Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

The State Public Defender (SPD) is statutorily authorized and required to appoint attorneys to represent indigent defendants in criminal proceedings. The SPD plays a major role in ensuring that the Wisconsin justice system complies with the right to counsel provided by both the state and federal constitutions. Any legislation that creates a new criminal offense or expands the definition of an existing criminal offense has the potential to increase SPD costs.

This bill neither creates a new criminal offense, nor increases the maximum penalties for certain battery offenses. The proposed changes prohibit district attorneys from refraining from filing charges in exchange for a suspect's monetary contribution to an agency.

The SPD does not have the data to predict the increased costs that could result from the changes proposed in this bill. SPD does not believe that there are many instances of such agreements not to file charges in exchange for monetary contributions. Furthermore, because SPD clients lack substantial financial resources, they would be unlikely to be able to make the types of financial contributions referenced in this legislation.

Counties are also subject to increased costs when a new crime is created. There are some defendants who, despite exceeding the SPD's statutory financial guidelines, are constitutionally eligible for appointment of counsel because it would be a substantial hardship for them to retain an attorney. The court is required to appoint counsel at county expense for these defendants. Thus, if this bill does result in additional criminal prosecutions, it could add to county costs in cases in which the court appoints the defense attorney. The counties could also incur additional costs associated with incarceration of defendants, both pending trial and after sentencing.
