Testimony on Senate Bill 181  
Senate Committee on Health, Health Insurance, Privacy, Property Tax Relief, and Revenue  
May 5, 2009

Senator Erpenbach and members of the Committee:

Thank you for holding a hearing today on Senate Bill 181, the Smoke Free Wisconsin Act.

The Smoke Free Wisconsin Act will prohibit smoking in all Wisconsin workplaces. All workers will be protected from the effects of second hand smoke; all businesses will be regulated equally.

For 25 years, Wisconsin's Clean Indoor Air Act (which I authored)—the current law governing smoke free environments-- has served as a minimum standard. Increasingly over the years, the strength of this law has become its greatest source of controversy—local control of smoking regulation.

Current law has created the problem of patchwork regulation of smoking throughout the state. Currently, there are 37 different communities with smoke free ordinances. Eleven of these communities have enacted their ordinances since smoke free workplace legislation was introduced during the 2007 Session.

The Smoke Free Wisconsin Act will eliminate the patchwork of regulation that has developed under current law. This legislation provides a high standard of protection for all indoor areas, leaving only regulation of outdoor areas to local government.

Another benefit to enacting a comprehensive smoke free workplace law is that it will improve the health of Wisconsin residents.

Non-smokers are contracting lung cancer at alarming rates due to increased, and unwanted, exposure to second hand smoke. According to the Centers for Disease Control, nonsmokers exposed to secondhand smoke increase their risk of contracting heart disease and lung cancer by 20-30%. Restaurant and bar employees are more likely to be subjected to unwanted exposure to secondhand smoke than other workers.

According to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services *Burden of Tobacco Report (2006)*, nearly 16% of all annual deaths in Wisconsin are directly attributable to cigarette smoking. In addition, \$2.16 billion is paid annually in Wisconsin direct health care costs. Clearing the

air of second hand smoke will save lives, and decrease the overall cost of health care in our state.

Over one half of the population of the United States lives in an area covered by smoke free workplace laws. Twenty-two states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico have adopted workplace smoking laws, including our neighboring states of Minnesota, Iowa, and Illinois. Additionally, three more states will implement comprehensive smoke free workplace laws before the end of 2009. According to a March 2009 polling done by Mellman Group/Public Opinion Strategies, an overwhelming 69% of Wisconsin voters support a statewide smoke-free law that includes bars and restaurants.

The time has come to provide a healthy environment for workers and patrons alike. The time has come to ensure that businesses throughout the state are governed by one strong law regarding smoking in the workplace. The time has come to enact the Smoke Free Wisconsin Act.

**Testimony of Secretary Karen E. Timberlake, Department of Health Services

Senator Erpenbach and members of the Committee on Health, Health Insurance, Privacy, Property Tax Relief, and Revenue, thank you for providing me the opportunity to speak on this important public health issue.

Secondhand smoke is a serious public health problem. As the Surgeon General of the United States reported in a 2006 Report, there is no safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke. It's a serious health hazard that causes premature death and disease in non-smoking adults. Eliminating secondhand smoke from the places we work, eat, and shop is just as important to our health as ensuring our food, water, and public facilities are safe.

Smoke-free laws combat the effects of secondhand smoke and dramatically improve the health of both the employees and patrons they protect. A recent CDC study found that heart attack hospitalizations in Pueblo, Colorado decreased 41% just three years after the passage of their smoke-free ordinance.

We've already seen health benefits here in Wisconsin. Just one year after the Madison and Appleton smoke-free ordinances went into effect, non-smoking bartenders saw a significant decrease in the prevalence of eight upper respiratory symptoms (Source: UW Paul P. Carbone Comprehensive Cancer Center Study).

This issue affects all Wisconsin citizens, both young and old. Children are particularly sensitive to secondhand smoke. It can cause acute lower respiratory infections such as bronchitis and pneumonia in infants and young children.

