## **Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

This bill changes the procedures to be followed in John Doe proceedings under sec. 968.26, Wis. Stats., particularly in proceedings based on a complaint of a person who is not a district attorney. The changes include:

- (1) Allowing a judge to determine what witnesses and examinations are necessary and appropriate to ascertain whether a crime has been committed;
- (2) Requiring a judge to consider the credibility of testimony in support of and opposed to the person's complaint;
- (3) Allowing a judge to issue a criminal complaint if the judge finds sufficient credible evidence to warrant a prosecution; and
- (4) Allowing a judge to consider law enforcement investigative reports, district attorney records and other written records the judge finds relevant.

Case management records indicate that in 2006 there were 94 John Doe cases filed in Wisconsin; in 2007, there were 132 John Doe cases filed.

This bill will not change the requirements that need to be met before a person who is not a district attorney may bring a complaint under the statutes. Therefore, this bill may not impact the number of complaints filed.

It is estimated this bill will, however, reduce the number and length of courtroom proceedings that will be required to ascertain whether a crime may have been committed and a criminal complaint should be issued. Some complaints filed may not require courtroom proceedings of any kind, only the involvement of the judge.

Less courtroom proceedings will require less judge, court reporter and court staff time. These costs are borne by both the state and the county. Less proceedings are likely to lower county costs for subpoening and transporting witnesses. An accurate estimate of how these costs will be impacted is impossible with the data available.
