According to survey results of public school districts conducted during the spring of 2000, it is estimated that 90% of public school districts now have Internet access and nearly 70% of public school districts employ filtering on some or all personal computers.			
In addition, the federal Children's Internet Protection Act will take effect in April 2001. The Act mandates libraries and schools to use a "technology protection measure" which is a specific technology that blocks or filters Internet access to material or content harmful to minors. It applies to all schools and libraries receiving funds from several federal programs. It is estimated that 90% of Wisconsin schools receive federal funds that are subject to the requirements of the Act. It is unclear at this time if school districts will be provided financial assistance to comply with the requirements of the Act. WiscNet is a major provider of Internet filtering service to school districts. Costs for the WiscNet service range from \$540 annually for one to 99 computers to \$4,500 annually for 500-999 computers. School districts with more than 999 computers pay about five dollars per computer for the service. The bill allows school districts to use the TEACH Educational Technology Block Grant to pay for the Internet filtering service costs.			
There appears to be no direct fiscal impact on TEACH as a state agency, although there may be some minimal costs to monitor school district compliance which could be absorbed by the agency. If school districts choose not to comply, there may be contract penalty costs to remove existing TEACH-subsidized data lines and video links, although these costs cannot be determined at this time.