Tobacco takes a terrible toll on our state's health. It's our leading cause of preventable death, and over 8,000 of our residents die each year from tobacco-related illness (Source: 2006 Burden of Tobacco in WI). Secondhand smoke accounts for more than 800 annual deaths in Wisconsin. That means secondhand smoke kills more people in Wisconsin each year than motor vehicle accidents.

In addition to saving lives, we have the opportunity to dramatically lower our state's health care costs. Wisconsin spends over \$2 billion each year in health care costs for illnesses directly caused by smoking, including nearly \$500 million in Medicaid costs. When you add in the additional \$1.7 billion the state loses annually in lost worker productivity due to smoking related illness, it is clear that Wisconsin simply can not afford to continue this way in these tough economic times.

Smoke-free workplace laws not only encourage adults to quit smoking, but also encourage young people not to start smoking.

A 1999 study in *Tobacco Control* found that requiring all workplaces to be smoke-free would decrease smoking prevalence by 10%. A separate 2001 study in the same publication reported that employees in workplaces with smoking bans have higher rates of smoking cessation than employees where smoking is permitted.

A 2000 study in the *Journal of the American Medical Association* reported that "The results from [these] national surveys [on youth smoking] strongly suggest that smoke-free workplaces and homes are associated with significantly lower rates of adolescent smoking."

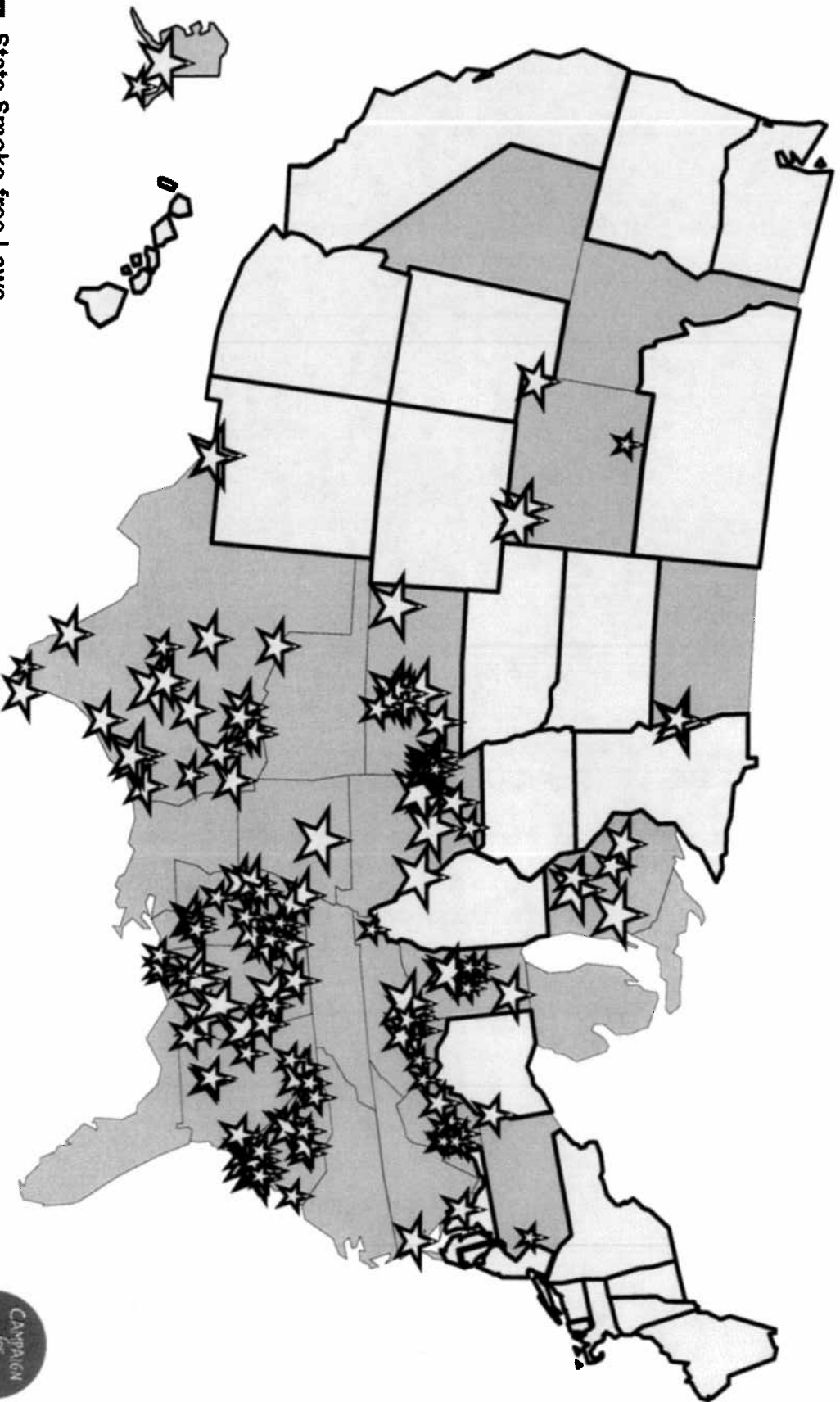
Over two-thirds of Wisconsin residents support smoke-free workplaces, and 38 Wisconsin communities have passed local smoke-free air ordinances, 11 of which include all workplaces.

