Assembly Bill 54

Assembly Bill 54 has been scheduled for Senate action on Tuesday, March 14. AB 54 would eliminate the requirement for salvage motor pools to purchase two dealer license plates.

Under current law, motor vehicle salvage pools are required to purchase 2 dealer registration plates at a cost of \$75 each. Dealer registration plates may only be used on vehicles that are owned or being repossessed by a dealer or wholesaler. Many motor vehicle salvage pools, however, only sell vehicles on consignment – the seller still owns the vehicle until it is sold and then the title passes directly from seller to purchaser. Since salvage pools typically do not own or repossess vehicles, they cannot use the required dealer plates. Of the 10 active licensed salvage pools in the state, 7 have the minimum required plates and 3 have additional dealer plates, which are likely used on vehicles that the pools occasionally acquire.

AB 54 eliminates the requirement for motor vehicle salvage pools to purchase two dealer plates, but would allow them to purchase the plates if needed. This bill makes no other changes to the licensing requirements for salvage pools.

I respectfully request your support for AB 54 and eliminate this unnecessary requirement. Thank you.

BILL SUMMARY

AB 54: Optional Dealer Plates for Salvage Pools

Date: March 16, 1999

BACKGROUND

Under current law, motor vehicle salvage pools are required to purchase 2 dealer registration plates at a cost of \$75 each. Dealer registration plates may only be used on vehicles that are owned or being repossessed by a dealer or wholesaler. Many motor vehicle salvage pools, however, only sell vehicles on consignment – the seller still owns the vehicle until it is sold and then the title passes directly from seller to purchaser. Since salvage pools typically do not own or repossess vehicles, they cannot use the required dealer plates. Of the 10 active licensed salvage pools in the state, 7 have the minimum required plates and 3 have additional dealer plates, which are likely used on vehicles that the pools occasionally acquire.

SUMMARY OF AB 54

Assembly Bill 54 eliminates the requirement for motor vehicle salvage pools to purchase two dealer plates, but would allow them to purchase the plates if needed. This bill makes no other changes to the licensing requirements for salvage pools.

FISCAL EFFECT

A fiscal estimate prepared by the Department of Transportation indicates that there would be no state fiscal effect. If the 7 salvage pools, which currently only purchase the required plates, chose not to obtain dealer plates, there would be a negligible loss of \$500 annually to the Transportation Fund.

PROS

- 1. AB 54 eliminates an unnecessary mandate and expense for motor vehicle salvage pools.
- 2. The fiscal impact of this bill is minimal.

CONS

None.

AB 54: optional dealer plates for motor vehicle salvage pools:

- This bill makes it optional, not required, that salvage pools purchase dealer plates.
- Salvage pools virtually always sell vehicles on consignment. In a consignment sale, the dealer does not own the vehicle the seller still owns the vehicle until it is sold, and then title passes directly from the seller to the purchaser.
- Dealer plates must be used on vehicles that dealers *own or repossess*. Therefore, it is virtually always the case that salvage pools are required to purchase dealer plates when they have no need of the plates.
- Salvage pools may occasionally own vehicles that they sell, and therefore should have the option to purchase dealer plates if they need them.
- This bill makes no changes to licensing requirements for salvage pools, except this one requirement for purchasing dealer plates.
- Fiscal impact is minimal.
- We request this bill to eliminate an unnecessary requirement for salvage pools.

AB 54: issuing dealer plates to motor vehicle salvage pools:

- This bill makes it optional, not required, that salvage pools purchase dealer plates.
- Salvage pools virtually always sell vehicles on consignment. In a consignment sale, the dealer does not own the vehicle the seller still owns the vehicle until it is sold, and then title passes directly from the seller to the purchaser.
- Dealer plates must be used on vehicles that dealers own or repossess. Therefore, it is virtually always the case that salvage pools are required to purchase dealer plates when they have no need of the plates.
- Salvage pools may occasionally own vehicles that they sell, and therefore should have the option to purchase dealer plates if they need them.
- This bill makes no changes to licensing requirements for salvage pools, except this
 one requirement for purchasing dealer plates.
- Fiscal impact is minimal.
- We request this bill to eliminate a useless requirement for salvage pools.

