The Assembly met in the Assembly Chamber located in the State Capitol. Pursuant to Section 13.02 of the Wisconsin Statutes and Assembly Rule 5, the Assembly was called to order by the Chief Clerk of the 2009-2010 session, Patrick Fuller.

The prayer was offered by Father Robert A. Wild, president of Marquette University in Milwaukee:

“On this day of new beginnings, rightly we pause to call upon our God, to bless the work of this new session of the Wisconsin State Assembly. For its newest members we are grateful, Lord, for their desire to dedicate themselves in this way to the service of their fellow citizens. May this gift of wisdom help the members of this Assembly to make thoughtful and wise decisions. May it enable them patiently to give ear to the divergent voices of their fellow citizens, not least to those of the weak and powerless. May this wisdom give them the courage to do what is right for the sake of the common good, to govern in justice, to serve always with honesty and integrity.

May this great gift of wisdom be present during all the debates that will take place in this chamber, enabling its members even in the heat of political battle to fight fairly and strongly for their views even while remaining respectful of those who differ with them. Thank you, Lord, for your continued care for these public servants; help them individually and collectively to accomplish great things in

service of the people of this State. For all this we pray and let us say amen.”

OATH OF OFFICE

The bible used today to swear in the Members of the Wisconsin State Assembly is being accompanied by Dr. Ellsworth Brown of the Wisconsin Historical Society.

This bible was used to swear in the very first Governor of Wisconsin, Henry Dodge. Congress organized the Territory of Wisconsin on July 3, 1836, when Michigan became a state. The following day, John S. Horner, Secretary of the former Michigan Territory, was sworn in as Secretary of Wisconsin Territory, and on that same Independence Day, Horner used this bible to administer the oath of office to the newly appointed Governor of Wisconsin, Henry Dodge, at Mineral Point. In the same ceremony, Horner used this bible to swear in three of Wisconsin's new Supreme Court judges, William C. Frasier, David Irvin and Charles Dunn (father-in-law of the first Governor of the State of Wisconsin, Nelson Dewey). This historic bible, published in 1829, marks the very beginning of Wisconsin's government.

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 28 of the Wisconsin Constitution, the Honorable Justice David Prosser, Jr. of the Wisconsin Supreme Court administered the oath of office to the members en masse.

REMARKS BY THE SPEAKER

“On November 2nd, the silent majority spoke. They don’t represent any special interest group, but what they do represent is the growing frustration about where we are heading as a country and state. They aren’t thrilled with republicans. They’re not thrilled with democrats. There have been failed policies on both sides. They demanded that we put our differences aside and move this state forward.

What makes a state exceptional is its people, not its government. Those of you taking the oath today will represent those people with your own skill set, your own experience and your own beliefs. The focus of this session must be to put people back to work and to bring fiscal prosperity back to this state. First thing is first. We must stop spending more money than we are taking in. This will be, I believe, the most difficult session anyone in this body will ever serve. But I believe it will be the most rewarding. Looking at the upcoming session reminds me of a quote I once read by Winston Churchill, “A pessimist sees the difficulty in every opportunity. An optimist sees the opportunity in every difficulty”. In order to get people back to work, we must stop the assault on business. We need to make Wisconsin competitive again. There is no single bill that will jump-start our economy. In fact, the single most important thing we can do as a body is to change the tone of the debate. Private investment is critical to new companies starting and existing companies expanding. Right now, that investment capital is sitting on the sidelines. Wisconsin cannot have tax policy that increases taxes on small businesses and job creators and expect them to grow and expand. Wisconsin cannot have a permitting process that empowers bureaucrats to slow or stop business expansion and expect private development to fight through a maze of red tape. We must not only compete with the states around us but also in the global market. Wisconsin needs to view its economic engine, the private sector, as an ally and not an adversary.

I do not expect us to agree on everything, however I hope there will be fresh ideas to move us forward. I am confident many of those ideas will come from our enormous class of new legislators, republicans and democrats. Nearly one third of this body is being sworn in for the first time. To the freshman class of 2011, welcome, enjoy this day with your families. Then put on your seatbelts. This is going to be a wild two year ride. But at the end of the day, I am confident you will be proud of your accomplishments.

Together all us in this room can make this 100th session not just memorable, but effective and meaningful. My door is always open. It is my goal to have us communicate on a personal level and not on a partisan one. I look forward to working with you all. Thank you and God bless us all.”

The Government Accountability Board staff has received a number of inquiries concerning the last day on which the Legislature may act to ensure that a proposed constitutional amendment can be placed on the ballot for the April 5, 2011 spring election. The Legislature must complete action on a proposed constitutional amendment no later than Tuesday, February 22, 2011.

By statute, all proposed constitutional amendments and any other measure or question that is to be submitted to a vote of the people shall be filed with the official or agency responsible for preparing the ballots for the election no later than 42 days before the election at which the amendment, measure or question will appear on the ballot. §8.37 Wis. Stats. Tuesday, February 22, 2011 is 42 days before the April 5, 2011 spring election.

In order for the legislative action to be filed in our office, it is sufficient for the chief clerks to notify our office by e-mail no later than Tuesday, February 22, 2011 the Legislature passed the resolution. It is not necessary that we receive the signed

resolution by the close of business on Tuesday, February 22, 2011.

In order to facilitate preparation for the April 2011 spring election, I suggest sponsoring legislators contact the office of the Attorney General to make arrangements for the preparation of the explanatory statement required by §10.01 (2)(c) Wis. Stats. The explanatory statement is published in the paper by the county clerk immediately before the election. It is also posted at the polling place on Election Day.

Please make the appropriate arrangements to ensure that this information is communicated to the members of the Legislature. If you or any member of the Legislature has a question, please contact my Elections Division Administrator, Nat Robinson, at 608-267-0715 or ask to speak to one of our Elections Specialists.

Executive Order Number 1

Relating to a Special Session of the Legislature

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin is in an economic emergency caused by years of mismanagement; and

WHEREAS, the business climate in Wisconsin has for too long been stifled by burdensome regulation, taxes and costly litigation; and

WHEREAS, the people of Wisconsin elected me Governor to help create a new, healthy, and vibrant climate for private sector job creation;

Now therefore, I, SCOTT WALKER, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, pursuant to Article IV, Section 11 and Article V, Section 4 of the Wisconsin Constitution, do hereby require the convening of a special session of the Legislature at the Capitol in Madison, beginning at 10:00 A.M. on January 4, 2011, solely to consider and act upon legislation relating to the following:

1. Creation of an authority, to be known as the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation, and making appropriations;

2. An income and franchise tax credit for small businesses.

3. Income and franchise tax exemptions for new businesses, providing an exemption from emergency rule procedures, and granting rule-making authority;

4. Adopting federal law as it relates to health savings accounts for state income and franchise tax purposes and providing a penalty;

5. Requiring a supermajority for passage of tax increase legislation;

6. The authority of a state agency to promulgate rules interpreting the provisions of a statute enforced or administered by the agency and to implement or enforce any standard, requirement, or threshold as a term or condition of a license issued by the state agency; gubernatorial approval of proposed administrative rules; economic impact analyses of proposed rules and emergency rules; and venue in a declaratory judgement action seeking judicial review of the validity of an administrative rule and in an action in which the sole defendant is the state; exemptions from water quality certification and wetland mitigation requirements for certain nonfederal wetlands that are less than two acres in size; requirements for wind energy systems, providing an exemption from emergency rule procedures, and granting rule-making authority; and

Limiting noneconomic damages awarded in actions against long-term care providers; action against manufacturers, distributors, sellers, and promoters of certain products; confidentiality of health care services reviews; use as evidence of information regarding health care providers; reporting of quality indicators identifying individual hospitals; homicide or injury by negligent handling of a dangerous weapon, explosives, or fire; criminal abuse of individuals at risk; criminal abuse and neglect of patients and residents; evidence of lay and expert witnesses; damages for frivolous claims; and punitive damage awards.

Executive Order Number 2

**Relating to the Creation of the Governor's
Commission on Waste, Fraud and Abuse**

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's biennial budget has increased 33 percent to \$62 billion during Governor Doyle's two terms in office;

WHEREAS, a Pew Center for the States study found that Wisconsin is currently one of the nation's 10 states in the most perilous fiscal condition;

WHEREAS, waste, fraud and abuse in state government has gone largely unchecked during the last 8 years as evidenced by the following:

1. According to figures released by the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development, fraudulent unemployment insurance claims rose from \$4.7 million in 2007 to \$17.7 million in 2009 while overpayments that did not result from fraud rose from \$13.4 million to \$33.4 million.

2. According to a report by the Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau, fraud in the Wisconsin Shares child care program cost the state \$20 million in 2008 due to problems like illegal immigrants receiving compensation and false child care logs.

3. According to federal data, while enrollment in Wisconsin's food stamp program, FoodShare, doubled to 700,000 between 2003 and 2008, fraud investigations fell from 5,400 to 3,200. Minnesota and Michigan performed at least 85% more fraud investigations and while Wisconsin prosecuted 20 fraud cases in 2007, Minnesota prosecuted over 1,000 and Michigan, 2,400.

4. According to a report by the Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau, the state paid \$66.5 million in overtime wages in

2008, with 25 state employees earning more than \$50,000 in overtime.

5. According to a 2007 Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau report, the Doyle Administration officials halted an incomplete IT overhaul at the Department of Workforce Development after five years of work and \$23.6 million. Another \$28.2 million was spent on the Department of Revenue's Integrated Tax System and \$26 million on the University of Wisconsin payroll system before the state abandoned both projects.

6. The Wisconsin voter database required by the federal Help American Vote Act (HAVA) suffered delays and cost overruns, ultimately costing \$14.1 million. Once completed, the Government Accountability Board request \$1 million annually to maintain it.

7. In 2007, the Department of Health Services announced that an upgrade of the state's computer system that processes claims for BadgerCare, SeniorCare and other Medicaid programs was 39,000 worker hours behind schedule and at least \$9.3 million over budget – 28.8% more than the original projections.

8. According to a 2009 Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Report, the Doyle Administration was off by nearly \$100 million when it estimated in 2005 that consolidating state computer servers would cost \$12.8 million. With costs exceeding \$100 million, the administration announced plans to stop tracking expenditures in June, 2010;

WHEREAS, Wisconsin has the nation's 10th worst tax climate for business according to the Washington, D.C.-based Tax Foundation and Wisconsin's total tax burden ranks 14th, with taxpayers paying 5 percent more than the national average, according to U.S. Census Bureau Data;

WHEREAS, reducing Wisconsin's unsustainable tax burden requires reining in runaway government spending by making government smaller and ending the practice of deficit spending;

Now therefore, I, Scott Walker, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this State, and specifically by Wis. Stat. s. 14.019., do hereby:

Establish the Governor's Commission on Waste, Fraud and Abuse; and

1. Provide that the Commission shall consist of seven members consisting of the following:

a. One member serving at the pleasure of the Governor who shall represent private employers in Wisconsin, and who shall also be the Chairperson of the Commission;

b. A second member serving at the pleasure of the Governor;

c. The Secretary of the Department of Administration or his or her designee;

d. One member of the majority party and one member of the minority party in each house of the Legislature, appointed in the same manner as members of standing committees are appointed; and

2. Provide that the Commission shall have the following mission:

a. To identify waste, fraud and abuse in state government programs and state appropriations and recommend solutions.

b. To obtain and review all budget documentation for each state agency, including detailed information regarding the appropriations and programs administered and the related personnel costs.

c. To advise the governor about the long and short-term impact of the Commission's recommendations on state appropriations, efforts to make government smaller and more efficient, and ongoing economic development initiatives; and

3. Require the Commission to meet no later than seven days after this Executive Order has been deposited with the Secretary of State; and

4. Require the Commission to submit a report to the Governor with its findings and recommendations on July 1, 2011 and on January 1, 2012, and provide that the Commission shall dissolve when its final report is accepted by the Governor.

The Wisconsin State Legislature is to be commended for taking steps to address a dangerous and costly threat to Wisconsin's children. In spring 2010, the Wisconsin State Legislature approved Senate Joint Resolution 65 (SJR65) calling for the Wisconsin Childhood Lead Poisoning Elimination Implementation and Oversight Committee (IOC) within the Department of Health Services, to report on three lead poisoning elimination components: 1) ways to evaluate the costs borne by Wisconsin's educational and criminal justice systems attributable to childhood lead poisoning; 2) alternative methods to prevent lead poisoning and abating lead paint hazards in housing; and 3) various sources of funds to achieve those goals.

Senate Joint Resolution 65 requires the IOC to submit its report to the legislature's standing committees dealing with the public health and welfare of Wisconsin citizens. Due to the prevalence and severe impact of lead poisoning in Wisconsin, this report also is being shared with all Wisconsin legislators. For Wisconsin, the cost benefit of ending lead poisoning amounts to billions of dollars.

Each year, more than 1,500 children across Wisconsin are identified with lead poisoning. Lead-poisoned children are found in all 72 counties and 11 Tribal communities in the state. There are undoubtedly more lead-poisoned children who have not been identified because they have not been tested. Wisconsin can prevent the lead poisoning of children by controlling lead-based paint hazards in Wisconsin homes built before 1950, which are the primary source of poisoning. Over time, chipping and peeling lead-based paint creates dust, especially on windows, floors and porches that gets on children's hands and into their mouths.

Lead poisoning causes permanent brain damage that research has linked to reduced school performance, juvenile delinquency, adult criminality and life-long physical health problems. As a result, society is faced with increased costs in special education services, criminal justice, medical services, and other harder to measure outcomes like teen pregnancy due to lack of behavioral control.

The IOC, including public and private partners, is committed to eliminating childhood lead poisoning. On behalf of the Implementation and Oversight Committee, we thank you for your interest in creating a solution that eliminates lead poisoning among our children.

In accordance with Section 51.06 (8), Wisconsin Statutes, enclosed is a copy of the report on people relocated and diverted from nursing homes, intermediate care facilities for the mentally retarded (ICFs-MR), and State Centers for the

Developmentally Disabled in state fiscal year (SFY) 2010. This report provides information related to four programs, the ICF-MR Restructuring Initiative, Relocations from the State Centers for the Developmentally Disabled, the Community Relocation Initiative, and the Nursing Home Diversion Initiative.

The Department's relocation and diversion programs have been highly successful, providing the opportunity in SFY10 for 898 elderly individuals and people with physical and developmental disabilities to live in community based settings, who otherwise would have resided in ICFs-MR and nursing facilities. Since FY 2006, approximately 3,940 elders and people with physical and developmental disabilities have successfully relocated from institutional settings and an additional 812 individuals were diverted from admission to a nursing home through the Department's programs. The quality of life for these 4,752 individuals has been enhanced through the opportunity to live in the community and be near family and friends and more fully involved in community activities.

Highlights of the relocation and diversion initiatives include:

- 735 people with developmental disabilities, many of whom resided in institutions for decades, moved to the community and participated in community activities that were not available to them when they resided in institutions.
- 2,187 frail elders who resided in nursing facilities chose to live in the community near their families and friends. Prior to this initiative, these people would have been on a waiting list for home and community-based care, and few would have had the opportunity to return to the community.

Protecting and promoting the health and safety of the people of Wisconsin

- 1,018 people with physical disabilities chose to live in the community where they were able to access community activities, rather than live in nursing facilities.
- People with developmental disabilities have been served in the community at a cost that is within the institutional budget for this population.
- Frail elders and people with physical disabilities are being served in the community at a cost below that of institutional care, resulting in a level of savings under the Medical Assistance Program in SFY 2010 of \$5.9 million for the people relocated during the year.
- 567 elders and 245 people with physical disabilities, who were determined to be at imminent risk of having to move to a nursing facility, were able to remain in community-based settings because diversion funding was made available.

I am writing to report that, after six months in operation, BadgerCare Plus Basic is financially solvent and successfully meeting the health care needs of 5,066 Wisconsin residents.

This letter and the attached statistics fulfill the Department's legislative reporting requirements for Basic under section 49.67 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

With the successful launch of BadgerCare Plus Basic on July 1, 2010, uninsured Wisconsin residents gained another option for health care access. Basic was created to provide an affordable coverage choice to those on the waitlist for the BadgerCare Plus Core Plan. Core enrollment was capped in October 2009 due to limited federal funding. The Core wait list was established at that time.

For \$130 per month, Basic provides access to ten doctor's visits per year, a comprehensive generic drug benefit, one inpatient hospital stay and five outpatient hospital procedures before a hospital deductible is applied. Other professional medical services are also covered. Though the plan's benefits are very limited, Basic provides protection and peace of mind for those who have no other access to health insurance. Basic is self-funded, and state taxpayers pay nothing to support the program.

Per the specific reporting requirements identified in s. 49.67 (9g), claims payments for Basic totaled \$3,203,769 through December 13, 2010. Premium revenue totaling \$3,451,680 had been collected as of the same date. Additional reserve revenue of \$1 million remains available to support Basic through the federal State Health Access Program (SHAP) grant administered by the Health Resource Services Administration (HRSA). In short, BadgerCare Plus Basic is solvent after its first six months of operation.

In August, DHS notified members already enrolled in Basic of opportunities to pay premiums in advance at a discounted rate. Advance payments reduce adverse selection by increasing member longevity in the plan. Beginning with the October 2010 benefit month, Basic members have options to pay a \$360 quarterly premium, a \$660 semi-annual premium or a \$1,200 annual premium. More than 1,200 existing members have opted to make an advance premium payment.

No changes to premiums or provider payment rates have been implemented since the program began on July 1, 2010. Effective January 1, 2011, Basic benefits and cost-sharing are being adjusted as follows:

- Co-payments for brand name prescriptions are increasing from \$5 to \$10.
- Radiology co-payments, tiered at \$5 and \$20, will be implemented.
- Vaccination co-payments of \$10 will be implemented.
- Covered emergency room visits will be reduced from five to two per enrollment year.

As of December 14, 5,066 people were enrolled in BadgerCare Plus Basic. Member demographic information, including age, gender and county of residence, is attached. Enrolling in Basic requires beginning an application for the BadgerCare Plus Core Plan online at access.wi.gov or by phone. That process involves reporting income and insurance information to determine if the applicant is eligible to be added to the Core waitlist. Since enrollment for Basic began, 876 Basic applicants were determined ineligible at the point of applying for the Core waitlist.

Once individuals have enrolled, the Basic verification process uses a variety of wage, income and insurance databases to verify the information members have reported. Disparities trigger DHS follow-up and potential disenrollment. As of September 15, DHS had determined 91 individuals ineligible for Basic due to other insurance.

In July, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approved the Department's amendment to the Core Plan waiver to create a waitlist bypass into Core for Basic members based on medical severity. This policy allows Basic members to be tracked into a benefit more appropriate to their health care needs. The initial medical criterion for this policy was a cancer diagnosis. This month, the Department expanded the criteria to include severe cardiac conditions. More than 100 Basic members have transitioned to Core as a result of these policies. Other Basic members are being transitioned to Well Woman Medicaid and SSI Medicaid, as appropriate.

In its second quarter of operation, BadgerCare Plus Basic continues to be an important and successful link to health care for thousands of Wisconsin residents.

In 1997 Act 27, the 1997-99 Biennial Budget, the Legislature established requirements in state law intended to strengthen protections for children and vulnerable adults in organized care settings. The provisions require, among other things, that designated caregivers conduct background checks on all new and existing staff and bar them from employing anyone who has committed certain crimes or acts. Effective July 1, 2008, the Department of Health and Family Services (DHFS) became the Department of Health Services (DHS) and the DHFS Division of Children and Family Services became the Department of Children and Families (DCF) as a result of 2007 Act 20 (the 2007-09 biennial budget bill). DHS, DCF and (for certain child care providers) counties and local school boards must perform checks on a provider before issuing a

license or other credential. Individuals who have committed prohibited crimes or acts may apply to DHS and/or DCF, counties, or school boards for a waiver of the employment or licensing bans upon evidence of rehabilitation.

Sections 48.685 (5g) and 50.065 (5g) of the Wisconsin Statutes direct DHS and DCF to submit an annual report to the legislature that specifies the number of persons who have sought waivers of employment or licensing bans by requesting to demonstrate that they have been rehabilitated. The report must also specify the number of requests that were approved and the reasons for the success or failure of the requests. DHS has continued to utilize the skills, support and knowledge of its personnel to process all rehabilitation review applications and we are, therefore, submitting a joint report. Attached is the report for 2010.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002 (11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172 (3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet

payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of November 2010.

On November 1, 2010, the Worker's Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$1.6 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through November 16, 2010, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$45 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On November 1, 2010, the Mediation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$35 thousand. This negative balance continued through November 19, 2010, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$300 thousand. The Mediation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$52 thousand on November 18, 2010. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On November 22, 2010, the Police and Fire Protection Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$47.6 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through November 30, 2010, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$43.3 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The Worker's Compensation Fund, Mediation Fund, and Police and Fire Protection Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

Section 165.90 of the Wisconsin Statutes requires the Department of Justice to report on the performance of cooperative county-tribal law enforcement programs receiving aid under this section. This letter constitutes our report.

This marks the twenty-third year that the Department has awarded grants for cooperative county-tribal law enforcement programs. The statutes require counties and tribes to develop joint program plans. The Department requires plans to include resolutions of support for the plan adopted by county boards and tribal governing bodies, to signify cooperation and mutual commitment.

