Crimes related to terrorism; death penalty for first-degree homicide committed with intent to terrorize; permit retired law enforcement personnel to obtain license for carrying a concealed weapon

## **Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

This legislation relates to certain felonies associated with terrorism and providing a penalty. The "intent to terrorize" is defined as the intent to influence the policy of a governmental unit by intimidation or coercion, to punish a governmental unit for a prior policy decision or to affect the conduct of a governmental unit by homicide. The Department of Corrections is not able to identify any individual who is currently incarcerated or on supervision for such an offense.

This bill seeks to enhance the penalties for certain classes of felonies which pertain to the solicitation, threat or support of terrorism. Because this bill increases penalties for certain classes of felonies, offenders may stay in the system longer and increase Department costs. Predicting how many offenders this would impact is not possible. The average cost to house an inmate in FY00 was \$22,629 annually.

Also under this legislation, any person convicted of first-degree homicide with the intent to terrorize is eligible for capital punishment or life imprisonment. Wisconsin currently has no "death row" in which to hold persons awaiting execution and it is assumed that even if the number sentenced to death is small, a special unit within a current facility will be required. Any such unit would have substantial costs to construct and maintain. It is not possible to predict how many individuals will be sentenced under this offense, nor is it possible to predict what the judge or jury will impose for a sentence.

**Long-Range Fiscal Implications**