The time is now for Wisconsin to join the list of 25 U.S. states, as well as Washington D.C. and Puerto Rico in providing our citizens with protection from secondhand smoke through a comprehensive smoke-free workplace law that covers all restaurants and taverns.

Every Wisconsin resident has the right to breathe clean air. I urge you to honor that right and the health of all Wisconsinites by making our state smoke-free by supporting SB 181.

Including Restaurants & Bars

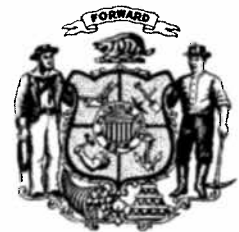

**RE: Support Compromise Amendment to AB 253/SB 181**

Yesterday afternoon, it was announced publicly that legislative leaders from both houses of the legislature, the Tavern League of Wisconsin, the American Cancer Society, and Smoke Free Wisconsin had reached an agreement on a substitute amendment to Assembly Bill 253/Senate Bill 181- The Smoke Free Wisconsin Act.

Specifically, this amendment would make the following changes to Assembly Bill 253/Senate Bill 181:

- Prohibit indoor smoking in workplaces across the state, while providing private establishments with protection of outdoor smoking areas.
- Revise penalties contained in the legislation for individuals who smoke in establishments to \$100-\$250.
- Revise penalties contained in the legislation for establishment owners to a first offense written warning, with every subsequent violation being \$100. This amendment also provides language for establishment owners highlighting a course of due diligence that they could follow to demonstrate that they have attempted to stop patrons from smoking. If they follow these commonsense procedures, they will not be fined.
- Provide a delayed implementation of this act until July 5, 2010.
- Provide an exemption for current cigar bars that generate 15 percent or more of their annual gross income from the on-site sale of cigars and tobacco for pipes.
- Provide an exemption for current tobacco retailers that generate 75 percent or more of their annual gross income from the on-site retail sale of tobacco products and accessories

Put simply, this agreement will protect workers across the state from the dangers of secondhand smoke while fulfilling their right to breathe clean, smoke free air. As a result, the American Cancer Society strongly supports this substitute amendment and asks that you vote yes for this amendment and yes on the bill at committee tomorrow.

**RE:** AB 253/SB 181 and the substitute amendment

On Friday, you will be voting on AB 253/SB181 and a substitute amendment. As you may know, the authors and smoke-free advocates would have preferred no exemptions and no delays. However, the main goal is to cover all workers in their workplace, and AB 253/SB181 with the substitute amendment substantially accomplishes that goal. We understand that many stakeholders have been involved in the process and this is the product of that work.