This program pays for a variety of law enforcement services to Native American communities across Wisconsin. Grants have been used for the costs of personnel, patrol, investigation, crime prevention, K-9 units, information technology, law enforcement training, alternatives to drug abuse and gang involvement, diversity training, cultural awareness education, and emergency/rescue equipment. An increasing number of grants are awarded to programs that include tribal police departments, generally helping to pay for

tribal liaison personnel and patrol services provided to Native American reservations and communities.

The amount appropriated for this program in State Fiscal Year 2010 was \$701,300. Grant funds come from tribal gaming receipts as appropriated in the biennial budget. For Calendar Year 2010, the Department issued 19 awards totaling \$701,300. These awards were in the following amounts:

Executive Order Number 4

Relating to a Special Session of the Legislature and Amending Executive Order # 1

WHEREAS, on January 3, 2011, I, Scott Walker, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by Executive Order #1, convened a special session of the Legislature at the State Capitol on January 4, 2011, at 10:00 a.m. solely to consider and act upon specified legislation;

Now therefore, I, SCOTT WALKER, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, pursuant to Article IV, Section 11 and Article V, Section 4 of the Wisconsin Constitution, hereby amend and supplement Executive Order #1 as follows:

1. In addition to considering the legislation previously specified, the Legislature shall consider and act upon legislation relating to increasing the amount of the credits under the economic development tax credit program; and

2. The tenth paragraph of Executive Order #1, which set forth matters to be considered and acted upon by the Legislature, shall be amended to state as follows:

6. The authority of a state agency to promulgate rules interpreting the provisions of a statute enforced or administered by the agency and to implement or enforce any standard, requirement, or threshold as a term or condition of a license issued by the state agency; gubernatorial approval of proposed administrative rules; economic impact analyses of proposed rules and emergency rules; venue in a declaratory judgment action seeking judicial review of the validity of an administrative rule and in an action in which the sole defendant is the state; requirements for wind energy systems; an exemption from water quality standards for wetlands and from certain other regulatory provisions concerning water quality and surface water use that apply to a wetland area in Brown County; review of certain changes to shoreland, wetland, and floodplain zoning ordinances that apply to a wetland area in Brown County; providing an exemption from emergency rule procedures; and granting rule-making authority.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002 (11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172 (3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the “temporary reallocation of balances” authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of December 2010.

On December 13, 2010, the General Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$14.4 million. The fund’s cash balance increased to a positive \$44 thousand on December 14, 2010. On December 30, 2010, the General Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$213.8 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through December 31, 2010, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$109.0 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On December 17, 2010, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$6.5 million. This negative balance continued through December 31, 2010, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$180.0 million (its intra-month low). The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On December 1, 2010, the Police and Fire Protection Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$43.3 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through December 31, 2010, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$39.2 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On December 17, 2010, the Petroleum Inspection Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$5.0 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued intermittently through December 31, 2010, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$804 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund, Medical Assistance Trust Fund, Police and Fire Protection Fund, and Petroleum Inspection Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund’s share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller’s Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority and, as

a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

We have completed an evaluation of the Wisconsin Veterans Homes, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. The homes are administered by the Department of Veterans Affairs (DVA). As of December 2009, they provided skilled nursing or assisted living care to a total of 887 veterans and their spouses. In fiscal year (FY) 2008-09, the homes' combined expenditures totaled \$89.7 million. Operating expenditures increased by 64.2 percent during the five-year period we reviewed, largely because Union Grove opened a new skilled nursing facility in September 2006.

We identified significant financial and program management issues at the veterans homes. For example, operating expenditures have exceeded revenues in four of the past five fiscal years, and the homes remain solvent largely because of a one-time Medical Assistance reimbursement rate adjustment of \$20.1 million received in FY 200506 for care provided at King. Staffing requirements established by state and federal law have been met, but the homes have relied on overtime and limited-term employees to help address long-term staffing needs. Funding for the Aid to Indigent Veterans program, which assists veterans who cannot afford the full cost of assisted living care, has also increased significantly, and the program operates under policies that have frequently changed and are unclear. In a review of 20 participants' files, we found 4 instances in which eligibility had not been appropriately assessed.

The veterans homes purchased \$17.0 million in goods and services in FY 2008-09. We found numerous violations of state purchasing requirements in the documentation we reviewed, including noncompliance with prescribed

procedures, expenditures made outside of statutory and budgetary authority, and inadequate oversight and monitoring. Turnover in key leadership positions has hampered oversight of veterans homes operations, and because of the homes' projected operating deficits in FY 2010-11, which we reported in August 2010, continuing legislative oversight will be important.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DVA in completing this evaluation. DVA's response follows the appendices.

We have completed our financial audit of the University of Wisconsin (UW) System for the years ended June 30, 2010 and 2009. UW System's financial statements and our unqualified audit opinion on them, dated December 10, 2010, have been included in UW System's 2010 Annual Financial Report, which is enclosed. This report will be presented to the UW Board of Regents at its meetings on February 10 and 11.

UW System unrestricted net assets, which represent the amount available to be used to meet ongoing obligations, increased by \$120.2 million to \$502.7 million as of June 30, 2010. According to UW System officials, these funds have been designated by the Board of Regents for purposes to fulfill UW System's responsibilities, including academic and research programs and capital projects.

General Purpose Revenue (GPR), which is shown as State Appropriations on UW System's financial statements, decreased 3.7 percent, from \$1,012.1 million in fiscal year (FY) 2008-09 to \$974.4 million in FY 2009-10. This funding

does not include GPR funding that is used to repay debt on academic facilities, which is technically debt of the State of Wisconsin and not UW System. Such debt service payments totaled \$52.7 million for FY 2009-10 and \$123.9 million for FY 2008-09.

Operating revenues increased by \$237.7 million, or 8.3 percent, from FY 2008-09. Federal grants and contracts revenue accounted for the largest portion of this change, increasing from \$733.4 million in FY 2008-09 to \$813.3 million in FY 2009-10. We also note that tuition and fees increased by \$73.1 million.

UW System's total operating expenses were \$4.1 billion in FY 2009-10. Operating expenses increased by \$92.5 million, or 2.3 percent from FY 2008-09. Salaries and fringe benefits increased by \$67.5 million and supplies and services expenditures decreased by \$27.3 million. Salaries and fringe benefits represented 66.7 percent of all UW System operating costs, while supplies and services accounted for 25.0 percent.

Enclosed is a management letter, which includes an auditor's report on compliance and internal control over financial reporting, as required by Government Auditing Standards. This letter was provided to the UW System and includes four internal control concerns we identified during our audit and that are required to be reported under these standards.

In response to a complaint reported to the Fraud, Waste, and Mismanagement Hotline established by 2007 Wisconsin Act 126, we have completed a limited-scope review of the Wisconsin Technical College System's (WTCS's) Workforce Advancement Training grant program. The program was created in 2005 Wisconsin Act 25 to help address training needs of Wisconsin businesses and enhance skills of the workforce. Concerns were raised about the adequacy of controls over the use of program funds.

From the program's inception through the end of the current biennium, in June 2011, \$14.9 million in general purpose revenue has been appropriated for short-term customized training services provided by the technical college districts. According to an October 2010 report released by WTCS, 352 training grants were awarded from July 2007 through June 2010, which the districts reported using to train approximately 37,900 employees in businesses statewide.

We reviewed both the process WTCS uses to solicit, review, award, and monitor grants and 34 grant files from 4 of the 16 districts: Fox Valley Technical College, Waukesha County Technical College, Northcentral Technical College, and Madison Area Technical College (Madison College). We found that WTCS has established a competitive process to review districts' grant applications and has complied with these procedures in making awards to districts. However, we are concerned that districts have received reimbursement for costs not actually incurred and note that districts have had difficulty spending all available program funding. If the Legislature approves the continued program funding requested for the 2011-13 biennium, WTCS could take steps to ensure funds are used effectively and efficiently.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by WTCS and district staff in conducting this review.

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. 109.12 (2) and (3), I hereby submit the Department of Workforce Development's (DWD's) 2010 annual report on the administration and enforcement of Wis. Stat. 109.07 and 109.075. The report contains three attachments. The first attachment, Exhibit A, lists all employers in 2010 that notified DWD of business closing and mass layoffs planned in Wisconsin. The second attachment, Exhibit B, lists employers against whom DWD has received business closing or mass layoff notification complaints.

Business Closing or Mass Layoff Notification Cases

On January 1, 2010, the department had twenty-one (21) business closing or mass layoff cases pending either within DWD or at the Department of Justice (DOJ). Since January 1, 2010, seventeen (17) of those cases have been resolved. Three (3) of them were settled and two (2) were closed as uncollectible. Eleven (11) cases were closed as invalid complaints. Of the remaining four (4) cases, one (1) remains under investigation at the DWD and three (3) are at the DOJ in various stages of litigation.

During 2010, the department has received sixteen (16) new cases. Three (3) of these cases remain under investigation. Twelve (12) of these cases have been closed as invalid. One case was dismissed as uncollectible.

Overall in 2010, the departments collected more than \$525,000 in increased wages for 195 employees due to a combination of employers' failure to provide employees with advance notices of business closings or mass layoffs or unpaid final wages for these employees.

Healthcare Plan Cessation Notification Cases

On January 1, 2010, the department had five (5) healthcare plan cessation notification cases pending either at DWD or DOJ. Since January 1, 2010, two (2) of these cases were closed as invalid and one (1) case was settled. The remaining two (2) cases are with the DOJ in litigation.

During 2010 the department received four (4) new cases. DWD has complete its investigation of three (3) of these cases and determined they were invalid. The remaining case is under investigation.

The Community Integration Program (CIP) for residents of State Centers was created by 1983 Wisconsin Act 27. According to s. 46.275 of the Wisconsin statutes, this program is intended:

...to relocate persons from the state centers for the developmentally disabled into appropriate community settings with the assistance of home and community-based services and with continuity of care. The intent of the program is also to minimize its impact on state employees through redeployment of employees into vacant positions.

Under Wisconsin statutes s. 46.275 (5m), the Department is required to submit an annual report to the Joint Committee on Finance and to the Chief Clerk of each house of the Legislature describing the program's impact during the prior calendar year on state employees, including the Department's efforts to redeploy employees into vacant positions and the number of employees laid off.

During calendar year 2010, Southern Wisconsin Center and Central Wisconsin Center have relocated 5 center residents into the community under the CIP program. The Department was able to reduce funding for calendar year 2010 without employee layoffs and without redeploying employees into vacant positions as the result of these placements.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002 (11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172 (3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of January 2011.

On January 1, 2011, the General Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$123.2 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through January 4, 2011, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$814.7 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On January 1, 2011, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$172.4 million. This negative balance continued through January 31, 2011, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$204.5 million. The Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$208.6 million on January 13, 2011. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On January 19, 2011, the Democracy Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$300 thousand (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through January 31, 2011, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$300 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund, Medical Assistance Trust Fund, Police and Fire Protection Fund, Petroleum Inspection Fund, Conservation Fund, and Democracy Trust Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing

limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

In response to a complaint reported on the Fraud, Waste, and Mismanagement Hotline established by 2007 Wisconsin Act 126, we have completed a limited-scope review of the Department of Transportation's (DOT's) warranty program for asphalt state highways.

Concerns were raised about the quality of asphalt highways constructed under warranties. From 1995 through 2009, 184 such highways were constructed under warranties that guarantee pavements will meet contractually specified performance standards, typically for five years. If DOT determines that these standards have not been met, contractors can be required to perform and pay for repairs.

We reviewed all warranted asphalt state highway projects constructed from 2002 through 2004. Pavements on 12 of these 34 projects did not meet some performance standards during their warranty periods. However, because many inspection results were provided to DOT regional offices after warranties had expired, it is unclear whether contractors can now be required to repair identified problems.

We also compared the quality of 33 asphalt pavement projects constructed under warranties to that of all 215 asphalt pavement projects constructed on state highways during the same three year period. We found that the warranted projects generally show less distress—such as cracks, potholes, and ruts—and are smoother than those without warranties. However, some DOT engineers are concerned that warranted pavements constructed since 2004 are deteriorating more quickly than anticipated, particularly in northwest Wisconsin.

Because our May 2009 review of concrete state highways and several recent single audit reports for the State of Wisconsin found that DOT did not always follow its quality assurance program, we examined quality assurance procedures for asphalt state highways. We found that construction engineers performed 181 of the 193 tests (93.8 percent) required by DOT to measure the density of asphalt pavement on 41 projects constructed in 2009. We also found that DOT has improved its documentation of contractors' roughness measurements.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DOT in completing this review.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002 (11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172 (3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the “temporary reallocation of balances” authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of February 2011.

On February 1, 2011, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$199.5 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through February 28, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$194.7 million.

On February 1, 2011, the Police and Fire Protection Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$34.1 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through February 28, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$30.0 million.

On February 1, 2011, the Conservation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$14.5 million. This negative balance continued through February 28, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$22.5 million. The Conservation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$31.3 million on February 24, 2011.

On February 1, 2011, the Democracy Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$300 thousand. This negative balance continued through February 28, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$901 thousand (its intra-month low).

On February 22, 2011, the Support Collections Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2.6 million. This negative balance continued intermittently through February 28, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$1.1 million. The Support Collections Trust Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$3.3 million on February 23, 2011.

The Medical Assistance Trust Fund, Police and Fire Protection Fund, Conservation Fund, Democracy Trust Fund, and Support Collections Trust fund shortfalls were due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund’s share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller’s Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

In response to a 2010 request by the co-chairpersons of the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed a limited-scope review of the Public Sector Safety Program, which, under authority granted by s. 101.055, Wis. Stats., establishes and enforces occupational safety and health standards for state and local government employees in Wisconsin. The standards are to provide protections at least equal to those granted to private sector employees under the federal law that created the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). During the three year period we reviewed, the program was operated by the Department of Commerce. The Legislature is currently considering a proposal to reassign program responsibilities to the Department of Safety and Professional Services as part of the 2011-13 biennial budget bill.

In fiscal year (FY) 2009-10, the program was allocated 3.2 full-time equivalent inspection staff positions and spent a total of \$436,200 to investigate workplace safety and health complaints, provide consultations related to workplace safety and health, and perform periodic inspections of public employees’ workplaces. From FY 2007-08 through FY 2009-10, program staff investigated 30 of 44 complaints received and issued orders to correct concerns ranging from asbestos exposure and noncompliance with fire department safety and health standards to hazardous chemical exposure. Complaint investigations were generally timely, and program staff verified compliance with their correction orders.

Only limited data were available for assessing the frequency of workplace safety inspections or consultations that were not associated with complaints. Available data indicate that during the three-year period we reviewed, program staff conducted inspections or other visits to 102 public employers’ workplaces, but the reason for each inspection or visit, its outcome, and the nature of any follow-up activity were not readily available. Based on our review, we believe program efficiency could be improved by using the existing information systems more effectively to record complete information on complaint status, timing, follow-up actions, and inspections.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department of Commerce during the course of our review.

We have completed our annual financial and compliance audit of the State of Wisconsin. This audit satisfies state agencies' audit requirements under the federal Single Audit Act of 1984, as amended, and federal Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133. It also assists us in meeting audit requirements under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats.

This audit covers \$15.5 billion in federal financial assistance that state agencies administered in fiscal year 2009-10, including more than \$3.5 billion in assistance received under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. We

tested internal controls and a selection of expenditures for compliance with laws and regulations for 31 federal programs that were chosen for review using risk-based assessment criteria established by the federal government.

Our report contains the auditor's reports on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance with program requirements, and our unqualified audit opinion on the State of Wisconsin Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards. We also discuss the results of our follow-up to prior audit findings. Overall, state agencies have complied with federal grant requirements and have taken steps to address findings included in last year's single audit report. However, we report several new and continuing internal control deficiencies and areas of federal noncompliance. The federal government will contact state agencies to resolve the findings and questioned costs included in our report.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by state agency staff during our audit. Agencies' comments on individual findings, along with their corrective action plans to address our concerns, are included within the agency narratives.

As required under Section 13.48 (7), Wisconsin Statutes, I am submitting the Building Commission's recommended 2011-2013 State Building Program. The Building Commission reviewed state agency requests and adopted the recommendations contained in this document on March 16, 2011. Funding to support the recommended projects and programs totals \$1,017,684,300 and includes \$415,579,900 in new General Fund Supported Borrowing (GFSB).

In summary, the recommended 2011-2013 State Building Program emphasizes upgrading of existing state facilities rather than constructing new facilities. At the same time, the Governor and the Building Commission have put forward a Capital Budget that is aggressive, robust in terms of construction projects while being prudent in its use of the state's financial resources. I trust that the Legislature will agree with the Commission's recommendations and will support the priority projects the Commission has recommended for the next biennium. The staff of the Department of Administration will be available to assist you in any way possible in your review of these recommendations.

On March 1, 2011, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$192.3 million. This negative balance continued through March 31, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$221.2 million. The Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$222.9 million on March 24, 2011.

On March 1, 2011, the Police and Fire Protection Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$29.6 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through March 31, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$25.5 million.

On March 1, 2011, the Conservation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$21.6 million. This negative balance continued through March 15, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a positive \$23.5 million. The Conservation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$24.2 million on March 10, 2011.

On March 1, 2011, the Democracy Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$901 thousand. This negative balance continued through March 31, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$901 thousand.

On March 2, 2011, the Support Collections Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$4.3 million. This negative balance continued intermittently through March 10, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a positive \$1.1 million. The Support Collections Trust Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$5.4 million on March 7, 2011.

On March 25, 2011, the Environmental Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$54 thousand. This negative balance continued through March 31, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$170 thousand (its intra-month low).

On March 28, 2011, the Lottery Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$6.0 million. This negative balance continued through March 31, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$6.6 million (its intra-month low).

The Medical Assistance Trust Fund, Police and Fire Protection Fund, Conservation Fund, Democracy Trust Fund, Support Collections Trust Fund, Environmental Fund, and Lottery Fund shortfalls were due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund’s share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller’s Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

POINT OF ORDER

Representative Staskunas rose to a point of order that Assembly substitute amendment 2 to **Assembly Bill 7** was not germane under Assembly Rule 54 (3)(f).

Pursuant to a unanimous consent request by Representative Staskunas, his remarks have been entered into the Assembly Journal.

“Mr. Speaker, I didn’t want to rise on the point of order that Assembly Substitute Amendment 2 is not germane to Assembly Bill 7 under Assembly Rule 54. I felt I owed it to you.

Assembly Rule 54 (1) states, “The Assembly may not consider any Assembly amendment or Assembly substitute

amendment that relates to a different subject or is intended to accomplish a different purpose than that of the proposal to which it relates or that, if adopted and passed, would require a relating clause for the proposal which is substantially different from the proposal’s original relating clause or that would totally alter the nature of the proposal.”

The amendment’s relating clause is clearly substantially different. The original bill did not relate to late voter registration, a requirement for electors to provide a signature when voting in person at an election, the duration and location of residency for voting purposes, voting a straight party ticket, voter registration information, the statewide voter registration list, or voter registration activities. Those are seven items that were not in the original relating clause.

In addition to the dramatic changes to the relating clause, the amendment substantially expands the scope of the proposal in violation of Assembly Rule 54 (3)(f). The amendment repeals, amends or creates seventeen sections of the statutes that were not referenced in any way in the original bill. Discounting simple cross-references in the original bill, the amendment repeals, amends or creates twenty-five sections of the statutes that were not referenced in the original bill.

Since the amendment dramatically changes the relating clause while radically expanding the scope of the proposal, I hope that you will find the amendment not germane under Assembly Rule 54.”

RULING ON THE POINT OF ORDER

Speaker Pro Tempore Kramer ruled the point of order **not well taken**. The full text of the ruling by Speaker Pro Tempore Kramer follows:

“Representative Staskunas rose to the point of order that Assembly substitute 2 amendment to **Assembly Bill 7** was not germane to the original relating clause under Assembly Rule 54 (1) generally, and specifically rule 54 (3)(f).

Prefacing his ruling, as Assembly substitute amendment 1 was the bill under consideration by the Joint Finance Committee, and Assembly substitute amendment 2 was the bill under consideration by the full Assembly, Speaker Pro Tempore Kramer briefly explained that several items were removed from ASA 1 to become ASA 2:

- MOVE Act (federal military access)
- Moving the September partisan primary date
- ASA 2 defined residency
- ASA 2 provided conforming language on college identification

Speaker Pro Tempore Kramer ruled the point of order **not well taken** because the amendment under consideration did not expand the scope of the legislation, but rather narrowed the scope of the bill and was proper under Rule 54 (4)(c). The rule cited in the point of order [Rule 54 (1)] states, “The Assembly may not consider any assembly amendment or assembly substitute amendment that relates to a different subject or is intended to accomplish a different purpose than

that of the proposal to which it relates or that, if adopted and passed, would require a relating clause for the proposal which is substantially different from the proposal's original relating clause or that would totally alter the nature of the proposal.”

Specifically, Assembly substitute amendment 2, the successor legislation to Assembly substitute amendment 1, which was adopted in the Assembly Committee on Elections and Campaign Reform, doesn't accomplish a different purpose or relate to a different subject because of the fact that the purpose and subject of both the bill and the substitute amendment are to create a photo identification requirement for voting at elections. This is the primary purpose of the bill and the substitute amendment does not change this purpose at all. Thus Assembly substitute amendment 2 is also clearly germane and in accordance with Rule 54 (4)(b).

