# State of Wisconsin Department of Administration

The Honorable, The Legislature:

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec.13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of June, 1997.

On July 1, 1997 the <u>Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund</u> balance was -\$8 thousand. This shortfall continued until July 9, 1997 when the balance reached \$9 thousand. On July 29, 1997 the balance was -\$12 thousand. This shortfall continued through the end of the month. These shortfalls were due to the timing of revenues.

On July 22, 1997, <u>The Wisconsin Petroleum Inspection Fund</u> balance was -\$2.41 million. This shortfall continued until July 24, 1997 when the balance reached \$6.11 million. This shortfall was due to the timing of revenues.

The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment and Petroleum Inspection Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the \$400 million ceiling and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for Interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

On behalf of the Council on Small, Veteran and Minority Business Opportunities, I submit the Council's 1996–97 Annual Report.

The Council continues to work to include Wisconsin small, veteran, and minority business in the State of Wisconsin's purchasing activities.