AB 55: eliminate mandatory revocation of dealer license for misuse of dealer plates:

- Dealer plates must be used on vehicles that a dealer, distributor, or manufacturer owns or repossesses and is actually offered for sale, or is in transit; or is being used by manufacturer for trial tests; or is being repossessed, being reconditioned for sale or being foreclosed/resold.
- Penalty for misuse of dealer plates is forfeiture of up to \$200.
- Currently, the law mandates DOT to revoke a dealer/distributor/manufacturer business license if the business is convicted twice in a registration year of misuse of dealer plates.
- This bill eliminates the mandatory license revocation, but leaves the forfeiture for each occasion of misuse.
- License revocation is a harsh penalty, reserved for most egregious actions. DOT usually tries to impose lesser penalties, working with a dealer to encourage proper behavior. We believe this penalty is out of proportion to the offense.

Testimony before the Assembly Transportation Committee February 11, 1999 Carson P. Frazier Page 1 of 2 pages

AB 58: eliminate reference to "retail" referring to auction dealer penalties:

• A motor vehicle auction dealer by law can only sell at wholesale. They may not sell to retail buyers.

• Several references in the penalty provisions of this subchapter include references to "retail." These provisions replicate penalty provisions relating to motor vehicle dealers who do sell to retail buyers. We believe that this was merely a drafting oversight, from years past.

• However, this oversight has limited us in being able to cite auction dealers for unlawful practices, because the law refers to "retail."

• We request deletion of the word "retail" in certain provisions, and repeal of two provisions that apply only in retail situations.

AB 59: eliminate statutorily specified expiration dates:

- This bill eliminates three remaining actual dates listed in the statutes, for registration expiration:
 - Farm trucks which currently expire on the last day of February of even numbered years
 - Motorcycles/mopeds which currently expire on April 30 of even-numbered years
 - \$5/5 year registrations which currently expire on December 31 of 1993 and every 5 years after that.
- These are the last remaining expiration dates actually specified in statute.
- Over the last few years, we have requested and the legislature has eliminated several other dates that were actually listed in statute.
- We do not intend to change expiration periods in the foreseeable future.
- However, we would like to eliminate the statutory limitation on the actual date, because if we ever need to change registration periods, to balance our workload for example, we could not do under current law.

Co-sponsorship of LRB 0297/1, relating to issuing dealer registration

plates to motor vehicle salvage pools

I am introducing legislation to eliminate as a requirement, but retain as optional, the purchase of two dealer license plates for salvage motor pools.

Presently, salvage motor pools are **required** to purchase two dealer license plates, which cost \$75 each. However, by statute, dealer plates can only be used on vehicles that a dealer or wholesaler owns or repossesses. A salvage pool, by definition, only sells vehicles on consignment and does not own or repossess vehicles. Thus, the current requirement burdens salvage pools with paying \$150 to get two dealer license plates that they cannot use.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Current law requires a motor vehicle salvage pool (any person who is engaged primarily in the business of selling or distributing damaged motor vehicles at wholesale, whether or not the motor vehicles are owned by that person) to be licensed by the department of transportation as a wholesaler and to obtain at least two dealer registration plates at a cost of \$75 each. Dealer registration plates issued to a wholesaler may only be used on motor vehicles that are owned or being repossessed by the wholesaler. Many motor vehicle salvage pools sell motor vehicles only on consignment, and so neither own nor repossess motor vehicles.

This bill eliminates the requirement that motor vehicle salvage pools obtain dealer registration plates, but allows motor vehicle salvage pools to obtain the plates if so desired. This bill does not change current law that generally prohibits the operation upon a highway of any motor vehicle that is not properly registered or displaying dealer registration plates.
