State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau

The Honorable, The Legislature:

We have completed an evaluation of the University of Wisconsin (UW)-Extension, as directed by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. UW-Extension provides continuing education and public service programs through its Division of Continuing Education, and programs to serve children and families, farmers, urban and rural communities, business, and industry through its Division of Cooperative Extension. A third division, the Division of Extension Communications and Information Technology, was not the subject of this evaluation. In fiscal year (FY) 1995-96,

UW-Extension's expenditures from all funding sources were \$135.3 million, which represents the third-highest total among all UW System institutions. These expenditures supported 1,655 full-time equivalent positions.

Over time, the emphasis of the University's extension programs has expanded from practical skills in agriculture, home economics, and industrial work to include all areas of human knowledge, presented through an array of seminars, workshops, televised distance education, and other means. This growth in both volume and diversity of program offerings is reflected in an 79.4 percent increase in expenditures since FY 1986–87.

UW-Extension's programs have a long tradition in Wisconsin and generally are popular. However, both the breadth and the increasing cost of current programming raise questions about whether UW-Extension should redefine its core mission. Over 8,400 credit and non-credit continuing education program sections were offered in FY 1995-96, and in the most recent data available, cooperative extension agents reported over 1.15 million contacts in programs serving children and families, farmers, urban communities, and business. However, program priorities are defined so broadly that they can include virtually any educational area. In addition, the current organizational structure of UW-Extension may limit the efficiency of its service delivery. Therefore, this may be an appropriate time to address the future funding, direction, and organizational structure of UW-Extension.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the University, including UW-Extension, UW System, and the campuses, and by the counties. A response from the UW System President is Appendix IV.

EXECUTIVE ORDER #308

Relating to a Proclamation that the Flag of the United States and the Flag of the State of Wisconsin be Flown at Half-Staff as a Mark of Respect for the Brave Personnel of the United States Air Force Reserve's 440th Airlift Wing Who Lost Their Lives in the Line of Duty in Tegucigalpa, Honduras

WHEREAS, on Tuesday, April 1, 1997, a Milwaukee-based Air Force Reserve cargo aircraft en route from Howard Air Force Base to Soto Cano Air Base crashed at the end of an airport runway in Honduras; and

WHEREAS, Senior Master Sergeant Leland Rassmussen, Staff Sergeant Vicki Clifton, and Senior Airman Samuel Keene of the United State Air Force Reserve's 440th Airlift Wing lost their lives while on this resupply mission; and

WHEREAS, Senior Master Sergeant Rassmussen, Staff Sergeant Clifton, and Senior Airman Keene honorably served the people of the United States and the people of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the people of Wisconsin mourn the loss of these brave service personnel;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, TOMMY G. THOMPSON,

Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by Federal and State law, DO HEREBY ORDER that the flag of the United States and the flag of the State of Wisconsin shall be flown at half-staff at all buildings, grounds, and military installations of the State of Wisconsin, located in Milwaukee County and at the State Capitol in the City of Madison, beginning forthwith until sundown on Monday, April 7, 1997.

EXECUTIVE ORDER #309

Relating to the creation of the Wisconsin Science Advisory Council on Metallic Mining

WHEREAS, Wisconsin has a well-established tradition and history of mining its metallic ore resources for the benefit of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin has an equally well-established tradition and history of protecting and preserving its environmental heritage; and

WHEREAS, mining of metallic ore reserves represents a significant economic opportunity in this state; and

WHEREAS, certain metallic mining practices have caused degradation of surface and ground water through acid drainage and the release of heavy metals; and

WHEREAS, technology has been advanced that promises to prevent or eliminate environmental pollution caused by the mining of metallic ore reserves; and

WHEREAS, the interests of the citizens of Wisconsin will best be served by basing decisions regarding metallic ore mining in this state on sound scientific principles;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, TOMMY G. THOMPSON, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of this State, and specifically by Section 14.019 of the Wisconsin Statutes, do hereby:

- Create the Wisconsin Science Advisory Council on Metallic Mining (hereinafter "Council") and require the Council to perform the following substantive functions:
 - Identify the technologies that are effective in preventing or eliminating environmental degradation from metallic ore mining operations;
 - Review, on a site-specific basis, proposed metallic ore mining operations in this state and determine the effectiveness and feasibility of implementing technologies to reduce or eliminate environmental impacts, including acid drainage and the release of heavy metals from the tailings site, from the proposed metallic ore mining operations;
 - c. Formulate and submit recommendations to the Secretary of the Department of Natural Resources (hereinafter "Secretary") concerning the existence of technology that will ensure compliance with state groundwater and surface water statutes or rules by metallic ore mining operations and confirm that any proposed metallic ore mining operation would utilize these technologies.

- 2. Provide that the recommendations of the Council required in paragraph 1. c. shall be considered in state environmental impact statement preparation and permit decisions.
- 3. Provide that the Council shall be composed of five members who shall serve at the pleasure of the Secretary.
- 4. Provide that the Secretary shall appoint the members of the Council and shall designate a chair from such membership to serve in that capacity at the pleasure of the Secretary.
- 5. Provide that members of the Council must have training and experience in at least one of the following disciplines, each of which must be represented on the Council: geology or hydrology, environmental engineering, metallic ore mining, and environmental risk assessment and management.
- Direct agencies of the State of Wisconsin to cooperate fully with the Council and provide assistance to the Council upon the request of the Secretary.
- 7. Direct the Department of Natural Resources to provide staff and other necessary support to the Council.
- 8. Require the Secretary to establish dates by which the Council must submit the recommendations required in paragraph 1.c..
- Provide that the Council shall submit such information and reports to the Secretary as the Secretary directs..
