Support for AB 412 (Expands Parent Definition for Special Education Purposes)

This memo requests support for AB 412 as amended and unanimously passed by the Assembly Committee on Family Law. AB 412 is sponsored by Representative Suzanne Jeskewitz (R-Menonomee Falls) and requested by the Milwaukee Public Schools.

AB 412 adds foster parents to the definition of "parent" within Chapter 115. As of July, 1999, there were 7,117 children in foster care within Milwaukee County. The addition of foster parents to the definition authorizes them to act on behalf of a student with disabilities without jeopardizing the rights of the student's parents.

Support for this bill will help expedite special education services to disabled students in foster care not only within MPS but in school districts across the state.

Dear Mr. Phillipson:

Thank you for your letter of January 19, 2000, in which you raised a number of issues and requested information regarding the legislative proposal contained in Assembly Bill 412 and its substitute amendment. That proposal clarifies the circumstances in which a foster parent may "act as a parent" for a child with disabilities. The department's objections to AB 412 raised in my August 18, 1999 letter to Senator Richard Grobschmidt and Representative Suzanne Jeskewitz were remedied by the language in the substitute amendment. As you know, a department representative testified in support of AB 412 with the substitute amendment.

As I pointed out in that letter, and as the substitute amendment language reflects, federal law permits foster parents to act as parents if parental rights have been extinguished and if the foster parent has an ongoing, long-term parental relationship with the child, is willing to make the educational decisions that are required of a parent, and has no interest that would conflict with the interests of the child. AB 412 and its substitute amendment parallel this federal provision and clarify that parental rights to make educational decisions concerning a child may be extinguished by termination of parental rights, by transfer of guardianship or legal custody or by other court order.

If a foster parent were acting as the parent under the provisions of AB 412 and its substitute amendment, the local educational agency (LEA) would notify the foster parent when the LEA proposed or refused to take action. Natural parents would not be notified under these circumstances because their parental rights would already have been extinguished as that is one of the provisions necessary for the foster parent to "act as the parent." Similarly, were the foster parents acting as a parent under the provisions of AB 412 or its substitute amendment, the foster parent would have access to pupil records. The natural parent, whose rights were already extinguished, would not have rights to pupil records.

Under the provisions of state and federal law, a foster parent also can be appointed as a surrogate parent if the parent cannot be identified, cannot after reasonable efforts be located, or if the child is a ward of the state. In addition, the foster parent may not be an employee of the Department of Public Instruction, the district, or any other agency involved in the education or care of the child, may not have an interest that conflicts with the interest of the child, and must have knowledge and skills that ensure adequate representation of the child. The department will propose eliminating additional state law requirements in PI-11.14 regarding surrogate parents so that the procedure for appointing surrogate parents in this state is not unduly cumbersome.

If you need additional information, please contact the department. I look forward to continuing to work with Milwaukee Public Schools and other interested parties to improve services for children with disabilities.
