noes, and the names of the members voting for or against passage of the bill or the rejected part of the bill notwithstanding the objections of the governor shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively.~~

~~(3) Any bill not returned by the governor within 6 days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to the governor shall be law unless the legislature, by final adjournment, prevents the bill's return, in which case it shall not be law.~~

SECTION 2. Section 11 of article V of the constitution is created to read:

[Article V] Section 11 (1) Every bill that has passed the legislature shall be enrolled and presented to the governor before it becomes a law.

(2) If the governor approves and signs the bill, the bill shall become a law.

(3) (a) If the governor disapproves the bill, the governor shall return the bill, together with the objections in writing, to the house in which the bill originated. Except for the purpose of complying with the requirement for returning the objections in writing, the governor's objections to the bill have no legal effect.

(b) The house of origin shall enter the objections at large upon the journal and may reconsider the bill. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of the members present agree to pass the bill notwithstanding the objections of the governor, the

bill shall be transmitted, together with the objections, to the other house, by which the bill shall likewise be reconsidered. If passed by two-thirds of the members of that house present, the bill shall become a law.

(c) A disapproved bill does not become a law unless it is reconsidered by each house of the legislature, and passed notwithstanding the objections of the governor, before the end of the legislative biennium during which the bill was introduced.

(4) (a) An enrolled bill is an appropriation bill only if the bill itself sets aside a sum of public money and limits the use of the money to a specified purpose. The governor may disapprove any item or items of an appropriation bill, but only if the remainder of the bill constitutes a complete, entire and workable law and is germane to the subject of the legislative enactment to which it relates. That remainder of the bill shall become a law.

(b) Except for the marks required to identify the disapproved item and the governor's personal initials indicating the disapproval, the governor may not write anything into the enrolled bill.

(c) The governor's objections to each disapproved item shall be transmitted, in writing, to the house in which the bill originated. Except for the purpose of complying with the requirement for returning the objections in writing, the governor's objections to the disapproved item or items have no legal effect.

(d) The house of origin shall enter the objections at large upon the journal and may reconsider the disapproved item or items. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of the members present agree to pass the disapproved item or items notwithstanding the objections of the governor, the governor's objections to the disapproved item or items shall be transmitted to the other house, by which the item or items shall likewise be reconsidered. If passed by two-thirds of the members of that house present, the item or items passed shall become law as a supplement to the law enacted under par. (a).

(e) A disapproved item does not become law unless it is reconsidered by each house of the legislature, and passed notwithstanding the objections of the governor, before the end of the legislative biennium during which the bill was introduced.

(5) In all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by ayes and noes, and the names of the members voting for or against passage of the bill or the disapproved item or items of the bill notwithstanding the objections of the governor

shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively.

(6) Any bill not returned by the governor within 6 days, Sundays excepted, after having been presented to the governor shall be a law.

Be it further resolved, That this proposed amendment be referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election and that it be published for 3 months previous to the time of holding such election.

To create section 9m of article I of the constitution, relating to the rights of victims of crime (first consideration).

SECTION 1. Section 9m of article I of the constitution is created to read:

[Article I] Section 9m. This state shall treat crime victims, as defined by law, with fairness, dignity and respect for their privacy. This state shall ensure that crime victims have all of the following privileges and protections as provided by law: timely disposition of the case; the opportunity to attend court proceedings unless the trial court finds sequestration is necessary to a fair trial for the defendant; reasonable protection from the accused throughout the criminal justice process; notification of court proceedings; the opportunity to confer with the prosecution; the opportunity to make a statement to the court at disposition; restitution; compensation; and information about the outcome of the case and the release of the accused. The legislature shall provide remedies for the violation of this section. Nothing in this section, or in any statute enacted pursuant to this section, shall limit any right of the accused which may be provided by law.

To renumber section 24 (6) of article IV and subsections 2d to 9th of section 31 of article IV; to renumber and amend subsection 1st of section 31 of article IV; to amend sections 24 (1) and (2) (intro.) and 32 of article IV; and to create section 24 (6) (b) and (c) of article IV of the constitution, relating to distinguishing the state lottery from prohibited gambling, limiting "lottery", prohibiting lottery expansion to other games, and

removing from the gambling section of the constitution the prohibition of individual divorce grants by the legislature (first consideration).