Further, the substitute amendment does not actually “require” a substantially different relating clause. Both the bill and the substitute amendment could have had a broader and more general relating clause that would have effectively described the subject of the bill and substitute amendment. Instead, it was the bill drafter's judgment to describe the bill and substitute amendment in greater detail. Each Legislative Reference Bureau drafter decides by his or her own judgment what amount of detail to include in a relating clause. And, different drafters have different approaches to constructing relating clauses. For example, Assembly Bill 86 relating to early release has a relating clause consisting of a grand total of three words. It is therefore reasonable to expect different drafters, on occasion, to use more extensive or descriptive relating clauses.

Nonetheless, it is ultimately up to the Assembly to determine the appropriateness of the relating clause for germaneness purposes under Rule 54.”

Representative Staskunas appealed the ruling of the Chair.

As required by 2009 Wisconsin Act 219, we have completed an evaluation of the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan administered by the Department of Health Services (DHS). The Basic Plan was established to provide temporary, unsubsidized health insurance for childless adults on a waiting list for the BadgerCare Plus Core Plan, a Medical Assistance program that imposed enrollment caps in October 2009. A total of 5,143 individuals were enrolled in the Basic Plan at some point during the six-month period we reviewed.

Statutes require the Basic Plan's insured benefits and administrative costs to be funded by premiums, although program costs may be subsidized by federal grant funding if it is available. Through December 2010, expenditures exceeded revenues by \$140,300, and the deficit would have been larger without \$1.1 million in federal State Health Access Program grant funding that may not be available in the future.

We identified numerous concerns that are affecting the Basic Plan's sustainability. Most notably, monthly premiums have been insufficient to cover services and administrative costs, services have been provided to individuals who were not enrolled in the plan, and enrollees have received services that are not covered under the plan. In addition, until recently DHS did little to verify the eligibility of applicants and enrollees. We also found that DHS had charged a total of \$878,800 in plan expenditures to two general purpose revenue appropriations, contrary to state law. DHS reversed these transactions when we raised concerns about them during our fieldwork.

DHS has taken recent steps to address the Basic Plan's deficit, including transferring 438 high-cost enrollees with diagnoses of cancer and cardiac conditions to the Core Plan. In addition, DHS suspended enrollment in the Basic Plan in March 2011 and increased the monthly premium from \$130 to \$200 beginning with June coverage. Despite these recent changes, concerns remain regarding the Basic Plan's sustainability. Therefore, DHS and the Legislature will need to consider how best to address the future of the plan, which is scheduled to sunset on January 1, 2014.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DHS in completing this evaluation.

As required by s. 13.94 (1)(em), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit and biennial program evaluation of the Wisconsin Lottery, which is administered by the Department of Revenue (DOR). We have issued an unqualified opinion on the Wisconsin Lottery's fiscal year (FY) 2009-10 and FY 2008-09 financial statements.

Sales of instant game and lotto tickets decreased 5.5 percent over the past five years, from \$509.1 million in FY 2005-06 to \$480.9 million in FY 2009-10. However, largely because of the introduction of a new multi-state lotto game, total sales increased 1.6 percent in FY 2009-10. From FY 2005-06 through FY 2009-10, gaming-related proceeds funded \$699.3 million in property tax relief.

As a management tool, the Wisconsin Lottery calculates ticket sales for each instant game for the first 12 weeks after its introduction, as well as each game's net sales, which reflect both ticket sales and the costs of production and prizes paid, but not product information expenditures. When we included product information expenditures, we found that net sales for 12 instant games that were introduced in FY 2008-09 were lower than net sales for 36 unpublicized games introduced during the same period. We include a recommendation that the Wisconsin Lottery report to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee later this year on how it proposes to measure the effects of its product information expenditures.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by Wisconsin Lottery staff in DOR. DOR's response follows our report.

“Mr. Speaker, I rise on the point of order that Assembly Substitute Amendment 1 to **Assembly Bill 96** is not germane under Assembly Rule 54 and may not be considered by the body.

As originally introduced, **Assembly Bill 96** was limited to the composition of the Board of Veterans Affairs, the transfer of the power to appoint the Secretary of Veterans Affairs from the Board to the Governor, and rule making authority. The substitute amendment makes those changes as outlined in the original bill.

However, the amendment also expands the scope of the bill by specifying that the Department of Veterans Affairs will no longer be under the direction and supervision of the Board but instead be under the direction and supervision of the Secretary. By fundamentally changing the authority of the Board over the Department in a way that was not referenced or even suggested in the original bill, the substitute amendment substantially expands the scope of the bill and is, therefore, not germane under Assembly Rule 54 (3)(f).

This expansion of the bill also required the drafting attorney to create two new sections of the statutes that were not created by the original bill. Specifically, I refer to sections 6 and 8 of Assembly Substitute Amendment 1 which would create sections 45.03 (2m) and 227.14 (2)(a)6m of the statutes, respectively. These sections were not necessary in the original bill because the original bill did not alter the direction and supervision of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

In addition, the substitute amendment substantially alters the relating clause by adding “direction and supervision of the Department of Veterans Affairs.” The direction and supervision of the department does not fall under the scope of the original relating clause, and the amendment is, therefore, prohibited under Assembly Rule 54 (1).

Mr. Speaker, you are the presiding officer. These are your rules. And your rules dictate that the amendment is not germane.”

RULING ON THE POINT OF ORDER

Speaker Pro Tempore Kramer ruled the point of order **not well taken**. The full text of the ruling by Speaker Pro Tempore Kramer follows:

“Representative Richards rose to the point of order that Assembly substitute amendment 1 to **Assembly Bill 96** was not germane to the original relating clause under Assembly Rule 54 (1) generally, and specifically rule 54 (3)(f).

Both **Assembly Bill 96** and Assembly substitute amendment 1 are intended to reform the constitution of the Department of Veterans Affairs and reform its relationship to

the Governor. As noted in Representative Richard’s point of order,

“As originally introduced, Assembly Bill 96 was limited to the composition of the Board of Veterans Affairs, the transfer of the power to appoint the Secretary of Veterans Affairs from the Board to the Governor, and rule making authority. The substitute amendment makes those changes as outlined in the original bill.

However, the amendment also expands the scope of the bill by specifying that the Department of Veterans Affairs will no longer be under the direction and supervision of the Board but instead be under the direction and supervision of the Secretary. By fundamentally changing the authority of the Board over the Department in a way that was not referenced or even suggested in the original bill, the substitute amendment substantially expands the scope of the bill and is, therefore, not germane under Assembly Rule (3)(f).”

Representative Richards’ own concerns are the basis for the following ruling:

Speaker Pro Tempore Kramer ruled the point of order **not well taken** because the amendment under consideration accomplishes the same purpose as the unamended **Assembly Bill 96** but in a different manner in accord with Assembly Rule 54 (4)(b).”

Representative Richards appealed the ruling of the Chair.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed the third in a series of analyses of the overtime costs of state agencies, which for the first time also includes the University of Wisconsin System. Our analysis focuses on premium overtime, which is typically earned by employees who staff facilities with 24-hour operations or address emergency needs. Premium overtime is typically paid at 1.5 times the employee’s hourly rate for hours in excess of 40 per week.

From 2006 to 2010, state agencies paid a total of \$297.5 million in premium overtime. After declining in 2009, premium overtime payments increased 2.5 percent in 2010. The Department of Corrections (DOC) and the Department of Health Services (DHS) continue to account for the largest share of overtime costs. Both agencies’ overtime payments increased from 2009 to 2010, although they declined over the five-year period we reviewed.

DOC and DHS have increasingly used surplus positions to control overtime costs and address staffing needs. Surplus positions are intended to be temporary, and statutes authorize their use when “necessary to maintain adequate staffing levels for high turnover classifications, in anticipation of attrition, to fill positions for which recruitment is difficult.” However, we are concerned that the increased use of surplus positions for purposes or periods that may not have been intended by the Legislature has had the effect of circumventing statutory controls on position authority, and that existing reporting mechanisms may not provide sufficient information for the exercise of legislative oversight.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by staff of the Office of State Employment Relations, the Department of Administration, DOC, DHS, University of Wisconsin System Administration, and other agencies reviewed.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002 (11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172 (3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the “temporary reallocation of balances” authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of April 2011.

On April 1, 2011, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$192.2 million. This negative balance continued through April 30, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$211.0 million. The Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$215.3 million on April 7, 2011.

On April 1, 2011, the Police and Fire Protection Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$25.5 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through April 30, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$15.6 million.

On April 1, 2011, the Democracy Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$901 thousand. This negative balance continued through April 30, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$901 thousand.

On April 7, 2011, the Environmental Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$282 thousand. This negative balance continued through April 30, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$10.9 million (its intra-month low).

On April 6, 2011, the Lottery Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$84 thousand. This negative balance continued through April 8, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a positive \$5.0 million. The Lottery Fund cash balance reached its intra month low of a negative \$373 thousand on April 7, 2011.

The Medical Assistance Trust Fund, Police and Fire Protection Fund, Democracy Trust Fund, Environmental Fund, and Lottery Fund shortfalls were due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund’s share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller’s Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority and, as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

The Department of Health Services (DHS) is submitting the attached State Annual Performance Report for the Birth to 3 Program to meet the requirement in s. 51.44 (5)(c) to report on the Department’s progress in implementing this program. The report, which covers federal fiscal year 2009, was submitted to the federal government to meet grant requirements.

The report highlights the very positive outcomes produced by the Birth to 3 Program. The vast majority, over 95 percent, of

children are served in their homes or other settings for typically developing children, such as child care centers. Parent satisfaction with the program remains high. In addition, required compliance with federal indicators identified by the Department of Education, Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) demonstrated compliance between 88 and 100 percent.

In the past year, the state and counties have engaged in a broad array of evidence-based practices to improve the quality of the program. These efforts will continue to ensure that children with disabilities and their families are well served by Wisconsin's Birth to 3 Program. Of particular interest was an intensive collaborative effort with the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) that includes ongoing improvement of transition processes for children leaving the Birth to 3 Program and beginning special education services provided by local school districts. These efforts have improved the successful transition to schools from 47 percent of children in federal fiscal year 2007 to 88 percent of children in 2009.

As required by section 25.17 (14m), WI Stats., I am

submitting the 2010 Goals, Strategies and Performance Report for the State of Wisconsin Investment Board (SWIB). This report provides information about how SWIB invested the assets we manage and how the investments performed. The report primarily focuses on the Wisconsin Retirement System's (WRS) Core Trust Fund (CTF) and Variable Trust Fund (VTF), which comprised 94% of all assets we invested in 2010.

Following the worst down market since the Great Depression, the markets and the WRS both continued to rebound in 2010. The CTF returned 12.4%, exceeding its benchmark by 0.2%, and the VTF returned 15.6%, exceeding its benchmark by 0.3%. With the exception of real estate, all asset classes outperformed the markets.

The additional positions that SWIB secured in 2008 and 2009 played a key role in outperforming the markets. Because of those positions, SWIB was able to increase the amount of assets invested internally from 21% to 47% by the end of 2010. Because the cost of internal management is considerably less than external, SWIB saved approximately \$13 million in 2010 in fees charged to the funds.

The WRS has a shared risk and reward feature whereby employees, retirees and employers share the investment gains and losses. The CTF's earnings or losses are smoothed over five years, while the VTF's are recognized for the year earned. As a result of the devastating losses in 2008, retirees saw a 2.1% reduction in 2009 in the CTF portion of their benefit, followed by further reductions in 2010 and 2011 of 1.3% and 1.2%, respectively.

Although the markets have made a significant recovery in the past two years, they remain volatile and no one can predict if the recovery will continue. To protect the funds in future down or flat markets, we are taking steps and implementing strategies, discussed in the report, to reduce our risk exposure and better prepare the funds for both good and bad markets.

I am pleased to present to you, for distribution to the Wisconsin Assembly, the annual evaluation report on the Pretrial Intoxicated Driver Intervention Grant Program. The program, created by section 86.53 Wis. Stats., was established by the legislature in 1997 with the requirement that the Department study its impact and report on its findings.

The Pretrial Intoxicated Driver Intervention Grant Program is intended for offenders who are arrested for their second or subsequent OWI (Operating While Intoxicated) offense. Offender participation may be voluntary or court ordered. It is an intervention model designed to get offenders into counseling, treatment and supervision as soon as possible after the arrest. The program is individual to each community.

Overall, offenders who successfully completed the program were less likely than non-participants to be re-arrested for subsequent OWI violations. Those who were re-arrested went significantly longer between arrests than non-participants.

I commend those people who have dedicated themselves to making this innovative program a success. There are no "silver bullets" in eradicating impaired driving, but I feel this effort is a vital piece in the total transportation safety effort.

As the first phase of our comprehensive evaluation of the Medical Assistance program requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed a review of the Enrollment Services Center established by the Department of Health Services (DHS) in 2008 to centrally manage day-to-day operations of certain public assistance programs. As of March 2011, the center was staffed by 482 individuals, 432 of whom were employed by Hewlett-Packard (HP) Enterprise Services, Inc., under amendments to its contract as the State's fiscal agent for Medical Assistance. Since fiscal year (FY) 2008-09, HP Enterprise Services and another private contractor—Automated Health Systems, Inc.—have been paid nearly \$27.6 million for services related to the BadgerCare Plus plans that expand health care services to adults without dependent children, as well the FoodShare program for low-income, childless adults.

DHS appears to have established and rapidly expanded the Enrollment Services Center with little organized planning,

limited legislative oversight, and no formal efforts to determine the appropriate mix of contract and state staff. We identified a number of concerns the Legislature may wish to consider as it deliberates a proposal that would create operations similar to those at the Enrollment Services Center for all BadgerCare Plus plans. For example, we noted a lack of quality assurance activities prior to 2011, the potential loss of federal funding under program rules that require public employees to make eligibility determinations, and mixed success in other states' efforts to implement similar initiatives. The extent to which DHS has used an existing contract to staff the Enrollment Services Center also raises questions about the transparency of its contracting practices.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by staff of DHS, HP Enterprise Services, and Automated Health Systems in completing this review.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required by s. 13.94 (1)(dm), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit of State Fair Park. We issued an unqualified opinion on the financial statements State Fair Park prepared for fiscal year (FY) 2009-10, and we have continued to monitor efforts to improve its financial performance.

In FY 2009-10, State Fair Park’s operating revenue exceeded expenditures by \$1.6 million on a cash basis, largely because of positive operating results generated by the Wisconsin Exposition Center. These results, along with \$1.4 million in one-time funding received as part of the December 2009 acquisition of the Wisconsin Exposition Center, allowed State Fair Park to reduce the cash deficit in its program revenue operating appropriation to \$4.6 million as of June 30, 2010.

State Fair Park has begun to take steps to address concerns we raised in our prior audit regarding inadequate policies and procedures governing in-kind support, such as equipment or advertising, that it solicits from businesses in exchange for tickets to the Wisconsin State Fair and advertising exposure on the fairgrounds. However, because necessary changes were not fully implemented during FY 2009-10, we continue to report this weakness in internal controls, along with another financial reporting concern, in the Report on Internal Control and Compliance included in this report.

Finally, we note that operations of the Wisconsin Exposition Center, debt service payments related to the Exposition Center and the Pettit National Ice Center, and a continuing legal dispute with a former racetrack promoter may affect State Fair Park’s financial condition in the future and will warrant close attention by management and staff.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by staff of State Fair Park. A response from the Chief Executive Officer follows the appendix.

POINT OF ORDER

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

At the request of the Department of Workforce Development and to meet our audit responsibilities under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats., we have audited the financial statements of the State of Wisconsin Unemployment Reserve Fund. It funds regular unemployment benefits paid to eligible individuals and is funded primarily through taxes paid by employers. During the period we reviewed, certain other benefits funded by the federal government, including extended and emergency unemployment benefits, were also paid. This audit report contains our unqualified opinion on the Unemployment Reserve Fund's financial statements and related notes for the years ended June 30, 2010 and 2009.

In the past ten years, the Fund's balance has declined from a high of \$1.9 billion as of June 30, 2000, to a deficit in the amount of (\$920.4 million) as of June 30, 2010. As its reserves have been depleted, the Fund has borrowed from the federal government to pay unemployment benefits to eligible individuals. The balance owed to the federal government as of May 31, 2011, was \$1.3 billion plus an additional \$25.4 million in interest accrued on the loan as of that date.

Accompanying the financial statements is the Schedule of Cash Balance Related to Taxable Employers, which is used to determine the tax rate paid by employers. Section 108.18(3m), Wis. Stats., requires the highest tax rate schedule to be applied when the Fund's cash balance as of June 30 is less than \$300 million. Consequently, the highest of four tax rate schedules is being applied in calendar year 2011.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by Department of Workforce Development staff in completing the audit.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE

June 26, 2011

To the Honorable Members of the Assembly:

I have approved **Assembly Bill 40** as 2011 Wisconsin Act 32 and deposited it in the Office of the Secretary of State.

This budget reflects a return to the bedrock principles of our state's constitution – frugality and moderation. It's a budget

that is, for the first time in many years, balanced – now and in the future – with a structural surplus of over \$300 million in the 2013-15 biennium. It avoids relying on accounting gimmicks, fund raids and one-time funds. With this budget, we have begun to put our state's financial house in order and make our finances more transparent. And this budget is enacted before the start of the new biennium – with the earliest signing date since 1967.

Last March, I introduced a budget based on those fundamental values in our constitution. My budget brought spending in line with revenues – now and in the future – it did not raise taxes; it provided local governments with the tools to reduce costs and maintain essential services; and it set priorities on job creation and economic development. The budget I sign today, with limited vetoes, remains consistent with those goals and values. I want to commend the Legislature for its work in completing the budget on time. Together we have put Wisconsin back on a course toward job creation and prosperity. True economic growth requires a robust private sector. By balancing the budget through limits on government spending and focusing on priorities, we are on our way to creating 250,000 jobs by 2015.

Over 50 percent of Wisconsin's general fund budget is devoted to local government services – primarily to public schools and public safety. Preserving those services and reducing spending demanded that local officials be given the tools to truly manage costs. With employee compensation the largest part of those costs, changes to state and local government employee collective bargaining and increased employee contributions to pensions and health insurance costs were critical to preserving government services and Wisconsin's quality of life.

These changes will help set Wisconsin on a course toward stable, affordable and effective government. State and local government will become more nimble in the face of change and be able to achieve continuous improvement. With these tools, state and local officials can help lay the foundation for success – for our school children, our higher education graduates, our entrepreneurs and our businesses.

This budget protects Wisconsin tax payers – including middle class families, seniors in their homes and small businesses. It does not raise taxes. It freezes municipal, county and technical college district levies. It reduces school district revenue limits in line with necessary state aid reductions and consistent with savings from cost-containment measures. It limits growth in property taxes on the median value home to less than 1 percent each year. It eliminates regional transit

authorities and their potential to independently raise local taxes.

This budget promotes job creation. It provides tax incentives for investing capital gains in Wisconsin businesses and growing manufacturing jobs. It devotes \$160 million to the new Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation in support of our state's economic prosperity. It promotes Wisconsin tourism by investing approximately \$14 million annually in our state's marketing efforts, a nearly 40 percent increase. It supports business expansion by investing over \$5.7 billion in our state's transportation system. It streamlines business licensing and regulation through a new Department of Safety and Professional Services.

Education is critical to job creation and Wisconsin's future prosperity. Wisconsin's public schools and higher education systems are among the best in the country. Flexible and accountable operations are central to ensuring Wisconsin children and young adults receive the best education possible. The budget invests \$15 million in better school performance data systems, sets the stage for improved reading attainment in early grades and puts the state on a course toward implementing high quality student assessment systems.

The University of Wisconsin-Madison and all University of Wisconsin System campuses are given greater financial and management flexibility along with a greater focus on accountability through annual reports measuring time to graduation, accessibility to key courses and other important performance and outcome measures. Low-income families are given greater access to education by lifting the enrollment cap on the Milwaukee private school choice program, expanding choice to Racine and protecting higher education grants from cuts.

Ensuring sustainable health care programs is the cornerstone of this budget. Due to the sunset of one-time federal funding and dramatic expansions in program participation, nearly all of the general fund revenue growth over the next two years is allocated to fund Medicaid. In order to bring health care costs in future budgets in line with available revenue, the Department of Health Services will begin implementing various measures to "bend-the-cost-curve." These measures include revamping BadgerCare so that it functions more efficiently and effectively, modifying Family Care toward a greater emphasis on self-directed and focused care, consolidating and streamlining back-office eligibility functions, and preserving SeniorCare.

The following is a brief summary of how this budget, including my vetoes, will address some of the key issues facing the citizens of Wisconsin:

Economic Development

- Provides more than \$160 million in funding over the biennium for the newly created Wisconsin Economic

Development Corporation to support a concentrated focus on economic development in the state.

- Increases tourism marketing from \$9.9 million in fiscal year 2010-11 to \$13.8 million annually in part by redirecting arts spending to emphasize those activities that both support the arts and grow the economy.
- Ensures Wisconsin's meat processing industry can participate in national and global markets by authorizing 10.0 FTE positions for meat inspection activities.
- Reduces regulatory burdens on business expansion by streamlining reporting and eligibility requirements under the prevailing wage law.
- Improves the solvency of the unemployment trust fund by implementing a one-week delay in receiving initial benefits, similar to benefit programs in many other states.
- Creates the Department of Safety and Professional Services to consolidate the regulatory and licensing functions of several agencies to improve the cost-effectiveness and efficiency of operations. Licensing fees charged to regulated professions will be frozen at the same level as the previous biennium, which is due, in part, to the increased efficiency expected from the consolidated operations.

