Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

AB 286 will have no fiscal effect on the Department of Employment Relations.

The bill would permit towns to compensate town officers by paying hourly salaries up to a maximum of \$5,000 a year. Under current law, towns may compensate town officials by paying annual salaries, per diem expenses, or a combination of the two. This bill would add the authority to pay hourly salaries and permit a combination of annual, hourly and per diem compensation.

This bill might increase costs to towns if they choose to use the three methods of compensation to pay town officers more than they are currently receiving.

The bill might decrease costs to towns if they are currently estimating the number of hours likely to be worked in a year to set the annual salaries of certain town officers. Towns could convert those officers' reimbursements to hourly salaries for actual hours worked. The bill might also decrease costs to towns using a per diem method of compensation. If a town has, for example, a per diem rate of \$40 for any day, or portion of a day, worked as its only method of compensation, it will pay \$40 for one hour of town officer work. If the same town chooses to set an hourly rate of \$20 for a town officer, it would save \$20 for the same hour worked.

DER does not have data on compensation currently paid by towns to town officers.