Substitute amendment makes these changes to the original bill:

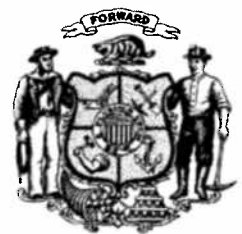
- Start date goes from 60 days to July 5, 2010.
- Cigar bar and tobacco retailers reaching certain sales thresholds are exempted.
- It includes a limited outdoor preemption that would allow bars and restaurants to have smoking outside. Local governments will not be able to regulate those premises in regard to smoking that but still have the authority to regulate smoking in their own properties.
- The fine structure is changed so that businesses in violation receive a \$100 fine on their second and any subsequent violations. Smokers can be fined between \$100 and \$250.

We appreciate the committee's work on this issue and the hard work of the co-sponsors, Rep. Richards, Al Ott and Senators Risser and Ellis. In addition, Senator Erpenbach was persistent in his work to reach an agreement. We also thank Speaker Sheridan and Majority Leader Decker for working on this legislation so that Wisconsin can become a smoke-free state.

Your vote in support of this substitute amendment and sending this for a vote on the Assembly floor will bring us closer to protecting workers from the hazards of secondhand smoke.

### **The Wisconsin Association of Health Plans supports the Statewide Smoking Ban Compromise.**

#### **Public support for a statewide smoking ban is strong:**

- Over two-thirds (69%) of Wisconsin voters would support a law making all workplaces and public places, including all restaurants and bars, smoke-free.
- 38 Wisconsin communities have already passed smoking bans, and recent polling in Eau Claire, Appleton and Marshfield shows strong support (76% of voters) for the smoking restrictions.

#### **Scientific evidence supports the health benefits of a smoking ban:**

- Hundreds of studies and dozens of distinguished scientific and medical organizations have concluded secondhand smoke is a serious health hazard that causes lung cancer, heart disease and serious respiratory illness in nonsmokers.
- The evidence on health risks associated with secondhand smoke is conclusive: The only way to protect people is to eliminate their exposure to secondhand smoke.
- The Surgeon General has concluded that eliminating smoking in indoor spaces is the only way to fully protect nonsmokers from exposure to secondhand smoke.

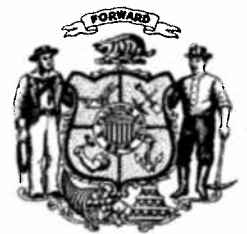
#### **Smoking ban legislation is being enacted nationwide:**

- 25 states and Washington DC have already banned smoking from private-sector workplaces, restaurants and taverns.
- Wisconsin's neighboring states, including Minnesota, Illinois and Iowa, already have smoking bans, which means a statewide smoking ban would create a similar business environment for taverns and restaurants located on Wisconsin's borders.

**Current Law**

***Areas Where Smoking is Prohibited***

Current law prohibits smoking in specific enclosed, indoor locations, including the following:

1. Public conveyances.
2. Educational facilities.
3. Inpatient health care facilities (county homes and infirmaries, community-based residential facilities, and nursing homes).
4. Indoor movie theaters.
5. Offices.
6. Passenger elevators.
7. Restaurants.
8. Retail establishments.
9. Public waiting rooms.
10. Governmental buildings.
11. Motor buses.
12. Hospitals (except that an adult patient of a hospital that primarily treats mental illness or substance abuse who has physician permission, may smoke in a designated area).
13. Physician offices.

Current law also prohibits smoking within the State Capitol or in the immediate vicinity thereof; on the premises (inside or outside) of a day care center when children are present; in an enclosed indoor area or on the grounds of a Type 1 juvenile correctional facility; or in or within 25 feet of a UW-System residence hall or dormitory.

### ***Designation of Smoking Areas***

Except for certain specified places,\* a smoking area at an indoor location may be designated by the person who is in charge of that location (unless prohibited by a fire marshal, law, ordinance, or resolution). However, an entire building may not be designated as a smoking area.