General Fund Taxes

- Protects middle class families, seniors and small businesses by avoiding any tax increases despite one of the largest deficits in state history.
- Provides an income and franchise tax credit for manufacturers and agricultural producers, reducing the tax burden on those industries to encourage job creation and investment in Wisconsin in sectors where the state has a competitive advantage.
- Creates a capital gains deferral for realized gains reinvested in Wisconsin-based businesses as well as a 100 percent capital gains exclusion for gains realized on Wisconsin-sourced capital assets held for more than five years to create an incentive for greater investment in Wisconsin businesses.

Shared Revenue and Tax Relief

- Enacts the strongest levy limits in Wisconsin history by limiting levy increases for counties and municipalities to the greater of 0 percent or the change in equalized value due to net new construction, and creating a new levy limit on technical college districts, which limits increases to changes in property values unless approved by the voters in the district.
- Provides local governments with additional flexibility in meeting budget challenges by increasing the ability of local governments to realize employee compensation savings, repealing the emergency services maintenance of effort requirement, allowing local governments to create combined municipal protective services departments to provide both

police and fire services, and suspending the county operating limit for two years to prevent counties with low mill rates from being forced to reduce levies due to falling property values.

K–12 Education

- Protected sustainable funding for equalization aid in the face of one of the largest deficits in state history.
- Provides a \$50 per pupil revenue increase in fiscal year 2012-13 and creates a one-time \$42.5 million GPR categorical aid program to match district revenue increases.
- Expands the private school choice program by repealing the enrollment limit, allowing schools throughout the state to serve eligible city of Milwaukee residents, raising the income threshold to 300 percent of poverty and allowing the Racine School District to participate in the program based on newly established program criteria.
- Supports greater accountability and performance by investing \$15 million in the development of a statewide student information system and requiring the Department of Public Instruction to implement a new pupil assessment based on mastery of Common Core Standards by 2014-15.
- Invests in education by ensuring all elementary school students can read at grade level by providing \$1.2 million over the biennium in support of the Governor’s Read to Lead Task Force.

Higher Education

- Provides greater financial and management flexibility to the University of Wisconsin-Madison and the University of Wisconsin System campuses, including the ability to establish separate personnel management and compensation systems.
- Requires the University of Wisconsin-Madison and University of Wisconsin System campuses to provide annual accountability reports, including time to receive a degree, availability of key courses, economic development activities and other important measures.
- Maintains current funding levels for financial aid programs and phases out the unsustainable Wisconsin Covenant program.
- Seeks to prevent unfair competition in telecommunications and broadband services between the University of Wisconsin and the private sector by increasing legislative oversight in order to focus university supported programs on education and research activities.

Health Care, Children and Families

- Protects the state’s most vulnerable citizens by preserving the health care safety net provided by Medicaid, BadgerCare Plus and SeniorCare while implementing significant program reforms to bring an end to the unsustainable rate of program growth.
- Requires a comprehensive review of the Family Care long-term care program to ensure that public dollars are used in the most effective way to support the needs of the elderly

and people with disabilities. Over the past five years, the Family Care program has grown from five pilot counties to 56 counties covering 80 percent of the state’s population. During that expansion, there has not been an adequate review of the effectiveness of the program in meeting the care needs of participants and providing services in a cost-effective and accountable manner.

- Redesigns the income maintenance eligibility determination system for public benefits to improve the accuracy and timeliness of eligibility determinations, while reducing total program costs by \$40 million per year once fully implemented.
- Provides funding for building projects to help address the shortage of nurses and support public health education in Wisconsin. New facilities include the Madison School of Nursing, the River Falls Health and Human Performance Building, and the Milwaukee School of Public Health.
- Reforms the Wisconsin Works (W-2) program to emphasize work and the Wisconsin Shares child care program to provide information on the quality of child care services, to contain costs and to combat fraud.

Transportation

- Strengthens the finances for Wisconsin’s transportation infrastructure system by transferring \$160.1 million in general fund revenue to the transportation fund, including an ongoing transfer of 0.25 percent of general fund taxes annually, with an annual minimum of \$35.1 million.
- Makes progress toward addressing the state’s critical highway infrastructure needs by providing \$3.2 billion for highway construction and maintenance, an increase of \$429.3 million over the biennium.
- Creates a new Southeast Wisconsin freeways megaprojects program to fund construction on the I-94 North-South corridor project and the Zoo Interchange in Milwaukee County. The budget provides a total of \$420.0 million for those two projects, an increase of \$229.9 million above current funding levels.
- Ensures local highway projects are completed efficiently by increasing competition and allowing greater private sector participation through new requirements that local governments award projects to the lowest bidder, not perform construction for private development projects, and limit the use of their workforce to projects occurring in all towns, and cities and villages with populations under 5,000.

Justice

- Invests in programs to assist law enforcement, including additional resources to fight Internet crimes against children, funding for an interoperable communications system and staff resources at the state crime labs to ensure DNA samples are processed in a timely fashion.
- Consolidates juvenile correctional facilities to manage decreasing populations while saving resources and minimizing county placement costs.
- Provides funding for Victim Information and Notification Everyday (VINE) and VINE Protective Order services to

protect public safety and provide information to victims and affected parties.

- Provides funding to the State Public Defender for the revised indigency standard which became effective June 19, 2011.

Natural Resources and Environment

- Maintains hunting and fishing license fees and parks admission fees at current levels to ensure that even in times of economic challenges access to Wisconsin's abundant natural resources are kept affordable.
- Requires the Stewardship program to focus only on the best value purchases by reducing bonding authority by \$234 million through fiscal year 2019-20, saving Wisconsin as much as \$80 million in total debt service costs.
- Modifies the formula for aids provided in lieu of property tax payments for lands purchased through the Stewardship program, saving the state \$190,000 in fiscal year 2012-13, but reducing future payments by half or more. Total payments for aids in lieu of property taxes are estimated to be \$13.2 million in fiscal year 2012-13.
- Ensures a balance between environmental protection and local costs by specifying that the Department of Natural Resources may not enforce an administrative rule for nonagricultural performance standards for runoff from urban areas if the provision has a reduction in total suspended solids exceeding 20 percent.
- Reduces bonding authority under the Working Lands program by \$12 million and repeals the conversion fee for rezoning from a farmland preservation district. This will allow landowners to decide for themselves the best use of their property without paying a penalty if the use of the land will change.

General Government and Veterans

- Limits growth in spending from all funds to 1.8 percent over the biennium, despite a \$1.8 billion, 11 percent increase in funding for health care programs and eliminates over 1,000 FTE positions compared to the base year. This small rate of growth, over 70 percent lower than the previous budget, is achieved through increased state and local government employee contributions to pensions and health insurance, elimination of long-term vacancies, closure of state facilities, and across-the-board cuts to many programs.
- Requires more transparency in state government through on-line reporting of state expenditures, grants and contracts on a searchable Internet Web site available to the public.
- Ensures the solvency of the veterans trust fund over the next biennium by providing \$5 million GPR in additional funding to support benefits to veterans.
- Strengthens the veterans tuition remission program by expanding it to include the University of Wisconsin-Madison Executive Masters in Business Administration program, distance education, on-line and 100 percent fee funded

programs, and by increasing the number of credits or semesters eligible for state tuition remissions.

- Provides \$1.8 million GPR and 5.0 FTE GPR positions to the Government Accountability Board and \$10 million SEG and 55.0 FTE SEG positions to the Department of Transportation for the implementation of the voter identification legislation.
- Separates the core functions of promoting job growth from regulating job creators by funding the new public/private Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation focused solely on job creation and a new Department of Safety and Professional Services that can provide a one-stop shop for commercial regulation.
- Improves customer service by consolidating responsibilities for trademark and trade name registrations and notary public commissions with the corporate filing activities at the Department of Financial Institutions.

Building Program

- Helps ensure an adequate number of dentists in Wisconsin by providing \$16 million in general fund supported borrowing and private funds for expansion of the Marquette Dental School.
- Helps improve homeland security and coordination of law enforcement and intelligence data by providing \$6.8 million for a Fusion Center at the Department of Military Affairs.
- Provides funding for educational facilities including the Horicon Marsh International Education Center. The Horicon Marsh is recognized as a Wetland of International Importance. The center provides educational experiences for scientists and visitors who come from around the world.
- Encourages fiscal responsibility by reducing previously authorized bonding for projects that have not moved forward or were constructed under budget.
- Directs the Department of Administration to use the proceeds from the sale of buildings to reduce outstanding debt whenever possible.

I have made 50 vetoes to the budget. These vetoes remove unnecessary reports and requirements, clarify program implementation timelines, and improve the intended focus of certain programs. These vetoes reduce spending by \$10,000 SEG.

There were three items in the budget that I did not veto but that require additional clarification:

- The budget authorizes the Attorney General to allocate penalty surcharge revenues in support of prosecutor positions. I respectfully request that the Attorney General allocate a portion of these revenues in support of an existing drug crimes prosecutor position in St. Croix County. St. Croix County is one of the fastest growing areas of the state and continues to combat methamphetamine abuse.
- The budget expands the current law prohibition on the use of government funds to pay for the performance of abortions to specifically include the University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinics Authority. I feel strongly that taxpayer dollars

should not support the performance of elective abortions. However, concerns have been raised about the potential for this provision to have the significant and unintended consequence of compromising the accreditation of the obstetrics and gynecology residency program operated by the University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinics. In-state training programs are a critical component of averting a physician shortage, particularly in the urban and rural areas of the state, and it is essential that we retain and grow physician residency opportunities in Wisconsin.

I have thoroughly reviewed this provision and do not believe it would prohibit the hospital from meeting the accreditation standards. I encourage the hospital to take the steps necessary to meet the intent of this provision by ensuring tax dollars are not directly funding the performance of abortions, while maintaining the accreditation of this very important physician training program.

- Several months ago, I provided the Unemployment Insurance Advisory Council with a proposal that would have increased the waiting period to receive benefits to one week and also would have revised Wisconsin law to allow the state to take advantage of extended unemployment benefits provided by the federal government. Unfortunately, the council did not act on either measure at that time. The Legislature acted on the first provision – requiring recipients of unemployment to wait one week before receiving their benefits. I applaud the Legislature for their decisive action on this issue. Recently, the Unemployment Insurance Advisory Council voted unanimously in support of utilizing additional federal unemployment funds, a measure I fully support. I am now calling on lawmakers to act on the council’s recommendation and modify Wisconsin laws to allow the state to take advantage of these additional federal funds.

I commend the leadership of the Legislature in maintaining its focus through some of the most difficult political discussions this state has ever faced. They improved on my budget and accomplished something few ever thought attainable – a structural surplus. Together, we are paying our bills and staying focused on job creation.

The budget I sign today reflects a return to Wisconsin’s values. From Superior to Kenosha and from Green Bay to Platteville, we are independent-minded, moderate, pragmatic and frugal. This budget embraces those values by giving our local officials the tools to truly focus spending on delivering efficient and effective government services. Together we move forward with a stable government that has put its fiscal house in order so that its people can engage in private enterprise and create jobs that fuel our economy.

Veto Message

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VETO ITEMS

A. AGRICULTURE, ENVIRONMENT AND JUSTICE

AGRICULTURE, TRADE AND CONSUMER PROTECTION

1. Agricultural Chemical Funds Report

Section 9103 (2u)

This provision would require the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection to study and evaluate the condition of the agricultural chemical cleanup fund and the agrichemical management fund and their structural imbalances. The department would also be required to report its findings to the Joint Committee on Finance by December 31, 2011.

I am partially vetoing this provision to remove the date by which the department must report to the Joint Committee on Finance. I object to this provision because requiring this evaluation to be prepared by the specified date places an undue burden on the department to produce a quality report.

Vetoing this provision will provide the department with more time and flexibility to prepare its report and make recommendations to the committee.

2. Grain Inspection Program Report

Section 9103 (3q)

This provision would require the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection to report to the Joint Committee on Finance by January 1, 2012, on the specific actions or administrative efforts the department has planned to reduce and eliminate the remaining deficit in the grain inspection program.

I am vetoing this provision because I object to requiring additional reporting requirements for a program that has been in deficit since the end of fiscal year 2000–01. The department has been and will continue to explore all options for deficit reduction, but has limited options for addressing the deficit without limiting services. Vetoing this provision will allow the department to continue working toward a solution to the deficit in the grain inspection program without the added burden of preparing a report.

CORRECTIONS

3. Inmate Litigation Loans

Section 3014m

This provision specifies that a prisoner may not receive more than \$100 annually in litigation loans. Any amount that the prisoner repays in the year may be re-loaned without counting against the limit. Prisoners must repay prior loans in full or make arrangements for repayment with the warden of the institution before receiving a litigation loan.

I am partially vetoing this provision to eliminate the requirement that the repayment arrangements be made with the warden of the institution because it is too burdensome on the Department of Corrections. This partial veto allows the department flexibility to designate a procedure for making repayment arrangements taking into consideration the duties of the warden and the movement of inmates between institutions.

4. Nursing Services Report

Section 9111 (1u)

This provision requires the Department of Corrections secretary to report to the Joint Committee on Finance by October 1, 2011, on nursing staff and costs for each facility and a summary of each contract for nursing services for fiscal years 2009–10 and 2010–11.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary and burdensome. The department currently provides information it has available to the Legislature and other interested parties

on these matters, and the department continues to work to improve data management.

DISTRICT ATTORNEYS AND OFFICE OF STATE EMPLOYMENT RELATIONS

5. Pay Progression for Certain Attorneys

Sections 9113 (3c) and 9155 (3c)

Section 9113 (3c) requires the Association of State Prosecutors and the Director of the Office of State Employment Relations (OSER) to develop a pay progression plan for assistant district attorneys. The plan must include a detailed description of how the system would be structured and administered and also the fiscal cost of the system in future biennia. This plan must be submitted to the Joint Committee on Finance by October 1, 2011, and is subject to 14–day passive review. The pay progression system would be funded from any salary savings realized from hiring new attorneys to replace attorneys who retire during the period of January 1, 2011, through June 30, 2013.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the requirement that OSER work with the Association of State Prosecutors and to remove the required parameters of the plan, submission to the Joint Committee on Finance and the funding mechanism. I am maintaining the language requiring the Director of OSER to develop a pay progression plan for assistant district attorneys. I object to the requirement that OSER must work with the Association of State Prosecutors on a pay progression plan without involving the District Attorneys. The executive budget required OSER to work with the District Attorneys to develop a distribution plan for the \$1,000,000 annual funding provided for assistant district attorney compensation. In order to return to this intent, I direct OSER to work with the District Attorneys to develop a pay progression plan for future implementation. I continue to support a system that increases retention of experienced prosecutors around the state and this partial veto maintains that support.

Section 9155 (3c) requires the Wisconsin State Attorneys Association and the Director of the Office of State Employment Relations to develop a pay progression plan for attorneys who are included in the legal collective bargaining unit. The plan must include a detailed description of how the system would be structured and administered and also the fiscal cost of the system in future biennia. This plan must be submitted to the Joint Committee on Finance by October 1, 2011, and is subject to a 14–day passive review. The pay progression system would be funded from any salary savings realized from hiring new attorneys to replace attorneys who retire during the 2011–13 biennium.

I am vetoing this section because I object to the requirement that the Office of State Employment Relations must work with the attorneys association without involving the agencies who employ these attorneys. I also object to the selection of this bargaining unit to receive a pay progression system when no information has been presented to indicate there is a recruitment or retention problem among this group.

NATURAL RESOURCES

6. Brownfield Site Assessment Grants

Sections 2990r and 9155 (3g)

These provisions restrict the amount of a grant to 67 percent of eligible project costs for brownfield site assessment grants and require the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation to give priority in awarding brownfield site assessment grants to applicants who would have been on the funding list for fiscal year 2010–11 awards in the Department of Natural Resources.

I am partially vetoing Section 2990r as it relates to the required level of matching funds an applicant must contribute to receive a grant and vetoing Section 9155(3g) relating to priority in awarding grants because I object to limiting the flexibility of the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation in issuing grants for this program.

Vetoing these provisions will also maintain the current match requirement of the recipient of each grant and allow the corporation to issue a grant that covers up to 80 percent of project costs, but maintains the flexibility to issue grants that cover a smaller portion of the project costs. This will continue to allow the opportunity for higher priority projects to be adequately funded.

7. Economic Impact Analysis

Section 9135 (3f)

This provision would require the Department of Natural Resources to prepare an economic impact analysis for the phosphorous effluent limitation and shoreland zoning administrative rules by December 31, 2011.

I am partially vetoing this provision to remove the date by which the department must prepare its analysis. I object to this provision because requiring these analyses to be prepared by the specified date may compromise the quality of the analyses. This partial veto will provide the department greater time and flexibility to prepare an economic impact analysis on each of the rules. While it is important for the department to conduct the analyses, it is more important to provide the time necessary to fully evaluate the impact of these rules.

OFFICE OF JUSTICE ASSISTANCE

8. Report on Drug Offender Diversion Surcharge Fund

Section 9101 (4j)

This section requires the Department of Administration to submit a plan to the Joint Committee on Finance reporting how the department will reduce state appropriations by \$1,917,900 over the 2011–13 biennium and lapse the associated funding to the general fund to eliminate the deficit in the drug offender diversion surcharge fund.

I am vetoing this section because this requirement is unnecessary. This deficit will be examined again in developing the 2013–15 biennial budget.

9. Repeal of Traffic Stop Data Collection Requirements

Sections 373 [as it relates to s. 20.505 (6) (kq) and (kr)], 717 [as it relates to s. 20.505 (1) (id) 5g. and 5r.], 737 and 738

These provisions relate to funding for the traffic stop data collection requirements enacted in 2009 Wisconsin Act 28. Section 373 includes two appropriations, Traffic stop data collection; state and Traffic stop data collection; local in the Chapter 20 schedule. Section 717 funds the two appropriations from justice information fee revenues deposited in the Department of Administration. Sections 737 and 738 detail the appropriations in the Chapter 20 language.

I am vetoing these provisions at the request of the Legislative Reference Bureau because of conflicts with passage of separate legislation, 2011 Wisconsin Act 29. As passed by the Legislature, conflicts would be created regarding these sections between the act and the biennial budget without the veto. The intent remains to repeal the requirements for traffic stop data collection and provide mandate relief to law enforcement agencies. This veto retains that intent but ensures no statutory language conflicts will exist with Act 29 after the biennial budget bill is enacted.

SUPREME COURT

10. Judicial Compensation Commission

Section 9155 (1j)

This section creates a seven–member Judicial Compensation Commission to review the salaries of the justices of the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals judges and judges of the Circuit Court. No later than December 1, 2012, the commission must submit a report to the Governor and the Joint Committee on Employment Relations that includes recommendations on salaries of the justices and judges. The committee must review the recommendations for the 2013–15 fiscal biennium and approve the recommendations, unless a majority of members agree not to approve or agree to modify the recommendations. The Governor must provide funding sufficient to implement the recommendations for the 2013–15 fiscal biennium. If the salary adjustment approved by the committee is less than the percentage of any across–the–board pay adjustments for any other position in the classified service, the annual salary adjustment for the justices and judges is increased equal to the percentage increase of the highest across–the–board pay adjustment provided for any position in the classified service. Staff and support services will be provided by the Director of State Courts and the commission sunsets after December 1, 2012.

I am vetoing this section because I object to the requirement to provide a certain amount of funding for judicial salaries in the 2013–15 biennium. I also object to required salary increases for justices and judges when state employees are facing salary reductions due to increased contributions for health insurance

and pension. Judicial salaries are included in the compensation plan, similar to all other elected officials, and will be adjusted as necessary under that system.

B. EDUCATION, CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

11. Transitional Jobs Demonstration Project

Sections 1385 and 1385c

These sections require that any host site for employing individuals or placing work crews under the Transitional Jobs Demonstration Project be a business that is operated for profit, except that in the case of a natural disaster for which the Governor has declared a state of emergency under s. 323.10, the Department of Children and Families shall give preference to any work crew placement or host site involved in natural disaster recovery.

I am partially vetoing section 1385 and vetoing section 1385c because this requirement is overly prescriptive and may be contrary to the goal of moving individuals back to productive work. Currently, 51 percent of transitional jobs placements are with nonprofit host sites, such as hospitals and community agencies. These placements provide valuable work experience to individuals and give these individuals the skills to move into unsubsidized employment.

However, I am cognizant that the best way to move individuals into unsubsidized, private-sector employment is to give them experience working in the private sector. Therefore, I am directing the department give preference to host sites that are for-profit businesses.

12. Local Child Support Enforcement

Section 9108 (2i) (a) 2.

The bill requires the Department of Children and Families to develop, and submit to the Joint Committee on Finance no later than August 31, 2011, a detailed plan for distributing child support incentive payments to counties during calendar years 2012 and 2013. This provision prohibits the department from basing the child support incentive plan on an across-the-board reduction to child support incentive payments made in calendar year 2011.

I am vetoing this provision because the department already distributes federal child support incentive payments and state funding to counties for child support enforcement activities under an incentive program. The distribution is based on a county's share of statewide support cases that receive enforcement services from a county child support agency and already established performance standards. Therefore, an across-the-board reduction should be an option the department can consider in developing its plan.

