## **Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

This bill would prohibit a person who is on conditional release (a person who has been found not guilty of a crime by reason of mental disease or defect whom the court has authorized to live in the community) and who is placed in a community-based residential facility from escaping from that facility. A person who violates this prohibition may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than ten years or both.

DOC has no information on the number of escapes from a community-based residential facility and is therefore unable to determine the number of individuals that would be affected under the provisions of this bill. Consequently, DOC is unable to calculate a fiscal estimate for this legislation. There will be increased costs to the State if additional offenders are sentenced to a state prison or placed on probation. Local costs will increase if more offenders are sentenced to a county jail.