Resolved by the assembly, the senate concurring, That:

SECTION 1. Section 24 (1) and (2) (intro.) of article IV of the constitution are amended to read:

[Article IV] Section 24 (1) Except as provided in this section, the legislature ~~shall never~~ may not authorize gambling in any lottery or grant any divorce form.

(2) (intro.) Except as otherwise provided by law, the following activities do not constitute consideration as an element of ~~a lottery~~ gambling:

SECTION 2. Section 24 (6) of article IV of the constitution is renumbered section 24 (6) (a) of article IV.

SECTION 3. Section 24 (6) (b) and (c) of article IV of the constitution are created to read:

[Article IV] Section 24 (6) (b) The lottery authorized under par. (a) shall be an enterprise that entitles the player, by purchasing a ticket, to participate in a game of chance if: 1) the winning tickets are randomly predetermined and the player reveals preprinted numbers or symbols from which it can be immediately determined whether the ticket is a winning ticket entitling the player to win a prize as prescribed in the features and procedures for the game, including an opportunity to win a prize in a secondary or subsequent chance drawing or game; or 2) the ticket is evidence of the numbers or symbols selected by the player or, at the player's option, selected by a computer, and the player becomes entitled to a prize as prescribed in the features and procedures for the game, including an opportunity to win a prize in a secondary or subsequent chance drawing or game if some or all of the player's symbols or numbers are selected in a chance drawing or game, if the player's ticket is randomly selected by the computer at the time of purchase or if the ticket is selected in a chance drawing.

(c) Notwithstanding the authorization of a state lottery under par. (a), the following games, or games simulating any of the following games, may not be conducted by the state as a lottery: 1) any game in which winners are selected based on the results of a race or sporting event; 2) any banking card game, including blackjack, baccarat or chemin de fer; 3) poker; 4) roulette; 5) craps or any other game that involves rolling dice; 6) keno; 7) bingo 21, bingo jack, bingolet or bingo craps; 8) any

game of chance that is played on a slot machine or any mechanical, electromechanical or electronic device that is generally available to be played at a gambling casino; 9) any game or device that is commonly known as a video game of chance or a video gaming machine or that is commonly considered to be a video gambling machine, unless such machine is a video device operated by the state in a game authorized under par. (a) to permit the sale of tickets through retail outlets under contract with the state and the device does not determine or indicate whether the player has won a prize, other than by verifying that the player's ticket or some or all of the player's symbols or numbers on the player's ticket have been selected in a chance drawing, or by verifying that the player's ticket has been randomly selected by a central system computer at the time of purchase; 10) any game that is similar to a game listed in this paragraph; or 11) any other game that is commonly considered to be a form of gambling and is not, or is not substantially similar to, a game conducted by the state under par. (a). No game conducted by the state under par. (a) may permit a player of the game to purchase a ticket, or to otherwise participate in the game, from a residence by using a computer, telephone or other form of electronic, telecommunication, video or technological aid.

SECTION 4. Subsection 1st of section 31 of article IV of the constitution is renumbered section 31 (1) of article IV and amended to read:

[Article IV] Section 31 (1) For changing the ~~name~~ names of persons ~~or~~, constituting one person the heir at law of another or granting any divorce.

SECTION 5. Subsections 2d to 9th of section 31 of article IV of the constitution are renumbered section 31 (2) to (9) of article IV.

SECTION 6. Section 32 of article IV of the constitution is amended to read:

[Article IV] Section 32. The legislature ~~shall~~ may provide by general laws ~~law~~ for the ~~transaction~~ treatment of any ~~business that may be~~ subject for which lawmaking is prohibited by section thirty-one 31 of this article, ~~and all~~. Subject to reasonable classifications, such laws shall be uniform in their operation throughout the state.

Be it further resolved, That this proposed amendment be referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election and that it be published for 3 months previous to the time of holding such election.