13. Fingerprinting for Child Care Providers

Section 1335d

This provision requires the Department of Children and Families, a county department, an agency contracted to administer the Wisconsin Shares program, or school board to require any person seeking a license to operate a child care center, certification as a child care provider or a contract to operate a child care program, be fingerprinted on two fingerprint cards, each bearing a complete set of the person's fingerprints. Additionally, the Department of Justice may provide the fingerprint cards to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the purposes of verifying the identity of the person fingerprinted and obtaining records of his or her criminal arrests and convictions.

Under current law, agencies already have the authority to require fingerprints of certified and licensed child care providers if those agencies determine there is a reasonable basis for further investigation as a result of required background checks.

I am vetoing this provision because requiring fingerprints of all child care providers creates an unnecessary burden for small child care businesses. If there is reasonable basis for further investigation as a result of required background checks, fingerprints can already be required. However, for child care providers who wish to participate in the Wisconsin Shares program, additional safeguards must be implemented to ensure that taxpayer dollars are spent properly. Reducing fraud and protecting the safety of children in the Wisconsin Shares program are top priorities of my administration. Therefore, I am directing the Department of Children and Families to amend the administrative rules for certified and licensed child care providers to require that any provider who wishes to participate in the Wisconsin Shares program submit fingerprints to the Department of Children and Families, a county department, or agency contracted to administer the Wisconsin Shares program.

14. Rules Related to Child Care Subsidies for Children of Child Care Providers

Section 9108 (2c)

The bill prohibits distribution of child care funds for services that are provided for a child by a child care provider who is the parent of the child or who resides with the child. Additionally, if a child's parent is a child care provider, the bill prohibits the distribution of funds for services that are provided for the child by another child care provider who is not the child's parent. These provisions would not apply if the child's parent has applied for, and been granted, a waiver of the prohibitions. The bill further provides that the Department of Children and Families shall specify the circumstances or standards under which a waiver will be granted by rule.

Section 9108 (2c) requires the department to submit the rules in proposed form to the Legislative Council staff under s. 227.15 (1) of the statutes no later than the first day of the fourth month beginning after the effective date of the bill.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary. Current law already requires submission of proposed rules to

Legislative Council staff and I am directing the department to submit these proposed rules by January 1, 2012.

15. Child Care State Administration and Licensing

Section 9108 (1v) (b)

The bill transfers \$1,000,000 annually from the Department of Children and Families' economic support federal block grant operations appropriation to the Joint Committee on Finance's federal funds general supplementation appropriation for an automated attendance tracking system. This section requires the department to submit a request, by January 1, 2012, for these funds under a 14-day passive review process along with a plan that details how the automated attendance tracking system would work and how these funds would be spent.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the due date because it is overly restrictive. The department needs sufficient time to fully research the best options for implementation of the automated attendance tracking system for child care providers.

PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

16. Submission of Data for Choice Program Eligibility Determinations

Sections 2532m [as it relates to s. 118.60 (2) (a) 1. b.] and 2536g

Section 2532m creates a parental choice program for school districts other than Milwaukee that meet certain criteria. This section includes pupil eligibility criteria as well. Under the section, pupils are eligible to participate in the parental choice program if family income is 300 percent of the federal poverty level or less. Section 2532m [as it relates to s. 118.60 (2) (a) 1. b.] establishes a method of determining income eligibility and requires participating schools to submit certain data to the Department of Revenue.

The budget also revises income eligibility for the Milwaukee parental choice program, incorporating the 300 percent of the federal poverty level ceiling set forth in section 2532m. Section 2536g also requires participating schools to submit certain data to the Department of Revenue for income eligibility determinations.

I am partially vetoing sections 2532m [as it relates to s. 118.60(2) (a) 1. b.] and 2536g to require participating schools to submit family income data to the Department of Public Instruction instead of the Department of Revenue. I object to the process proposed because it unnecessarily requires participating schools to report data to multiple state agencies. The Department of Public Instruction is the primary contact at the state level for schools in the parental choice program. Further, it is responsible for determining eligibility of schools and of pupils whose eligibility cannot be determined by the Department of Revenue, and as such also likely will collect information from participating schools. Therefore, it is appropriate for the Department of Public Instruction to collect

all data and share it as needed with the Department of Revenue.

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

17. Approval for University of Wisconsin–Madison Employment Plans

Sections 970L, 2426L and 9152 (1c) (b)

The bill gives additional operational flexibility to the University of Wisconsin–Madison related to employee compensation, personnel systems and labor negotiations. It allows the University of Wisconsin System and the University of Wisconsin–Madison to provide supplemental pay plans in the 2011–13 biennium funded from base resources to provide competitive pay; transfers all current University of Wisconsin System employees to a new personnel system and University of Wisconsin–Madison employees to a new personnel system, beginning on July 1, 2013; and transfers labor contracts and future labor negotiations, subject to 2011 Wisconsin Act 10, from the Office of State Employment Relations to the University of Wisconsin System and the University of Wisconsin–Madison.

These sections require the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin–Madison to submit compensation, personnel system plans and tentative labor agreements related to University of Wisconsin–Madison employees to the Board of Regents for approval, prior to submitting these plans to the Joint Committee on Employment Relations.

I object to the requirement that the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin–Madison submit the supplemental pay plan, personnel system plan and tentative labor agreements to the Board of Regents for approval. Under the bill, these plans will already require approval from the Joint Committee on Employment Relations.

Therefore, I am partially vetoing sections 970L, 2426L and 9152 (1c) (b) to eliminate the Board of Regents' review and approval. I originally proposed restructuring the University of Wisconsin–Madison into a public authority to provide greater autonomy to manage compensation and human resources to recruit top faculty and remain an engine for research and patent production. Removing this level of approval will give the state's flagship campus the level of autonomy it needs to successfully compete in the global higher education environment.

18. Annual Reporting of Contractual Service Procurements

Sections 239g and 9452 (1d) [as it relates to s. 16.705 (8) (intro.)]

These sections exempt the University of Wisconsin System from reporting the procurement of contractual services annually to the Governor and the Legislature.

I am vetoing section 239g and partially vetoing section 9452 (1d) [as it relates to s. 16.705 (8) (intro.)] because I object to this reduction in accountability and transparency in state government. It is important to continue to report procurements of contractual services to ensure that all state

agencies are spending tax dollars responsibly. It is also important to collect information necessary for the State Bureau of Procurement to analyze and respond to procurement trends throughout state government.

19. Joint Committee on Finance Authority to Postpone Telecommunications Services Prohibition

Section 1015x

This section defines telecommunications services and third-party entity and, beginning July 1, 2013, prohibits the University of Wisconsin System from becoming a member, shareholder or partner in any third-party entity or other person that offers, resells, or provides telecommunications services to the general public or to any public or private entity unless the third-party entity or other person does not offer, resell or provide telecommunication services that it did not offer, resell, or provide on June 15, 2011, and the third-party entity or other person does not offer, resell, or provide telecommunications services to a private entity, to the general public, or to a public entity other than a university or a university-affiliated research facility or a facility approved by the Joint Committee on Finance that it is not already serving on June 15, 2011. The section allows the Joint Committee on Finance to postpone the July 1, 2013, effective date for these prohibitions through majority vote.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the authority of the Joint Committee on Finance to postpone these prohibitions because the University of Wisconsin System should not compete with private sector businesses in providing telecommunications services. The bill does not prohibit the University of Wisconsin System from participating in a third-party comprised entirely of universities and university-affiliated research facilities. There is no need to delay the prohibitions included in the bill beyond July 1, 2013.

20. Review of Position Titles and Classifications

Sections 2410L and 9452 (1d) [as it relates to s. 111.825 (3m)]

These sections require the Wisconsin Employment Relations Commission to determine if titles or classifications newly created by the University of Wisconsin-Madison or the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System would make the person who holds the position an employee eligible for a bargaining unit, and to assign any eligible new position title or classification to the appropriate collective bargaining unit; and set July 1, 2013, as the effective date.

I am vetoing section 2410L and partially vetoing section 9452 (1d) [as it relates to s. 111.825 (3m)] to remove the commission's review and assignment of newly created titles or classifications, because this provision significantly expands the commission's responsibilities beyond current law and unnecessarily burdens the commission. The effect of this veto is to limit the commission's role to unit clarification as under current law.

21. Technical Correction to "Academic Faculty"

Sections 2410a and 2410b

These sections create bargaining units for University of Wisconsin System and University of Wisconsin-Madison employees, except "academic faculty" and "academic staff." The term "academic faculty" does not appear in current law under s. 36.13, as referenced in sections 2410a and 2410b.

I am partially vetoing these sections to remove the term "academic" because the reference is incorrect and a technical modification is necessary. In statute, this type of employee is referred to only as faculty.

C. GENERAL GOVERNMENT AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

EMPLOYMENT RELATIONS COMMISSION

22. Include Certain Emergency Medical Service Providers in the 2011 Wisconsin Act 10 Collective Bargaining Exemptions

Section 2406d

This section defines public safety employees for the purpose of employee compensation and collective bargaining changes under 2011 Wisconsin Act 10. An emergency medical service provider for the emergency medical services departments in Door and Waushara Counties is included in the definition of public safety employee. Under Act 10, current public safety employees retain the ability to bargain for wages, hours and conditions of employment, including the ability to bargain for employer payment of employee-required retirement and health insurance contributions.

I am partially vetoing this section to delete the reference to Door and Waushara counties because I object to limiting this eligibility to emergency medical service providers in two counties. With this veto, all emergency medical service providers will be covered by this provision, consistent with emergency medical services providers that are considered firefighter personnel for purposes of collective bargaining changes under Act 10.

23. Modify Pay Provisions for City of Milwaukee Discharged or Suspended Police Officers

Sections 1715h and 1715k

These sections require that any member of a police force in a first class city (currently only the city of Milwaukee) may not be discharged or suspended without pay or benefits until a decision regarding the discharge or suspension has been made by the Board of Police and Fire Commissioners or the time for filing an appeal has passed, unless felony or class A or B misdemeanor charges are also pending.

While I understand the concerns that this provision seeks to address, I object to this provision because I believe that

changes to the current law provision should be dealt with through separate legislation in order to gather input from all affected parties regarding the process. My veto of these sections will return pay treatment of discharged or suspended officers in the city of Milwaukee to current law, which prohibits withholding pay and benefits for officers who have been suspended but permits the city to discharge a police officer without pay during the appeals process.

EMPLOYEE TRUST FUNDS

24. Required Minimum Annual Contributions by Local Governmental Units to a Retirement System

Section 1725e

This section requires local governmental units to pay employer contributions into the retirement system in which their employees are participating in an amount at least equal to all the employee–required contributions under that retirement system, no later than December 31 of each year.

I am vetoing this section because it may have the unintended consequence of creating an unfunded liability as the employer–required share will generally exceed the employee share due to employer contribution requirements for protective occupational classes. It may also result in overfunding if the retirement system is fully funded and payments are being made, when savings could be returned to taxpayers or used for other services. In addition, it may encourage employers to delay making payments into the system until the end of the calendar year, which creates the potential for a situation that negatively affects the system’s cash flow.

25. Wisconsin Retirement System Vesting Requirements

Sections 1156k and 1156t

These sections modify the vesting requirements for state and local employees hired on or after the effective date of the bill. Under the provision, employees who separate from service with fewer than five years of creditable service in the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS) and who are eligible for an annuity may only receive a partial annuity under a formula or money purchase benefit. The partial benefit is based on a percentage of credited employer contribution available to the employee and is based on the years of service. Under current law, employees are vested immediately, and the annuity upon retirement is based on a formula benefit calculated on years of service or a money purchase benefit which includes all employee and employer contributions.

I object to this provision as it is administratively difficult and expensive to implement, with little cost savings to the WRS. Because the annuity that would be calculated for employees with fewer than five years of service is relatively modest, those employees are already likely to take their accumulated employee contributions with them upon separation from WRS service.

I am partially vetoing these sections in order to require employees to have five years of service prior to being eligible for either a formula or money purchase annuity benefit by digit vetoing the annuity amount for those with less than five years of creditable service to zero. This provision, as modified by the partial veto, is similar to the vesting waiting period in 25 other states and the WRS vesting provisions that existed until 1998. It will also improve retention by encouraging employees participating in the WRS to work for a WRS–participating employer at least five years.

26. Study of Group Insurance Board Health Insurance Options

Section 9143 (2q) (a) 3.

This provision requires the director of the Office of State Employment Relations and the Department of Employee Trust Funds secretary to study the feasibility of certain health insurance options, including the implementation of a program beginning January 1, 2012, to provide an on–line marketplace for the purchase of prescription drugs. This program would act as a supplement to the existing pharmacy benefit management program provided by the Group Insurance Board plans. The entire study is required to be completed by October 31, 2011.

I am partially vetoing this provision to delete the requirement that the program, if implemented, be offered beginning on January 1, 2012, because it is overly burdensome. The Group Insurance Board is in the process of completing its contract negotiations for the calendar 2012 insurance plan year and would not be able to modify the plans after the study due date.

27. Payment of Employee–Required Contributions – Initial Applicability

Section 9315 (2q)

This provision establishes the initial applicability of modifications to the statutes dealing with employee–required contributions.

At the request of the Legislative Reference Bureau, I am partially vetoing the initial applicability treatment of certain provisions that were already addressed in 2011 Wisconsin Act 10. This veto will retain the initial applicability treatment of only those provisions that were revised in enrolled 2011 Wisconsin Assembly Bill 40 (the 2011–13 biennial budget).

GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABILITY BOARD

28. Statements of Economic Interest

Section 357m

This provision modifies current law regarding access to statements of economic interest prepared by certain public officials and employees. Under the provision, persons wishing to examine a statement of economic interest must appear in person at the Government Accountability Board. Current law does not specify how the Government Accountability Board provides access to the records, other than requiring an individual wishing to inspect the records to provide his or her full name and address. Current practice allows for electronic access to the statements.

I am vetoing this provision because it limits access to statements of economic interest to in-person review. This violates the principles of transparency and open government that are fundamental to public oversight and a key tenet of my administration.

D. HEALTH SERVICES AND INSURANCE

HEALTH SERVICES

29. Family Care Cost-Effectiveness Study

Section 9121 (3g)

This section requires the Department of Health Services secretary to study the cost-effectiveness of the Family Care program, the Family Care Partnership, the IRIS self-directed care program and the program for all-inclusive care for the elderly (PACE). The study will compare the cost-effectiveness of each program to each of the other programs and is due to the Joint Committee on Finance by March 1, 2012.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the requirement that the report be submitted by March 1, 2012, because the department is already required to prepare this information as a response to the 2011 Legislative Audit Bureau study of the Family Care program. The findings of that review are due to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee on August 31, 2012, and to submit a partial analysis in March would be premature.

30. Medicaid Family Planning Waiver Services

Sections 1439n, 1439w, 1439x, 1441b and 9421 (7)

This provision requires the Department of Health Services to request and implement a federal waiver to provide family planning services under Medicaid to women between the ages of 15 and 44 whose family income does not exceed 200 percent of the federal poverty level. The waiver must require parental notification of services provided to females under 18 years old and must specify that the determination of eligibility for minors is based on the income of a parent or guardian.

I am vetoing sections 1439w, 1439x and 9421 (7) and partially vetoing sections 1439n and 1441b because I object to the inflexibility of the language. This veto is not intended to end the program but to instead provide the department greater latitude to determine the appropriate ages and income levels for coverage of family planning services under Medicaid. The veto retains the provisions that require parental notification of family planning services provided to females under 18 years old and specify that eligibility for minors be based on family income and not individual income.

31. Study on the Purchase of Generic Drugs for Medical Assistance

Section 9121 (11i)

This provision requires the Department of Health Services to conduct a study to determine if a competitive bidding process for the purchase of generic drug equivalents provided through the Medical Assistance program would generate cost savings to the program. The study is due to the Joint Committee on Finance no later than December 31, 2011.

I am partially vetoing the provision to remove the requirement that the report be submitted by December 31, 2011, because I believe the department should have flexibility to review all aspects of this option and applying an arbitrary due date removes this flexibility.

SAFETY AND PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

32. Bail Bond Surety Licensing

Sections 373 [as it relates to s. 20.165 (1) (gk)], 496m, 3205p, 3205r, 3212m, 3541g, 3541r and 9140 (5c)

These sections require the Department of Safety and Professional Services to regulate and license bail bond surety agents and corporations and to collect annual licensing fees of \$1,000 per agent or corporation, under requirements promulgated in administrative rule. Surety agents and corporations would be compensated 10 percent of the bond set.

I am vetoing this provision because it does not provide sufficient time to properly evaluate the proposal and to plan for appropriate regulation of this industry prior to the date of implementation. I agree with the intent of the provision to reduce local government administrative costs and ensure defendants show up for court dates. However, although the commercial bail bonds industry works well in many other states, there must be sufficient notice and planning to ensure that counties, courts and regulatory agencies are able to appropriately implement this provision to avoid implementation problems and misuse of the system. Considering this provision as separate legislation will provide time for adequate review and planning to ensure the successful implementation of a commercial bail bonds system in Wisconsin.

33. Unclassified Bureau Director Position Authority

Section 2760

This section reduces the number of unclassified bureau director positions allocated at the Department of Safety and Professional Services from not more than five to not more than two positions.

I am partially vetoing this section because I object to reducing the current number of unclassified bureau directors in the department. While the veto will permit the department to have up to five unclassified bureau director positions, I am

directing the department to maintain the current staffing of three unclassified bureau directors and to remain within their current position authorization level.

VETERANS AFFAIRS

34. Chippewa Falls Veterans Home Cost–Benefit Analysis

Sections 234 and 9101 (2u)

These sections require the Department of Administration to conduct a cost–benefit analysis on the initial contract for the operation and staffing of the Veterans Home at Chippewa Falls and to submit the results to the Joint Committee on Finance by February 1, 2012, or before the Department of Veterans Affairs enters into a contract for the operation of the home. Further, the Department of Veterans Affairs is exempted from the current law requirement to conduct a cost–benefit analysis meeting the same criteria prior to entering into the contract.

I am vetoing section 234 because I object to exempting the Department of Veterans Affairs from the requirement to conduct a cost–benefit analysis prior to contracting for the operation of the home. Further, I am partially vetoing section 9101 (2u) requiring the Department of Administration to conduct a similar cost–benefit analysis because this requirement is unnecessary and duplicative of the Department of Veterans Affairs analysis.

35. Veterans Trust Fund Information

Section 9153 (2j)

This section requires the Department of Veterans Affairs to submit as part of its 2013–15 biennial budget request to the Department of Administration an estimate of the amount of revenues that will be deposited into the veterans trust fund during that biennium and that the total recommendation for appropriation from the trust fund is not greater than the amount to be deposited into the fund.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the requirement that the total recommendation for appropriation from the fund is not more than available revenue because it is overly limiting on the department. It is widely understood that the veterans trust fund is facing financial uncertainty and to place such restrictions on the department does not work toward the goal of finding reliable revenue streams while maintaining services for Wisconsin’s veteran population.

36. Military Funeral Honors Funding – Technical Veto

Sections 9253 (1j) and 9453 (1j)

This provision provides \$68,900 GPR funding in the second year of the 2009–11 biennium to reimburse veterans service organizations that provide military funeral honors for veterans in this state.

I am vetoing this provision at the request of the Legislative Reference Bureau because funding for this purpose has already been addressed in 2011 Wisconsin Act 27.

E. STATE GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS

ADMINISTRATION

37. Disclosure of Expenditures on Internet Web Site

Section 215m

This section requires the Department of Administration to disclose expenditures relating to state agency operations, state contracts and state grants on a searchable Internet Web site beginning July 1, 2013. Once the system is implemented, it requires agencies to submit expenditure information to the department within 60 days, and grant and contract information within 10 days. It also allows an agency to request an exemption from the requirement through the Joint Committee on Finance if the agency is upgrading its computer operations.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove specific dates and deadlines because the department must have flexibility in meeting the goal of this requirement. I am also vetoing the provision allowing agencies to request an exemption from the requirement because it is important that the reporting is complete and consistent for all agencies. I am very supportive of transparency in government and am in complete agreement with the goals of this requirement. When I was Milwaukee County Executive, our administration worked with the State of Missouri to develop a public portal for access to expenditure data. I will direct the Department of Administration secretary to work with states, such as Missouri, to expand the expenditure information available to the public through a searchable Internet Web site. I will further direct the department to immediately report monthly expenditures by state agency, funding source and appropriation through a publicly accessible Web site.

38. Base Budget Review

Sections 218d and 218e

This provision requires one–third of state agencies in each biennium to report an accounting of all expenditures by categories established by the Department of Administration for the prior three fiscal years and the last quarter of the prior three fiscal years. Reports would be due by September 15 and would be included in the agency budget submissions and incorporated in the compiled budget report due November 20 of each even–numbered year.

I am vetoing this provision in its entirety because it is unnecessary. I support the goal of increased transparency and accountability of state government through reporting. This requirement will be met through other reporting requirements in the bill and my directive to the department to immediately report monthly expenditures by state agency, funding source and appropriation through a publicly accessible Web site.

39. Report on Surplus Positions

Section 218h

This section requires the Department of Administration secretary to report quarterly to the Joint Committee on Finance: (a) the base number of existing surplus positions in each agency, (b) the number of surplus positions each agency has created, and (c) the amounts spent on surplus positions.

I am vetoing this section because it is duplicative of information already provided and that will be available through the Web site the department will create under other provisions in the bill. Currently, the department reports quarterly on surplus position creations and deletions. With the creation of the Web site for information on state agency expenditures, contracts and grants, actual expenditures, including salary and fringe benefits paid to state employees, will be available on a real time basis. Any additional information regarding surplus positions can be provided on an ad hoc basis, but providing it quarterly is unnecessary.