### ***Exemptions***

Current law provides exemptions from the prohibition against smoking for designated smoking areas, bowling centers, taverns, halls used for private functions, rooms in which the main occupants are smokers, areas of facilities that are used to manufacture or assemble goods, products, or merchandise, and certain types of correctional facilities.

Current law allows smoking in any restaurant that has a seating capacity of 50 individuals or less, or that holds a liquor license, if the sale of alcohol beverages accounts for more than 50% of the restaurant's receipts.

### ***Local Authority to Regulate Smoking***

Current law does not limit the authority of any county, city, village, or town to enact smoking ordinances that protect the public's health and comfort.

### ***Penalties***

Generally, a forfeiture of not more than \$10 is imposed for a willful violation of the law's provisions. A forfeiture of up to \$50 may be imposed for a willful violation of the law prohibiting smoking in or near the Capitol.

## **Senate Bill 181**

### ***Areas Where Smoking is Prohibited; Elimination of Designated Smoking Areas***

Under the bill, smoking areas at indoor locations may no longer be designated, resulting in a complete ban on indoor smoking at those locations. In addition to the specified indoor locations listed under current law, the bill prohibits smoking in any public place or place of employment. The bill defines "a place of employment" to be any indoor place that employees normally frequent during the course of employment, such as an office, a work area, an employee lounge, a restroom, a conference

room, a meeting room, a classroom, or a hallway. The bill also defines a "public place" to be a place that is open to the public, regardless of whether a fee is charged or a place to which the public has lawful access or may be invited. In addition, the bill defines an "enclosed place" for purposes of determining at what locations smoking is prohibited. An enclosed place must have a roof and two or more substantial walls.

### ***Exemptions***

The bill would not prohibit smoking in the following areas:

1. Private residences.
2. A limited number of designated rooms in lodging establishments.
3. Certain residence rooms in assisted living facilities.

This bill eliminates the exemptions on the prohibition against smoking in bowling centers, taverns, certain restaurants, halls used for private functions, rooms in which the main occupants are smokers, and areas of facilities that are used to manufacture or assemble goods, products, or merchandise.

### ***Prohibition on Smoking in Outside Areas***

This bill makes no changes to the specific prohibitions on smoking outside, but adds a general prohibition against smoking outside within less than a reasonable distance from any entrance into a building, an openable window, or a ventilation opening that draws air inside.

The bill also specifically prohibits smoking in sports arenas and bus shelters, regardless of whether they meet the definition of "enclosed place."

### ***Requirements Placed on Person in Charge***

This bill requires that persons in charge of places where smoking is prohibited enforce the prohibitions by taking certain steps to ensure compliance, such as asking a person who is smoking to leave, and refusing to serve the person if the place is a restaurant, tavern, or private club.

### ***Local Authority to Regulate Smoking***

The bill retains current local authority to regulate smoking.

### ***Penalties***

This bill imposes forfeitures on persons in charge who fail to take the measures required in the bill.

A person who smokes in an area where smoking is prohibited is subject to the following forfeitures:

1. Not less than \$25 nor more than \$50 for the first violation.
2. Not less than \$50 nor more than \$100 for the second violation.
3. Not less than \$100 nor more than \$250 for the third or any subsequent violation.

A "person in charge" who fails to take steps to ensure compliance is subject to the following forfeitures; each day of violation is a separate forfeiture:

1. Not less than \$50 nor more than \$00 for the first violation.
2. Not less than \$100 nor more than \$200 for the second violation.
3. Not less than \$200 nor more than \$500 for the third or any subsequent violation.

### ***Effective Date***

The bill takes effect on the first day of the third month beginning after publication.

