Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill makes a number of changes in the criminal code to create new criminal offenses and to revise or repeal existing prohibitions, most of which relate to terrorism and certain types of threats.

This bill has no fiscal effect on the department of public instruction.

The bill expands the bomb scare crime to making or conveying a threat, knowing it to be false, to use or attempt to use an explosive, a destructive device, or a weapon of mass destruction. The threat is a Class E felony. If a person makes or conveys a threat to use or attempt to use an explosive, a destructive device, or a weapon of mass destruction to prevent the occupation or cause the evacuation of a school building, the person is guilty of a Class C felony. If this expansion would prevent future bomb scares in schools, school districts may reduce costs associated with bomb scares. It is unknown how many, if any bomb scares would be prevented as a result of this proposal. Therefore, the local effect of this bill on school districts is indeterminate.