40. Procurement Bid Threshold

Sections 246g, 248g, 9301 (3f), and 9452 (1d) [as it relates to ss. 16.75 (1) (b) and (b) 2. and (2m) (b) and (b) 2. and 9301 (3f)]

These sections increase the dollar threshold requiring bids or competitive sealed proposals for procurements made by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System or the University of Wisconsin–Madison to \$50,000, effective July 1, 2013.

I am partially vetoing these sections to remove the language specific to the University of Wisconsin and the delayed effective date because I object to limiting this higher threshold to the University of Wisconsin System and the University of Wisconsin–Madison and delaying the effective date of this change. My budget recommendations to the Legislature in March included this change in the bid threshold for all agencies. With this veto, my original intent to provide all state agencies with the flexibility for more efficient and cost–effective procurement of goods and services will be met immediately.

41. Build and Lease Back Program

Section 9101 (5q)

This provision directs the Department of Administration to explore the feasibility of instituting a program for private construction of buildings for the purpose of leasing those buildings to the state. The study results would be submitted to the Joint Committee on Finance by December 1, 2011.

I am vetoing this provision because it would be duplicative of existing practices. The department, through the State Building Commission, already engages with private contractors to construct buildings with lease/purchase agreements for state government operations.

42. Energy Efficiency Heating, Ventilating and Air Conditioning Systems Study

Section 9101 (1u)

This provision directs the Department of Administration to conduct a study on the feasibility of installing energy efficient systems in state buildings and to submit the study results to the Joint Committee on Finance by December 1, 2011.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary. The Division of State Facilities in the department is already responsible for addressing energy efficiency in state buildings. The department is working with the State Building Commission to continually improve energy efficiency throughout state–owned facilities.

F. TAX, TRANSPORTATION AND OPERATIONS

REVENUE

43. Weight–Based Taxation for Moist Snuff Tobacco Products

Sections 2637n, 2637p and 9441 (3u)

These sections convert the tax on moist snuff tobacco products from an ad valorem tax equal to 100 percent of the manufacturer’s list price to a rate of \$1.76 per ounce and at an equivalent rate for any fractional part in excess of 1.2 ounces. These sections also specify that the tax on a can or package of moist snuff weighing less than 1.2 ounces shall be equal to the tax on a can or package weighing 1.2 ounces. The weight–based tax would take effect on January 1, 2012.

I am vetoing these sections because it may encourage the use of these products by children. Wisconsin’s current ad valorem tax on moist snuff tobacco products maintains a level playing field and minimizes the attractiveness to youth, helping to improve public health.

44. Sharing of Loss Carry–Forwards under the Corporate Income and Franchise Tax Incurred Before 2009

Section 1894d

This section allows combined groups under the provisions of the corporate income and franchise tax to share net business loss carry–forwards that were incurred by group members prior to January 1, 2009. Beginning with the first tax year beginning after December 31, 2011, and each of the 19 subsequent tax years, a corporation that is a member of a combined group and had business loss carry–forwards incurred prior to January 1, 2009, may use up to 5 percent of its remaining business loss carry–forwards to proportionally offset the net income of other members of the combined group, to the extent such income is attributable to the unitary business. If the full 5 percent of the loss carry–forwards cannot be fully utilized in a given tax year, the remainder may be added in a subsequent tax year to the portion of loss carry–forwards that may offset group members’ income in that year. A member of a combined group can continue to

utilize its loss carry-forward until its loss carry-forward is completely used or expired except that pre-2009 loss carry-forwards may not be used in any taxable year that begins after December 31, 2031.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the word "remaining" as it relates to the eligible loss carry-forwards that can be shared by a combined group member because the language in the bill is not consistent with the intent. The intent of this provision is to allow a business to use the full amount of the pre-2009 loss carry-forward over a period of 20 years, or until that group member's loss carry-forward is completely used or expired. The remaining amount of pre-2009 loss carry-forward will decrease each year, and because the percentage would be calculated on this decreasing amount, the business would never be able to share the full amount of its losses.

45. County and Municipal Levy Limits

Sections 1722b, 1722c and 1722d

Section 1722b changes the current law valuation factor percentage for use in setting county and municipal operating levies from the greater of 3 percent or the percentage change in equalized value due to net new construction to the greater of the percentage change in equalized value due to net new construction or one of two minimum valuation factors depending on the property tax year. Section 1722c establishes a 0 percent minimum valuation factor for levies set in 2011 and 2012. Section 1722d establishes the minimum valuation factor at 1.5 percent for levies set in 2013 and all subsequent years.

I am vetoing section 1722d and partially vetoing sections 1722b and 1722c to remove the scheduled increase in the minimum valuation factor for property tax years beginning after 2012 because I object to creating an automatic increase in the minimum valuation factor without knowledge of conditions in future years for taxpayers, counties and municipalities. The ongoing minimum valuation factor would continue to be 0 percent as a result of these vetoes. While these vetoes do not sunset the county and municipal levy limits for property tax years after 2012, it is my intention that the structure of county and municipal levy limits should be revisited in each budget in conjunction with state aid policies as well as current and projected economic conditions for taxpayers, counties and municipalities. I remain committed to protecting property taxpayers through strong property tax levy controls for counties, municipalities, school districts and technical college districts.

46. Property Tax Exemption for Certain University of Wisconsin-Madison Student Housing Facilities

Sections 1747n, 1748d, 9341 (4d) and 9441 (4d)

These sections repeal the property tax exemption for real and personal property of a housing facility that: is owned by a nonprofit organization; 90 percent of its residents are University of Wisconsin-Madison students; there are no more

than 300 students living at the facility; and the facility offers support services and outreach programs to its residents, the public or private institution of higher education at which the student residents are enrolled, and the public.

I am vetoing these sections because the repeal of the property tax exemption for these student housing facilities would place a substantial financial burden on current and potential future student housing facilities at the University of Wisconsin-Madison that provide unique services to students attending the university, including scholarships for residents, student worship groups, and volunteer services not available at university or commercial student housing facilities.

TRANSPORTATION

47. County Highway Department Funding

Section 2221i

Section 2221i requires the Department of Transportation to work cooperatively with county highway departments to determine an appropriate level of state work sufficient to fully utilize the manpower and equipment needed for winter maintenance, and to submit, with each biennial budget request, a funding proposal for maintenance activities performed by counties that is no less than the base amount appropriated plus an inflationary factor, if the department determines that funding for county maintenance activities is inadequate.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the requirement that the department submit budget requests that include funding equal to the amount appropriated in the base year plus an inflationary factor, for maintenance activities performed by counties, if the department determines that funding for county maintenance activities is inadequate. I am partially vetoing this section because funding amounts included in budget requests should be determined by available revenue and transportation priorities.

48. Department of Transportation 10-year Financing Plans

Section 2200m

Section 2200m requires the Department of Transportation to submit, with each biennial budget, a 10-year plan outlining transportation revenue estimates, proposed bonding and debt service.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the requirement that the department submit this plan with each biennial budget, because requiring the department to repeat the plan every two years prevents implementation of any recommendations from the plan on a long-term basis. Long-term transportation finance planning is a valuable activity, at less frequent intervals than this section requires.

49. Southeast Wisconsin Freeway Megaprojects

Sections 9148 (7f) and 9148 (8f) (b)

Section 9148 (7f) requires the Department of Transportation to determine, by July 1, 2011, the portion of unencumbered

funds in the department's expiring southeast Wisconsin freeway rehabilitation appropriations that are designated for southeast Wisconsin freeway megaprojects.

Section 9148 (8f) requires the department to provide the Joint Committee on Finance with a detailed project funding plan for the Zoo Interchange by December 1, 2011.

I am partially vetoing these sections to remove the dates because the department will not be able to comply with the requirements by the specified dates. Fiscal year 2010–11 expenditures and encumbrances will still be in the process of being finalized on July 1, 2011. Once expenditures and encumbrances have been finalized, the department will make the required determinations and transfers. In addition, the department has not selected a preferred design alternative for the Zoo Interchange project and will not have enough information for a detailed expenditure plan by December 1,

2011. The department will provide the Zoo Interchange plan when sufficient information is available.

50. Astronautics Funding

Section 373 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (2) (mq)]

Section 373 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (2) (mq)] provides \$10,000 SEG in fiscal year 2011–12 to the Wisconsin Aerospace Authority for Web site design.

I am partially vetoing section 373 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (2) (mq)] to reduce funding for this appropriation to \$0 in fiscal year 2011–12 because I object to earmarking these funds. By lining out s. 20.395 (2) (mq) and writing in \$0, I am vetoing the part of the bill that funds this provision. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required under s. 13.94 (1)(dh), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit of the Wisconsin Health Insurance Risk-Sharing Plan (HIRSP) Authority for 2010 and have provided an unqualified audit opinion on its financial statements. The HIRSP Authority provides medical and prescription drug insurance for individuals who are unable to obtain coverage in the private market or who have lost employer-sponsored group health insurance.

Enrollment in the state-based HIRSP Plan increased 15.8 percent to reach 18,965 as of December 31, 2010, and increased another 7.2 percent during the first four months of 2011. At least part of this increase is a result of reduced premiums and improved affordability.

Since its inception in 2006, the HIRSP Authority has maintained a sound financial position. Its net asset balance was \$13.7 million as of December 31, 2010, which is slightly higher than its targeted balance of \$12.6 million. However, in response to an unexpected increase in large medical claims and prescription drug costs, the HIRSP Authority is increasing most policyholder premium rates for the state-based HIRSP Plan by 15.0 percent effective July 1, 2011.

In July 2010, as part of federal health care reform efforts, the federal government contracted with the HIRSP Authority to operate a temporary high-risk insurance pool for individuals who are uninsured because of pre-existing medical conditions. The HIRSP Federal Plan had enrolled 307 policyholders at the end of 2010 and is expected to operate until 2014. The federal government funds costs in excess of the premiums collected from policyholders.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the HIRSP Authority, the plan administrator, and the pharmacy benefit manager.

The Department of Natural Resources is pleased to convey to the Legislature the attached report of current data on the status and activities for wetland compensatory mitigation. This is our third biennial report as required by statute. A full version of the report can be found on the Department's website: <http://dnr.wi.gov/wetlands/mitigation/currentstatus.html>.

Mitigation activities began in 2002, when the Department developed administrative rules to implement 1999 WI Act 147. Through the end of 2010, 108 development projects involving wetland fill were able to proceed using compensatory mitigation.

Overall, we find that voluntary mitigation is working and we are satisfied that it is a positive element in the regulatory decision-making process. In the next two years, we will continue to maintain and efficient application process while working with collaborators to make the decision-making process clearer and more efficient.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002 (11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172 (3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the “temporary reallocation of balances” authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of May 2011.

On May 1, 2011, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$197.9 million. This negative balance continued through May 31, 2011, when the fund’s

cash balance closed at a negative \$301.2 million. The Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$301.9 million on May 26, 2011.

On May 1, 2011, the Police and Fire Protection Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$12.9 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through May 31, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$8.9 million.

On May 1, 2011, the Democracy Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$901 thousand (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through May 31, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$896 thousand.

On May 1, 2011, the Environmental Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$10.9 million. This negative balance continued through May 31, 2011, when the fund’s cash balance closed at a negative \$11.6 million (its intra-month low).

The Medical Assistance Trust Fund, Police and Fire Protection Fund, Democracy Trust Fund and Environmental Fund shortfalls were due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund’s share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller’s Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

Section 36.11 (22)(2)(b), Wisconsin Statutes, requires the Board of Regents to annually submit a report to the chief clerk of each house of the Legislature on the methods used by each UW System institution to disseminate information to students on sexual assault and sexual harassment. The attached report is submitted on behalf of the Board of Regents to fulfill our statutory requirements.

The law requires UW System institutions to incorporate into their orientation programs for newly entering students oral and written information on sexual assault and sexual harassment, including information on: (1) sexual assault by acquaintances of the victims; (2) the legal definitions and penalties for sexual assault; (3) generally available national, state, and campus statistics on sexual assault; (4) the rights of victims; and (5) protective behaviors including methods of recognizing and avoiding sexual assault and sexual harassment. In addition, each institution must annually supply to all students enrolled in the institution printed material that includes information on all of these topics. This law was enacted in April 1990, and this is the eighteenth report to be compiled for the Legislature since its enactment.

This report summarizes the primary methods used by each institution to comply with s. 36.11 (22)(1), Wisconsin Statutes. The summaries are not exhaustive of all efforts underway at the institutions. Instead, they summarize the programs institutions have identified as their "best practices" to respond to victims of sexual assault and provide information about sexual assault prevention to all students.

Overall, UW System institutions are (1) continually updating and improving the scope and quality of information provided to students; (2) integrating presentations, small-group discussion of the issues, and interactive dramatizations relating to sexual violence into new student orientation programs; (3) providing educational and resource information required by s. 36.11 (22), Wisconsin Statutes, on the web or in print form; (4) offering educational programs addressing the topic in a wide range of venues, including residence halls, student unions, classrooms, student organization gatherings, and private housing facilities; and (5) establishing effective and important connections among campus and health personnel, local police, community service agencies, and regional hospitals to address sexual violence in a coordinated manner.

The attached report is submitted on behalf of the Board of Regents to fulfill our statutory requirements.

Wisconsin's Emergency Preparedness Program continues to strengthen the foundation of preparedness through planning, workforce competency development training, and exercises. To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As requested by the Public Service Commission (PSC), we have completed a financial audit of the Universal Service Fund (USF). Our audit report contains our unqualified opinion on the financial statements prepared by USF management for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2010 and 2009.

The USF funds a variety of telecommunications and other programs. It is funded by assessments on telecommunications providers that are typically recovered from consumers. In fiscal year (FY) 2009-10, provider assessments totaled \$51.7 million and the USF provided \$41.8 million in funding for 13 programs operated by 4 state agencies.

Two programs—the Educational Telecommunications Access Program and Aid to Public Library Systems—represented nearly 80.0 percent of the USF’s FY 2009-10 program expenditures. The USF has been the sole funding source for Aid to Public Library Systems since FY 2008-09. The Educational Telecommunications Access Program is managed by the Department of Administration (DOA) and subsidizes more than 900 K-12 schools, technical colleges, public libraries, and other educational institutions’ access to a broadband voice, video, and data network known as the BadgerNet Converged Network. Our report includes a recommendation for DOA to ensure that an administrative fee it charges the USF for services related to use of the BadgerNet Converged Network reflects only the actual costs of providing those services. We estimate that at least \$4.3 million of \$5.4 million that DOA lapsed to the General Fund to meet budgeting requirements under 2007 Wisconsin Act 226 and 2009 Wisconsin Acts 2 and 28 represents excess administrative service fees paid by the USF in the past five years.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by staff of the PSC and three other agencies that manage USF programs—DOA, the Department of Public Instruction, and the University of Wisconsin System—as well as by the USF’s administrator, Wipfli LLP.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required by 2005 Wisconsin Act 125, we have reviewed the pupil test score data provided to us by the School Choice Demonstration Project, which is a group of privately funded education researchers who are studying the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program. The Choice program provides publicly funded private school tuition for low-income children in Milwaukee.

Project researchers are conducting a five-year longitudinal study of Choice and Milwaukee Public Schools (MPS) pupils first selected in the 2006-07 school year. The representative sample includes 2,727 Choice pupils who were in the third through ninth grades in fall 2006 and a comparable group of 2,727 MPS pupils. The researchers are tracking changes in Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination scores and determining how participation in the Choice program affects changes in academic achievement.

We reviewed the project's data for the 2009-10 school year, which is the fourth year the researchers arranged for the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination to be administered to Choice pupils. We analyzed and generally confirmed the analyses that they reported in March 2011, which show no significant difference in the performance of Choice pupils and similar MPS pupils after four years. However, we note that only 41.3 percent of the 2,727 Choice pupils in the researchers' sample remained in Choice schools in the 2009-10 school year.

As we discussed in our prior reports, we cannot provide legislators with information about academic performance specific to each of the 111 Choice schools that operated in the 2009-10 school year because the project, citing confidentiality concerns, has not provided us with average pupil test scores at individual Choice schools. However, 2009 Wisconsin Act 28 made several changes to testing

requirements, including requiring Choice schools to administer the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination during the 2010-11 school year and report the results to the Department of Public Instruction.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed an evaluation of educational programs for working adults within the Wisconsin Technical College System (WTCS). Full-time equivalent enrollment increased 16.9 percent from fiscal year (FY) 2007-08 through FY 2009-10. WTCS attributes the increase to an increase in the number of new students, as well as students enrolling in more credit hours.

To help meet the local needs for the occupational education, training, and re-training of working adults, 31.8 percent of associate degree courses held in the Spring 2010 semester by the 16 technical college districts were scheduled after 5:00 p.m. or on weekends, or were available as online courses. Twenty-one associate degree programs are offered entirely online, and the number of online associate degree courses increased 46.4 percent over the six-semester period we reviewed, reaching 2,822 in Spring 2010. Current district policies allow other educational institutions to provide training and occupational programming in rented district facilities, which may help improve access to needed services. However, we include a recommendation for district boards to determine whether such programming could be offered by the technical colleges.

In June 2010, 259,643 individuals were unemployed, including some who were dislocated from their employment as a result of plant closings or mass layoffs. Some dislocated workers are eligible for training services funded by two federal programs, the Workforce Investment Act and the Trade Adjustment Assistance program. We estimated 7,000 students in the technical colleges were supported by these two programs in FY 2009-10. However, given the uncertainty of future federal funding levels and the likelihood of continued demand for training services, we include recommendations for updating information on funding, training needs, and employment outcomes after training.

The Legislative Audit Bureau is required by s. 13.94 (1)(dc), Wis. Stats., to contract for the performance of an actuarial audit of the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS) at least once every five years. After a formal request-for-proposal process, a contract was awarded to the Segal Company for an independent audit of the actuarial valuation as of December 31, 2009. The services provided under this contract primarily focused on verification and analysis of actuarial assumptions and valuation methods used for the WRS by the Department of Employee Trust Funds (ETF) and its consulting actuary, Gabriel, Roeder, Smith and Company.

Enclosed is the actuary's audit report along with responses from ETF and its consulting actuary. The findings, conclusions, and recommendations in the report are those of Segal. Audit Bureau staff managed the audit contract but were not involved in the fieldwork, analysis, or writing of the audit report.

Segal concludes that the stated methods and assumptions used in the 2009 actuarial valuation were reasonable and properly employed in determining the costs of the WRS and notes that the five-year smoothing mechanism used for the WRS is reasonable and meets actuarial standards. Segal also offers several recommendations to improve the consulting actuary's annual actuarial valuations, including working with ETF to improve the presentation of asset information, expanding the description of the actuarial cost method, and applying an assumption related to optional forms of payment elected by some members who retire after a certain age.

Segal's actuarial audit does not evaluate various changes to the WRS that were implemented after December 31, 2009, including changes enacted as part of 2011 Wisconsin Acts 10 and 32. Changes to actuarial economic assumptions for the WRS that the ETF Board approved in March 2011, including a reduction of the investment return assumption from 7.8 percent to 7.2 percent, likewise occurred outside of the valuation period covered by Segal's audit and therefore were not evaluated.

We acknowledge the professional manner in which Segal staff performed this independent actuarial audit and appreciate the cooperation provided by staff of ETF and its consulting actuary.

The Public Benefits Program was created in 1999 by Act 9 to preserve the benefits of energy efficiency, renewable energy and low-income energy assistance for the residents of Wisconsin. Since 2005, public benefits funding continues under Wisconsin Act 141, which allows the state to increase the number of households served. The segregated Public Benefits Fund, which supports the Home Energy Plus Programs, is funded by electric and natural gas utility ratepayers. Investor-owned utilities, participating municipal and cooperative utilities serve about 85 percent of the state's electricity customers.

Wisconsin's public benefits programs are administered by the Department of Administration, Division of Energy Services through the Home Energy Plus Program and encompass two distinct delivery areas. The Weatherization Assistance Program provides weatherization and conservation services, and the Home Energy Assistance Program provides bill payment assistance to resident households with incomes at or below 60 percent State Median Income.

Please take a few minutes to peruse this annual report. I am confident that you will find a comprehensive, productive Home Energy Plus Public Benefits Program. The State of Wisconsin can be justifiably proud of this achievement and the support from our partners and program providers.

At the request of the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed an evaluation of the Contract Sunshine Act, which requires all state agencies to report information about contracts, requests for bids and other competitive proposals, and purchase orders totaling \$10,000 or more in a fiscal biennium to the Government Accountability Board (GAB) for posting on a publicly accessible Web site.

Only 12 state agencies reported information to GAB in fiscal year (FY) 2009-10, and 38 did so during the first four months of FY 2010-11. The posted information remains incomplete and is less than fully accurate because of limitations with the Web site's design, difficulties state agencies have had in compiling data for reporting at the level of detail required by the law, and confusion about which information must be reported. As a result, the Contract Sunshine Web site is of limited value in providing the public with clear, comprehensive, and useful information.