### **Senate Substitute Amendment 1**

Senate Substitute Amendment 1 makes the following changes to the bill:

***Tobacco bars; retail tobacco stores:*** The substitute amendment permits smoking in retail tobacco stores that are in existence on the effective date of the bill and continue to remain in the same location after the effective date. The substitute amendment permits smoking in tobacco bars that are in existence as of the effective date of this bill. A tobacco bar is a tavern that generates 15% or more of its gross income from the on-premise sale of cigars and tobacco for pipes. Vending machine sales are not included in this percentage. A tobacco store is a retail establishment that does not have a Class B liquor or beer license and generates 75% or more of its gross annual income from the sale of tobacco products and accessories (cigarettes are not included).

***Lodging establishments:*** The substitute amendment removes the provision permitting designation of not more than 25% of the guest rooms as smoking rooms.

***Enclosed places:*** The substitute amendment modifies the definition of an enclosed place to be a structure or area with a roof and more than two substantial walls.

***Outdoor locations:*** The substitute amendment removes the provision that prohibits smoking less than a reasonable distance from operable entrances, openable windows, or ventilation openings in certain enclosed places or sports arenas.

***Local authority:*** Under the substitute amendment, local authority to regulate smoking is modified. Under the substitute amendment, if a county, city, village, or town enacts any ordinance regulating or prohibiting *outside* smoking, the ordinance may apply only to public property under the entity's jurisdiction. In addition, the ordinance must provide that the person in charge of a restaurant, tavern, private club, or retail establishment location in an area subject to the ordinance may designate an outside area that is within a reasonable distance from any entrance to the establishment, where customers employees, and other associated persons may smoke. The ordinance may not define the term "reasonable distance" or set any specified measured distance as being a "reasonable distance."

**Penalties:** The substitute amendment establishes a forfeiture for violation of the smoking prohibition of not less than \$100 nor more than \$250 for each violation.

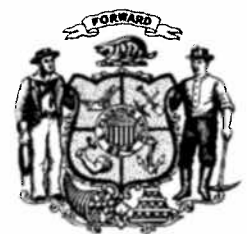
The substitute amendment provides that anyone in charge who violates the "person in charge" provisions is subject to a forfeiture of \$100 for each violation. However, the substitute amendment requires that a warning notice be issued for the first violation; and provides that no forfeitures may exceed \$100 in total for all violations occurring on a single day.

**Effective date:** The substitute amendment creates a delayed effective date of July 5, 2010.

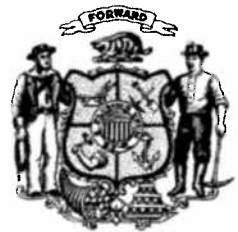

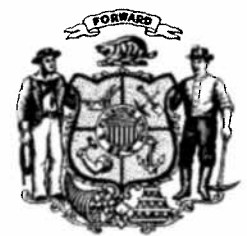

- Provide an exemption for current cigar bars that generate 15 percent or more of their annual gross income from the on-site sale of cigars and tobacco for pipes.
- Provide an exemption for current tobacco retailers that generate 75 percent or more of their annual gross income from the on-site retail sale of tobacco products and accessories

On Friday, the Senate Health, Health Insurance, Privacy, Property Tax Relief, and Revenue Committee and the Assembly Health and Healthcare Reform Committee approved this substitute amendment with bipartisan support. This legislation and substitute amendment have now been scheduled for floor debate on Wednesday, May 13.

Put simply, this agreement will protect workers across the state from the dangers of secondhand smoke while fulfilling their right to breathe clean, smoke free air. As a result, the American Cancer Society (ACS) strongly supports this substitute amendment and asks that you vote yes for this amendment and yes on the bill on Wednesday. Most importantly, ACS opposes any efforts to weaken this agreement on the floor and asks that you vote to table any amendments that would have this impact.

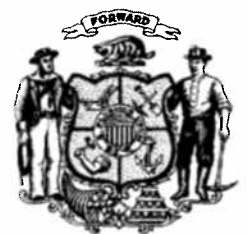
