Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Under current law, except with convictions for certain serious crimes, the sentencing judge may withhold an individual's sentence or impose a sentence and stay its execution, and in either case place the individual on probation. The judge may impose any conditions that are reasonable and appropriate on the person to meet their needs for punishment or rehabilitation, including community service. The convicted person has the right to refuse to be placed on probation and opt instead for imprisonment.

This bill would not permit an individual to refuse to be placed on probation or refuse any condition of probation, except if the judge orders a person to perform community service as part of their probation. The individual and the public agency or charitable organization would still need to agree to the terms of the community service under this bill.

The Department is unable to determine how many individuals would be required to be placed on probation as a result of passage of this bill that would have instead chosen to refuse probation or a condition of probation and be sentenced to a county jail to serve their sentence under current law. It can be assumed that most individuals who have refused probation in the past were placed in a county jail to serve their sentence. This bill will likely reduce the number of jail bed days served, and increase the number of offenders placed on probation.

The average FY11 annual cost for an offender on probation was \$2,900. The annual cost for an inmate in a county jail is approximately \$18,300.