In 2011 Wisconsin Act 32, the Legislature directed the Department of Administration (DOA) to establish a new publicly accessible Web site that will report all executive, legislative, and judicial branch expenditures for state operations exceeding \$100. We include a recommendation that DOA report to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee in January 2012 on its efforts to implement that Web site. If it can be successfully implemented, the new Web site will surpass the Contract Sunshine Web site in scope and potential usefulness to the public, and the Legislature should then consider repealing the Contract Sunshine statutes. If the

Legislature chooses to retain the Contract Sunshine statutes, we present several statutory modifications that would somewhat improve the Contract Sunshine Web site's usefulness to the public.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by GAB. Its response follows the appendices.

We have completed our 2010 financial audit of the Department of Employee Trust Funds, as requested by the Department and to fulfill our audit requirements under s. 13.94 (1)(dd), Wis. Stats. The Department's financial statements report on the financial position and activity of various benefit programs available to state and local public employees, including the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS) and health and life insurance programs for active and retired employees of the state and participating local governments. The statements and our unqualified opinion on them are included in the Department's 2010 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR), which can be found on its Web site.

The largest program administered by the Department is the WRS, which reported net assets of \$75.9 billion at the end of 2010 and provided benefits totaling \$3.9 billion during 2010. The WRS reported positive investment returns and a net increase in retirement assets of \$5.9 billion during 2010. At the end of 2010, the WRS was 93.8 percent funded based on the fair value of its assets and 99.8 percent funded based on standard actuarial measures, which smooth investment returns over a five-year period. As required by s. 13.94 (1)(dc), Wis. Stats, the Audit Bureau contracted with an independent actuary to perform an audit of the WRS's consulting actuary. The results of that audit were released on August 25, 2011.

Accompanying this letter is a management letter we provided to the Department, which includes an auditor's report on internal control and compliance, as required by Government Auditing Standards. We are pleased to note that the Department has taken steps to address a long-standing concern related to cash reconciliations by performing a reconciliation at an appropriation level between the State's official accounting system and the Department's internal accounting system.

Executive Order Number 45

I, SCOTT WALKER, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, pursuant to Article IV, Section 11, and Article V, Section 4 of the Wisconsin Constitution, do hereby require the convening of a special session of the Legislature at the Capitol in Madison beginning at 11:00 a.m. on September 29, 2011, solely to consider and act upon legislation relating to the following:

1. Allowing refunds for the early stage seed and angel investment tax credits and making an appropriation;
2. Entrepreneurial tax credit access grants, providing an exemption from emergency rule procedures, granting rule-making authority, and making an appropriation;
3. Authorizing the creation of a multijurisdictional tax incremental financing district;
4. An income and franchise tax credit for investments in a community development financial institution;
5. Small business loan guarantees by the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority;
6. Changes to agricultural production and loan guarantee programs administered by the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority;
7. Creation of the Wisconsin Next Generation Reserve Board and Wisconsin next generation reserve fund, authorizing the State of Wisconsin Investment Board to provide certain advice, services, facilities, and loans to state agencies and others, and making appropriations;

8. Wetland and Habitat Restoration;

9. Information required to be published on the Department of Natural Resources Internet Web site; identification of areas of significant scientific value for purposes of regulating the placement of deposits and structures on the beds of navigable waters and the removal of materials from the beds of navigable waters; requirements for the placement of certain piers and wharves; repair and maintenance of boat houses and fixed houseboats; permit exemptions for land grading activities and for persons who place piers and wharves in navigable waters; placement of fill or structures within a bulkhead line; procedures for issuing individual permits, contracts, and general permits and contracts for structures, deposits, and other activities in or near navigable waters; expedited procedures for plan approvals for dams and for water and sewerage systems; and granting rule-making authority;

10. Various duties of the Department of Revenue;

12. Advanced manufacturing skills grants for technical colleges;

To the Honorable, the Legislature:

Under ss. 758.19 (5)(e) and 758.19 (6)(d), Wis. Stats., each county is required to submit an annual report to the Director of State Courts that provides information on the actual amount of revenues collected and expenditures incurred by the county for the operation of its circuit courts. Pursuant to s. 758.19 (5)(i), Wis. Stats., the Director of State Courts is required to compile and annually submit the information to the Governor and the Legislature.

Since state fiscal year (FY) 1994-95, the Director of State Courts has compiled the counties' financial information with the warning that since counties do not submit audited reports, the information was not reliable and not comparable among counties because there are differing and inconsistent accounting practices among and within counties. To address these concerns, the 2007- 2009 biennial budget, 2007 Act 20, gave the Director of State Courts the statutory authority to institute a standardized program for recording, reporting, and auditing the revenues and expenditures of Wisconsin's circuit Courts. Specifically, s. 758.19(5)(am), Wis. Stats., allowed the Director of State Courts to create a uniform chart of accounts that "each county shall be required to use for the recording of all financial transactions relating to the operation of circuit courts." In addition, statutes authorize the Director to audit the counties' annual financial information reported to ensure compliance with the uniform chart of accounts. 2007 Act 20 also authorized a two-year project auditor position to assist in the creation of this new program. The extension of the two-year auditor position in 2009 Act 28 allowed the audit

function to be implemented. The project auditor position was converted to a permanent position in the 2011-2013 biennial budget, 2011 Act 32.

In October 2008, the Director of State Court released the Circuit Court Revenue and Expenditure Uniform Chart of Accounts. The chart of accounts provides guidance to counties on how to complete the annual reporting requirements of circuit court revenues and expenditures under s. 758.19 (5)(e), Wis. Stats. Beginning with the reporting of calendar year 2008 information (reported to the Director in May 2009), each county has been required to report the county's revenue and cost information associated with operating the county's circuit court over the past calendar year in a manner that comports with the State's uniform chart of accounts.

The auditing of counties' financial reports began in FY 2009-10. Early audit findings have shown the importance of this audit function by confirming the Director's long held belief that even with a uniform chart of accounts counties' financial data is not complete. In FY 2009-10, the auditor visited 19 counties and found in all counties inconsistencies in the reporting of county financial and staffing. The 24 counties visited by the auditor in FY 2010-11 also had variances between the requirements of the uniform chart of accounts and information reported. My office continues to work with the counties to improve the accuracy of reporting and identifying system improvements at the county level.

To comply with s. 758.19 (5)(i), Wis. Stats., the Director of State Courts has compiled the counties' revenue and expenditure information for calendar year 2010. In total, counties reported receiving \$93.9 million in court-related revenue. However, until all counties have been audited, it has not been verified that this amount represents only revenue collected by the counties that actually support circuit court functions. In addition, during 2010, counties reported incurring total court costs of \$199.1 million, which includes costs relating to courtroom security, rent, utilities, maintenance, rehabilitation, and construction of court facilities for the operation of their circuit courts during 2010 (costs totaled \$159.8 million that are allowable under s. 758.19 (5)(a), Wis. Stats.). Because the initial audits have determined counties' financial information to be inconsistently reported, individual county data is not being presented until all counties have been audited and their reports have been found in substantial compliance with the State's uniform chart of accounts.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required by s. 13.94 (1)(dg), Wis. Stats., we have completed a limited-scope review of the dental services grant provided by the Department of Health Services to the Marquette University School of Dentistry for fiscal year (FY) 2008-09 and FY 2009-10. During that two-year period, Marquette University received \$5.5 million in general purpose revenue to help fund dental services provided to underserved individuals at clinics in various locations throughout Wisconsin.

Overall, we found Marquette University has developed and implemented adequate procedures to ensure compliance with statutory and grant requirements. In addition, we confirmed that dental services grant funds were expended only for services normally considered a part of comprehensive general dental treatments.

We note that dental services expenses exceeded revenues by \$2.8 million in FY 2008-09 and \$2.9 million in FY 2009-10. Marquette University staff indicate that clinic revenues, which include the dental services grant, patient fees, and other revenues, are not intended to cover all costs. Instead, the focus of the clinics is to provide clinical education experiences for dental students and dental services for underserved Wisconsin residents.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required by s. 39.46, Wis. Stats., we have completed a limited-scope review of the dental education contract between the State of Wisconsin and the Marquette University School of Dentistry for fiscal year (FY) 2008-09 and FY 2009-10. During that two-year period, the State expended nearly \$2.8 million in general purpose revenue to provide tuition aid for Wisconsin residents enrolled in the undergraduate dental education program. Individuals were awarded \$8,753 in FY 2008-09 and \$8,665 in FY 2009-10.

Overall, we found that Marquette University was in compliance with its contract and with requirements set forth in s. 39.46, Wis. Stats. The funds were spent only for the undergraduate dental school program, Wisconsin residents were targeted for program enrollment, and minority enrollment was promoted.

We also confirmed that the students for whom tuition aid was claimed had been certified by the Higher Educational Aids Board as Wisconsin residents and were eligible to receive this aid. In the course of that work, we identified one instance in which a student who received tuition aid during FY 2009-10 later withdrew from school, and Marquette University failed to return the tuition aid as required. In response to our inquiries, Marquette University staff reviewed all student withdrawals from FY 2006-07 through FY 2008-09, identified one additional exception, and appropriately returned tuition aid that had been received for these two students to the Higher Educational Aids Board. Marquette University subsequently implemented procedures to ensure tuition aid payments are properly returned in the event of future student withdrawals, and we will evaluate those procedures during our next review.

As required by s. 39.15, Wis. Stats., we have completed a limited-scope review of aid for medical education and of other financial support provided by the State to the Medical College of Wisconsin for fiscal year (FY) 2008-09 and FY 2009-10. During the two-year period we reviewed, the Legislature appropriated \$4.0 million in general purpose revenue for tuition aid and provided the Medical College with approximately \$6.5 million in general purpose revenue for the development and operation of its family practice residency program. In addition, the Medical College received \$299,000 in funding for breast cancer and prostate cancer research through the income tax check-off program, and the State made \$2.8 million in debt service payments related to general obligation debt that it issued in the past to fund a number of construction projects at the Medical College.

Overall, we found that the Medical College was in compliance with requirements set forth in ss. 39.15 and 39.155, Wis. Stats. Students claimed for tuition aid were eligible to receive it and the Medical College targeted 35 to 50 percent of first-year class openings for Wisconsin residents, promoted minority enrollment, and expended funds provided by the State in a manner consistent with legislative intent. We also found that the State's debt service payments were consistent with the debt repayment schedules maintained by the Department of Administration for the applicable Medical College construction projects.

I am pleased to provide you with this report on the Department of Workforce Development (DWD) for the biennium ending June 30, 2011.

As you are well aware, the period includes a change in administration on January 3, 2011. Under your leadership, Governor Walker, DWD has acted quickly to move the state's workforce system in a new direction, one that supports your goal of promoting a business climate that helps the private sector create 250,000 jobs in four years.

Our mission at DWD is advancing Wisconsin's economy and business climate by empowering and supporting the workforce, and our vision is to make Wisconsin the workforce of choice.

This report spans two years of workforce development efforts, but I want to note briefly some of our accomplishments so far this year:

- 2011-13 Budget – The fiscally responsible budget required tough decisions to get Wisconsin moving in the right direction. The budget included a one-week waiting period for initial payment of Unemployment Insurance benefits, saving \$45.2 million a year when the measure takes effect next year. The budget also included \$15 million a year in state funding for vocational rehabilitation services to serve people with disabilities.
- New website – One of my top priorities was to work with staff to identify ways we can better serve the public and communicate the many things we do every day to serve the people of Wisconsin. On June 20th, we launched a redesigned agency website at <http://dwd.wisconsin.gov>, making it easier for job seekers, employers and the public to find information about our programs and services. This project was done in house with existing staff and resources.

- www.JobCenterofWisconsin.com – Our overall objective is to get Wisconsin working again, whether in new jobs we help create or existing positions that are vacant. At every opportunity, we promote this free, userfriendly employment site. Job postings by employers have set records, exceeding 34,000 on a given day and topping 100,000 in early September, surpassing the 75,000 total postings for all of last year.

- Governor's Council on Workforce Investment – In step with efforts to create a more business friendly environment, the Governor's Council on Workforce Investment now has greater private sector representation. The council will play an important role as we work with our partners and all stakeholders to align resources, target funding more effectively and achieve the best results. At DWD, we are working closely with the new Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation to advance the economy.

- Unemployment Insurance – Working in consultation with the Unemployment Insurance Advisory Council, we are setting forth a plan to restore solvency in the UI trust fund, repay funds borrowed from the federal government and strengthen program integrity. As noted, Wisconsin now has a one-week waiting period for benefits. We are working with the UI Advisory Council on other steps to balance the fund. Program integrity efforts have been ongoing.

The year also included centennial celebrations of the two programs that started in Wisconsin and served as models to the nation, the Wisconsin Apprenticeship Program and Worker's Compensation. The apprenticeship program remains one of our best training programs and will serve us well in meeting the needs of employers for skilled workers. With its focus on safety, the worker's compensation program will help employers maintain safe, productive worksites and control costs. Much as we are working to move Wisconsin in a new direction and seek innovation, we also are committed to maintaining effective programs and services, improving them as needed.

We are pleased to be a part of your efforts to advance Wisconsin's economy and create new employment opportunities for the people of Wisconsin, and we look forward to continued success.

This report presents statements of fund condition and operations (budgetary basis) of the State of Wisconsin for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011. This satisfies the requirements of sec. 16.40 (3), Wisconsin Statutes. Displayed are major sources of revenues and major categories of expenditures for the General Fund and other funds compared to the prior year.

The General Fund has an undesignated balance of \$85.6 million as of the end of the fiscal year. This is \$680 thousand lower than the balance of \$86.2 million projected in the estimate for the January 31, 2011 Legislative Fiscal Bureau revenue estimates, as modified by 2011 Acts 10, 13 and 27.

General-purpose revenue taxes were \$12.912 billion compared to \$12.132 billion in the prior year, an increase of \$780 million or 6.4 percent. Collections increased in fiscal year 2010-11 with individual income and sales tax collections 10.0% and 4.2% more, respectively, than the prior year.

General-purpose revenue expenditures, excluding fund transfers, were \$13.565 billion compared to \$12.824 billion in the prior year, an increase of \$741 million or 5.8 percent.

In fiscal year 2011, the State of Wisconsin continued to devote the major share of state tax collections to assistance to local

school districts, municipalities and counties. Local assistance accounted for 56.7 percent of total general purpose revenue spending. Aid payments to individuals and organizations represented 19.4 percent of total general purpose revenue expenditures. The University of Wisconsin accounted for 7.9 percent of total general purpose revenue spending and state operations spending for all other state agencies accounted for 16.0 percent of the total.

The State of Wisconsin expects to publish its comprehensive annual financial report in December of 2011. The report will be prepared under generally accepted accounting principles.

At the request of the Department of Safety and Professional Services and the Department of Administration, and in accordance with s. 13.94 (1s), Wis. Stats., we have completed a financial audit of the State of Wisconsin Petroleum Inspection Fee Revenue Obligations Program for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2011, and June 30, 2010. We have provided our unqualified audit opinion on the Statement of Changes in Program Assets. The Department of Safety and Professional Services' responsibilities related to this program were performed by the former Department of Commerce through the end of fiscal year (FY) 2010-11.

Under the program, the State was authorized to issue \$386.9 million in revenue bonds and commercial paper to provide financing for payment of claims under the Petroleum

Environmental Cleanup Fund Award (PECFA) program. These revenue obligations are not general obligation debt of the State. Instead, they are to be repaid primarily from the \$0.02 per gallon fee charged to suppliers of petroleum products sold in Wisconsin. As of June 30, 2011, a total of \$188.7 million in revenue obligations remained outstanding, including \$117.5 million in revenue bonds and \$71.2 million in commercial paper.

The State collected \$73.8 million in petroleum inspection fees during FY 2010-11. Because the State refinanced a portion of the program's outstanding revenue obligations during FY 2009-10, only \$5.9 million of the inspection fees needed to be retained by the program for debt service and other costs during FY 2010-11. This allowed \$67.9 million of inspection fees to be deposited to the Petroleum Inspection Fund, of which \$8.8 million was used to pay PECFA claims. The remaining \$59.1 million was used for a variety of purposes, including transfers authorized in 2009 Wisconsin Act 28 of \$24.1 million to the Transportation Fund and \$9.2 million to the General Fund. In addition, \$4.8 million was transferred to the General Fund to meet lapse requirements under 2009 Wisconsin Acts 2 and 28.

2011 Wisconsin Act 32, the 2011-13 Biennial Budget Act, authorized the transfer of \$25.8 million from the Petroleum Inspection Fund to the Transportation Fund during each year of the 2011-13 biennium. To ensure funding is available for these transfers, the spending authority in the appropriation used to pay PECFA claims was reduced from \$9.1 million for FY 2010-11 to \$4.6 million for each year of the 2011-13 biennium. A balance is expected to remain in the fund through the biennium. However, if PECFA claims exceed the amounts appropriated, a backlog will likely develop and related interest costs will be incurred. The Department of Safety and Professional Services indicated that it may seek increased appropriation authority to avoid a backlog.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us during our audit by staff of the departments of Safety and Professional Services, Administration, and Revenue.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002 (11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172 (3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the “temporary reallocation of balances” authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of October 2011.

On October 1, 2011, the Workers Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$414 thousand. The cash balance remained negative through October 31, 2011, when it reached a negative \$491 thousand (its intra-month low).

The Workers Compensation Fund shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, was not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund’s share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller’s Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

At the request of the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed an evaluation of Focus on Energy, which provides energy-efficiency and renewable resource programs to utility customers statewide. Investor-owned electric and natural gas utilities, as well as municipal electric utilities and retail electric cooperatives, contributed \$96.9 million in 2010 to fund Focus on Energy. Investor-owned utilities contract for the administration of Focus on Energy with the approval of the Public Service Commission (PSC).

By statute, utilities recover Focus on Energy contributions from their customers. In 2010, Focus on Energy contributions recovered from average residential customers of the largest investor-owned utilities generally ranged from \$0.86 to \$1.16 per month for electricity and from \$0.56 to \$0.69 per month for natural gas. However, payments made by non-residential customers of different utilities varied significantly. The PSC submitted a statutorily required plan in 2008 to ensure more equitable collection of funds, which has not been acted on by the Legislature.

In 2010, non-residential customers received more than \$33.4 million in incentives for energy-efficient products and services, and residential customers received \$16.2 million. An additional \$9.0 million in incentives supported renewable energy projects. We estimate that incentives were paid to more than 78,000 unique customers in 2010, and that more than 385,000 customers benefitted from incentives paid to retailers to reduce the price of compact fluorescent light bulbs and other energy-efficient lighting products.

Analyses completed under contract with the PSC have concluded societal benefits generated by Focus on Energy are more than twice as great as the associated costs. We found that evaluators use analytical approaches that are consistent with

national standards and analyses in other states, and apply relatively conservative methods to estimate the value of program benefits. Given concerns regarding Focus on Energy's cost-effectiveness and effects on customers, we include recommendations for the PSC to improve the quality of program information available to the Legislature and the public.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by

the PSC, utility representatives, and the private contractors involved in Focus on Energy. The PSC's response follows the appendices.

Under the open enrollment program, pupils may apply to attend public schools outside of the school districts where they reside. For each participating pupil, the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) transfers state aid from the district where the pupil resides to the district where the pupil attends school. This per pupil transfer amount is based on the statewide average of all districts' direct educational costs, which include such costs as teacher salaries and fringe benefits but exclude such costs as those related to administration and building operations. As required by 2011 Wisconsin Act 32, the 2011-13 Biennial Budget Act, we have reported on the amounts transferred since the program began in the 1998-99 school year, as well as on alternatives that could be considered for modifying the per pupil amount of state aid that is transferred between districts.

In the 2010-11 school year, 34,450 pupils participated in the program, and the amount transferred per pupil was \$6,665. A total of 224 districts lost more pupils than they gained through the program, 199 gained more than they lost, and 1 did not gain or lose any pupils. Most of the state's 424 districts either had a net gain or a net loss of 50 pupils or fewer, but 39 had a net gain or net loss of more than 100 pupils.

To illustrate a range of options, our report identifies five transfer amount alternatives that the Legislature could consider. To describe the potential financial effects of the five alternatives, we determined the amount of open enrollment funding each district would have gained or lost if any one of the alternatives had been in effect for the 2010-11 school year and compared the results to the amounts each district actually received in that school year.

The financial activity of the Wisconsin Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc., which was organized by ECB for the exclusive purpose of raising funds for its television and radio networks, is included as part of ECB's financial statements. ECB reported a total of \$20.5 million in support and revenue during fiscal year 2010-11, including state support, member contributions, funding from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, and various other grants.

We were able to issue an unqualified independent auditor's report on ECB's financial statements. In our report on internal control and compliance, we note that ECB continues to take steps to improve its financial reporting process and we identify additional areas for it to consider as part of that process.

Pursuant to Wisconsin statutes 16.964 (12)(k), I am pleased to submit the evaluation of the Treatment Alternatives and Diversion (TAD) grant program. An Executive Summary of the evaluation and a copy of the full analysis have been included.

In 2005, the Wisconsin legislature passed 2005 Wisconsin Act 25, which authorized a grant program to counties to establish programs that provide alternatives to incarceration for offenders who abuse alcohol or other drugs. The Office of Justice Assistance (OJA) has been administering the Treatment Alternatives and Diversion (TAD) grant program since its inception. The requirements for TAD projects are outlined in Wis. Stats. 16.964 (12).

The Office of Justice Assistance (OJA) provided staff support to the Treatment Alternatives and Diversion Advisory Committee. An initial Advisory Committee selected the initial grant project sites. A subsequent Advisory Committee monitored project performance and constructed recommendations based on their review and assessment of the data. The Committee's recommendations are reflected in the evaluation.

