Mandatory minimum sentence for juvenile who throws bodily substance in juvenile facility						

Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill would require an adult court that convicts a juvenile of throwing a bodily substance at or toward another person while placed in a secured correctional facility, a secure detention facility, a secured child caring institution, or a secured group home to sentence the juvenile to a mandatory minimum period of imprisonment of two years.

Current law permits an adult court to sentence a juvenile to a period of imprisonment of not more than two years. The fiscal impact of this legislation is dependent on the difference between the 2 year mandatory prison sentence and any lesser disposition that would have been imposed by the court on a juvenile convicted of this crime.

This criminal offense is still fairly new and we have not had a lot of experience with it yet. While it is believed that the number of juveniles that will be convicted of throwing bodily substances will be very low, the Department can not predict the number of juveniles that may be convicted in the future. Therefore it is not possible to make an accurate estimate of the increased costs to the Department at this time.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications
