Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill would establish a universal health plan for Wisconsin residents. OCI is not able to determine what the fiscal impact would be due to the many variables associated with this bill.

There does not appear to be any impact on the regulatory responsibilities of OCI. OCI is unable to determine if the level of complaints will rise or decrease as a result of this bill or if OCI will be responsible for complaints processing.

Since this bill would likely cause an indeterminable level of migration of employers from commercial insurance to the state run universal health plan it is probable that a decrease in revenues to the state will result. In 1999, franchise and premium tax revenues for health insurers approximated \$14,830,000

This bill would likely save money for local government, since they, too, would discontinue offering health benefits to their employees. The exceptions would be for municipalities that offer better coverage than the universal health plan. OCI does not have information available to determine how great of an impact this bill would have on local government.