As part of the program, the Wisconsin legislature required OJA, in collaboration with the Departments of Corrections and Health Services, to submit a report on the cost-savings generated by TAD as well as recommendations for how the grant program should be structured in the future.

The evaluation indicates that TAD projects effectively divert non-violent offenders with substance abuse treatment needs from incarceration thereby avoiding costs associated with

We have completed a review of the Department of Health Services' (DHS's) Medical Assistance program, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. Total Medical Assistance expenditures increased from \$5.0 billion in fiscal year (FY) 2006-07 to \$7.5 billion in FY 2010-11, primarily because the number of recipients increased from 870,201 in January 2007 to 1.2 million in January 2011. DHS has increasingly relied on vendors to provide administrative support to the program, and vendor payments increased from \$66.2 million in FY 2006-07 to \$114.8 million in FY 2010-11. DHS has not always adequately assessed costs before contracting with vendors, and its extensive reliance on vendors raises concerns about DHS's ability to provide adequate program oversight. We include recommendations for DHS to improve its contracting and oversight practices.

Most recipients receive services through subprograms, such as BadgerCare Plus, which are often provided through managed care arrangements. It is widely believed that providing services through such arrangements is cost-effective. However, an estimated \$3.6 billion, or 51.2 percent of all Medical Assistance expenditures, were incurred on a fee-for-service basis in FY 2009-10. We include a recommendation for DHS to consider enrolling recipients in managed care plans more quickly.

DHS's budgeting and financial management practices have not kept pace with the growth and increasing complexity of the Medical Assistance program, and DHS has not been able to readily produce the type of management information that is desired by legislators and needed for effective management. For example, DHS does not include all Medical Assistance expenditures as part of the program's budget or record them as the program's expenditures. In addition, it neither budgets nor routinely accounts for expenditures on a subprogram basis, which is typically how legislators and others deliberate the program. We include recommendations for DHS to better account for all Medical Assistance expenditures and to budget and track these expenditures by subprogram.

The federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act will impact Medical Assistance funding and participation, but its overall effects are difficult to predict because many provisions of the Act will not become effective until 2014. We include a recommendation for DHS to report to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee by January 2013 when more will be known about the likely effects of the Act.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DHS, health care providers, and other groups in completing this evaluation. DHS's response follows the appendices.

We have completed our financial audit of the State of Wisconsin as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011. The State's financial statements, and our unqualified audit opinion on them dated December 21, 2011, were included in the State's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report, which can be found on the Department of Administration's website.

During the course of our audit, we identified internal control concerns that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards. The enclosed management letter includes our report on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance. In that report, we make recommendations for various state agencies to improve their financial reporting and to strengthen internal controls, including those over security of computer programs and electronic data. The management letter was provided to the Department of Administration and to the other state agencies to which we made recommendations for improvement. We will follow up during next year's audit to determine the extent to which state agencies have addressed these concerns.

In addition, we followed up on certain budgetary accounting matters we reported in a January 20, 2011 letter to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. In that letter, we identified \$19.4 million in lapses during fiscal year (FY) 2009-10 from certain program revenue appropriations in excess of the available cash balances. In addition, we identified \$25.9 million in expenditures that were paid during FY 2009-10 but charged to FY 2010-11 accounts.

During FY 2010-11, we found that the Department of Administration took steps to prevent lapses from program revenue appropriations in excess of available cash balances. However, a total of \$567,500 was lapsed during FY 2010-11 from three program revenue appropriations due to an oversight. We also found during FY 2010-11 that state agencies appear to have discontinued the practice of paying for expenditures in one fiscal year but charging them to the next fiscal year. We found no FY 2010-11 payments that were inappropriately charged to FY 2011-12 accounts.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department of Administration and other state agencies during the audit.

The Governor's Council for the Dry Cleaning Environmental Response Program (DERP) is pleased to provide this 5-year Program Evaluation Report. This report is intended to meet statutory requirements contained in s. 292.65 (13), Wis. Stats.

The Dry Cleaning Environmental Response Program is an outstanding example of cooperation between industry and DNR. The costs of DERP are primarily borne by the dry cleaner industry. The industry is proactive in addressing environmental cleanup at dry cleaner facilities. This effort restores value to many family-owned businesses, allows second and third generation owners to continue in the family business, and helps avoid abandonment of contaminated properties and the impact these have on municipalities. This program is a win-win for the State – dry cleaners fund DNR and DOR administrative costs of the program without a need for increased tax revenues.

The 5-year Program Evaluation addresses current and future funding of the program. Over the last 12 years, the Fund has provided more than \$15 million to begin investigation and cleanup at 230 dry cleaner facilities. More than 60 of those facilities have completed cleanup and are now closed. The Legislature enacted the recommendations of the 2006 Program Evaluation which included a 1% increase in fees paid by dry cleaners and helped stabilize funding. Dry cleaners are currently paying 2.8% to DERP on gross dry cleaning revenues and are unable to bear any additional fee increases.

Due to the economy and contraction of the dry cleaning industry, the Council projects that there will be shortfall of revenues to cover projected cleanup expenses beginning in mid-FY14. The Council unanimously supports and recommends the following FY13-15 budget initiatives: direct DOR to publish a list of all licensed dry cleaners quarterly; forgive the \$6.2 million EIF loan to DERP; undertake a study of alternative funding mechanisms for DERP; and provide statutory authority for DNR to directly expend money from the Fund for immediate and emergency actions at certain dry cleaner facilities.

This proposal allows the dry cleaning industry to build upon the 12 years of success in DERP. Working together, we can sustain family owned businesses and environmental remediation. We can continue to ensure that communities throughout Wisconsin benefit from the economic and environmental advantages of the Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Program.

It's my pleasure to share with you some of the successes we are seeing with Wisconsin's electronics recycling program, E-Cycle Wisconsin. This program, which expands electronics recycling options for Wisconsin households and schools with financial support from electronics manufacturers, is helping create jobs in our state and reducing costs for local taxpayers.

E-Cycle Wisconsin is an example of public-private partnerships at their best. The law sets basic ground rules and minimum standards for a statewide recycling program and then gives electronics collectors, recyclers and manufacturers flexibility to set up an efficient, effective system that fits their business models. Wisconsin-based recyclers have been able to expand their facilities and hire more workers thanks to the increased volume of electronic recovered through E-Cycle Wisconsin. Recyclers registered under the program have worked with local governments and schools to reduce their electronics recycling costs, saving taxpayers money.

With more than 400 collection sites in 68 of the state's 72 counties, E-Cycle Wisconsin is making it easier for us all to properly recycle the old TVs, computers and VCRs sitting in our basements and closets. During the most recent program year, Wisconsin households and schools recycled more than 35 million pounds of electronics, allowing the metal, plastic and glass to be used in new manufacturing rather than sitting in a landfill. That's about 6.2 pounds per person, one of the highest collection rates in the nation. Enclosed are three documents with more information. Attachment 1 is a brief summary of results from E-Cycle Wisconsin's most recent program year. Attachment 2 is a report required under s.

The following information is provided for your consideration and review pursuant to §301.03 (6m), Wisconsin Statutes. The figures below pertain to calendar year 2011.

a) There were one hundred and two Chapter 51 mental health commitments within the Department of Corrections. Of

these, eighty-six were initial commitments and sixteen were extensions of commitments from previous years.

Ninety-eight of the one hundred and two commitments were obtained at the Wisconsin Resource Center (male inmates). Of these, eighty-five were initial commitments and thirteen were renewals of commitments from previous years.

Four of the one hundred and two commitments were obtained at Taycheedah Correctional Institution (female inmates). Of these, one was an initial commitment and three were recommitments from previous years.

After a Chapter 51 commitment, male inmates returned to the Wisconsin Resource Center (WRC) for further treatment. Average length of stay for WRC inmates was 315 days. One male inmate was transferred from WRC to Mendota Mental Health Institute on an involuntary basis.

After a Chapter 51 initial commitment, females were transferred to Winnebago Mental Health Institute (WMHI). Average length of stay at WMHI for committed individuals was 45.8 days. For recommitments, females remained at TCI.

b) The total number of inmates who were treated with psychotropic medication in 2011 was 8,290. This number includes inmates who were incarcerated for short-term stays as well as long-term stays. The number of inmates who were treated with psychotropic medication on any specific date is estimated at approximately 4,955. Of these, the number treated on an involuntary basis was the same as the number of involuntary commitments (one hundred and two). Major classes of medication included antidepressants, antipsychotics, and mood stabilizers.

c) Mental Health Services are available at all of the major institutions. Services include crisis intervention, individual counseling, and group therapy. Specific programs include sex offender treatment, anger management, domestic violence, substance abuse treatment, and cognitive interventions. Psychiatrists are available at all major institutions to provide evaluations for psychotropic medication and management of these medications. In addition, consultation is available from both psychologists and psychiatrists to evaluate competency to consent to psychotropic medication and/or medical treatment.

Pursuant to s. 25.17 (14r), Stats., I want to advise you of revisions to SWIB's "Investment Policies, Objectives and Guidelines" approved by the Board of Trustees. These

guidelines apply to SWIB's internal investment managers. The Board made these changes at its November 16, 2011, meeting. I have enclosed an electronic copy of the revised guidelines, a red-lined copy that shows the language added or deleted and a summary of the changes.

The reporting requirements in the statutes appear to only apply to internal management and not to contracts we initiate with external managers or changes we make to existing external contracts. However, because of the amount of assets managed by external managers, we decided years ago to advise you of any new contracts with external managers or changes we make to existing contracts.

In keeping with that decision, we want to advise you that we eliminated three global portfolios, amended one of the investment management agreements for an inflation protected portfolio, and issued a contract with three hedge fund managers. The contracts with the last three managers are in keeping with the Board's asset allocation decision to lower the Core Trust Fund's exposure to risk from equities by making small allocations to risk parity and hedge funds. SWIB took these steps to further diversify its holdings and control risk.

The Joint Legislative Audit Committee has directed the Audit Bureau to conduct a comprehensive audit of FoodShare Wisconsin, which is the State's program implementing the

federal Food Stamp Act of 1964 to assist low-income individuals and families in purchasing food. Although our comprehensive evaluation is ongoing, we have identified issues that require further review by the Department of Health Services (DHS) at this time.

Eligibility for FoodShare benefits is based on the composition of an "assistance group," which generally includes all or most members living in a household. Federal law requires that assistance groups be able to spend benefits anywhere in the country, and \$32.9 million of the \$1.1 billion in fiscal year (FY) 2010-11 FoodShare purchases, or 3.0 percent of the total, were made outside of Wisconsin and in every state in the nation.

It may be more convenient or economical for FoodShare recipients who live in border areas of Wisconsin to purchase food in a contiguous state. However, we identified FY 2010-11 FoodShare purchases made outside of Wisconsin that may indicate inappropriate benefit use. For example, we found 152 assistance groups that had purchases exceeding \$500 that were made exclusively outside of Wisconsin and more than 50 miles from their reported Wisconsin residences. These assistance groups, representing 0.04 percent of the 382,449 assistance groups receiving benefits on June 30, 2011, made purchases totaling \$324,187, including \$151,187 (46.6 percent) that was spent entirely in noncontiguous states. We also identified 334 instances in which a FoodShare card was used to make a purchase in Wisconsin on the same day that the card's account number was entered manually to make a purchase in a noncontiguous state.

We are providing this information to DHS so that it may promptly identify and address instances in which assistance groups used their FoodShare benefits inappropriately.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DHS in completing this analysis. DHS's response follows the appendix.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed our financial audit of the University of Wisconsin (UW) System for the years ended June 30, 2011, and June 30, 2010. UW System's financial statements and our unqualified audit opinion on them, dated December 21, 2011, have been included in UW System's 2011 Annual Financial Report, which is enclosed. This report will be presented to the UW Board of Regents at its meetings on February 9 and 10.

General Purpose Revenue (GPR), which is shown as State Appropriations on UW System's financial statements, increased 5.5 percent, from \$974.4 million in fiscal year (FY) 2009-10 to \$1,028.3 million in FY 2010-11. This funding does not include GPR funding that is used to repay debt on academic facilities, which is technically debt of the State of Wisconsin and not UW System. Such debt service payments totaled \$73.1 million for FY 2010-11 and \$52.7 million for FY 2009-10.

From FY 2009-10 to FY 2010-11, operating revenues increased by \$215.2 million, or 6.9 percent. Tuition and Fees, which accounted for 32.3 percent of total operating revenues in FY 2010-11, increased by \$67.0 million to \$1,074.9 million. Federal grants and contracts revenue increased from \$813.3 million in FY 2009-10 to \$871.3 million in FY 2010-11. Other significant operating revenues of the UW System include state, local, and grants and contracts; sales and services of educational activities; and sales and services of auxiliary enterprises.

Operating expenses increased by \$172.6 million from \$4.1 billion in FY 2009-10 to \$4.3 billion in FY 2010-11. Salaries and fringe benefit expenses, which comprise 66.4 percent of total operating expenses, increased by \$103.5 million. Supplies and services expenses, which comprise 25.0 percent of total operating expenses, increased by \$30.3 million.

Beginning in April 2011, the UW System's new Human Resource System (HRS) was used to calculate and produce employee payroll checks and maintain employee-related information. Because HRS was operational for only three months during our audit period, our review was limited. However, we identified concerns with access granted to users of the system and made a recommendation to UW System to improve controls in this area. We will perform a full review of HRS as part of our FY 2011-12 audit, and determine whether UW System took necessary steps to address the concerns we noted.

Enclosed is a management letter, which includes an auditor's report on compliance and internal control over financial reporting, as required by Government Auditing Standards.

This letter was provided to the UW System and includes our concern regarding HRS security, as well as the status of two continuing internal control concerns identified during prior audits.

In 1997 Act 27, the 1997-99 Biennial Budget, the Legislature established requirements in state law intended to strengthen

protections for children and vulnerable adults in organized care settings. The provisions require, among other things, that designated caregivers conduct background checks on all new and existing staff and bar them from employing anyone who has committed certain crimes or acts. Effective July 1, 2008, the Department of Health and Family Services (DHFS) became the Department of Health Services (DHS) and the DHFS Division of Children and Family Services became the Department of Children and Families (DCF). DHS, DCF and (for certain child care providers) counties and local school boards must perform checks on a provider before issuing a license or other credential. Individuals who have committed prohibited crimes or acts may apply to DHS and/or DCF, counties, or school boards for a waiver of the employment or licensing bans upon evidence of rehabilitation.

Sections 48.685 (5g) and 50.065 (5g) of the Wisconsin Statutes direct DHS and DCF to submit an annual report to the legislature that specifies the number of persons who have sought waivers of employment or licensing bans by requesting to demonstrate that they have been rehabilitated. The report must also specify the number of requests that were approved and the reasons for the success or failure of the requests. DHS has continued to utilize the skills, support and knowledge of its personnel to process all rehabilitation review applications and we are, therefore, submitting a joint report. Attached is the report for 2011.

The Medical College of Wisconsin respectfully submits a revised 2009-2011 Biennial Student Enrollment Report. This report should replace the 2009-2011 Biennial Student Enrollment Report submitted on October 19, 2011.

Prepared according to the statutory requirement under section 13.106, this report covers the period ending June 30, 2011.

In November 2011, the Legislative Fiscal Bureau brought to our attention a precipitous decline in the number of Wisconsin resident students who have been accepted to MCW since 2005 and requested an explanation of this trend. Though the Medical College had recognized this decline as an inevitable result of reduced capitation, we appreciated attention placed on a particularly sharp decline in the 2010 census reporting numbers. Therefore, when preparing our response to the Legislative Fiscal Bureau, we conducted a comprehensive internal examination of admission data, reports and processes.

Through a coordinated approach with our Office of Internal Audit, with leadership from our Office of Academic Affairs, the audit did find some discrepancies between the data we provided in the October Biennial Student Enrollment Report. On December 1, we notified the Legislative Fiscal Bureau of this examination and pending revised report.

The revised final report is now enclosed and submitted for record with the following changes:

2009-2010 Reporting – Reasons for change to Page 4

- Reported Native Hawaiian in the Native American group versus the Pacific Islander group
- Typo (extra digit) in the Pacific Islander Table
- Report for calculating Total Applicants was miscalculated by one – Corporate IT rectifying data

- Reported Native Hawaiian in the Native American group versus the Pacific Islander group
- Report for calculating Total Applicants was miscalculated by one
- Residents Active group: one foreign student was double counted
- Accepted In-State totals: initial report missed some groups in the original count; manual tracking and system generated reports have been reconciled and revised count of 140 has been verified and approved by Director of Admissions. Revised process includes a reconciliation step between the report produced from the system and the manual reporting procedures.

The Medical College is committed to encourage and incentivize Wisconsin students to stay in Wisconsin for their medical training. Significant process improvements are being implemented to ensure accuracy for future reporting, and the Medical College is embarking on new models of community medical education expansion that will, we believe, be an innovative and exciting opportunity for Wisconsin medical students.

The Department of Health Services is pleased to provide this annual report of hunger in Wisconsin, as required under s. 49.76.

There are various Department of Health Services programs available to families needing supplemental food. The following information provides a historical perspective on participation and funding levels of these programs.

The FoodShare Program (formerly known as the Food Stamp Program) benefit payments and individual participation have grown steadily. FoodShare, as an entitlement program, is available to all eligible recipients.

The WIC (Women, Infants and Children) Nutrition Program is a discretionary program with limited funding, as allocated

annually by Congress. There has been sufficient funding to serve all of the people applying for WIC; there are no waiting lists.

The WIC Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (FMNP) is also a discretionary program with very limited funding. The Department serves as many families as possible each year within the available funds. The Program may use unspent carryover funds from previous years to cover higher participation levels when funding is decreased.

Families may also acquire emergency foods through food pantries and programs such as The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP). There are two types of commodity foods in TEFAP. Entitlement foods are based on the state's annual federal allocation. Bonus foods are offered to states as available from USDA.

Definitions of food security are developed by the federal government. Individuals classified as having very low food security have reported multiple indications of reduced food intake and disrupted eating patterns due to inadequate resources for food.

There are many child nutrition programs administered through the Department of Public Instruction that contribute immensely to family food security, including school meals, summer feeding programs, child and adult care food programs, among others. Community partners will continue to work cooperatively to address the many facets that affect family food security and align with Wisconsin implementation plans that include:

- The Healthiest Wisconsin 2020 and the Wisconsin Nutrition, Physical Activity and Obesity State Plan work to improve rates of breast feeding initiation and duration, as well as, improve access to healthy and affordable foods through grocery stores and farmers' markets.

- Ending Hunger in Wisconsin – The Wisconsin Food Security Consortium promotes strategies representing the four “legs” of the food security table:

1. Support and promote programs and activities that improve family economic security
2. Support and promote programs and activities to improve access to affordable and healthy food
3. Support improved access, funding and participation in federal nutrition programs
4. Strengthen the emergency food assistance agencies, programs and network

These successes and challenges indicate the need for continued commitment of the Department to fight hunger in Wisconsin.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

The Legislative Audit Bureau has operated its Fraud, Waste, and Mismanagement Hotline since April 2008. The hotline was established by 2007 Wisconsin Act 126 so that the public, state employees, and contractors could easily and confidentially report suspected fraud, waste, mismanagement, and other improper activities within state government.

Hotline reports are received primarily through a toll-free telephone number (1-877-FRAUD-17), but also by mail and a secure web-based form. We review each report to determine whether it can be best addressed by staff in state agencies or an independent review by Audit Bureau staff. Statutes require us to protect the identity of any individual making a report and to track all reported concerns.

From April 2008 through December 2011, we received 389 reports. In 2011, we received 79 reports, of which 58 were specific to state programs. During 2011, 40 concerns reported in 2011 or prior years were resolved. This summary highlights hotline activities in 2011 and describes outcomes and findings related to selected reports that illustrate the variety of issues addressed through the hotline.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation of the various state agencies with whom we worked to resolve hotline reports or address common types of allegations.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed our review of driver improvement surcharge funding, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. When a court imposes a fine or forfeiture on an individual for operating a vehicle while intoxicated, statutes require that it also impose a \$365 driver improvement surcharge.

The county in which a surcharge is imposed retains 60.0 percent of the surcharge to help fund an intoxicated driver program that provides alcohol and drug abuse services to individuals convicted of offenses related to operating a vehicle while intoxicated. The county is statutorily required to transfer 40.0 percent of each imposed surcharge to the State.

Surcharge funds transferred to the State are distributed to five state agencies, which in fiscal year (FY) 2010-11 spent a total of \$4.5 million in surcharge funds on a variety of activities that supported local efforts to address alcohol and drug abuse issues. For example, surcharge funds were used to purchase breath alcohol testing instruments for local law enforcement agencies and provide free training on how to use them. In addition, the Department of Health Services awarded \$744,300 to 29 counties in calendar year 2011 as supplemental grants to help fund intoxicated driver programs. The other 43 counties did not request supplemental grants.

To help meet statutorily required budget reductions, we found that state agencies chose to lapse \$755,000 in surcharge funds to the General Fund in FY 2009-10 and \$120,000 in FY 2010-11.

We appreciate the cooperation extended to us by the five state agencies that spent surcharge funds.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE

March 9, 2012

To the Honorable Members of the Assembly:

I have approved Assembly Bill 450 as 2011 Wisconsin Act 123 and have deposited it in the Office of the Secretary of State. I have exercised the partial veto in Section 7, as it relates to s. 108.04 (16m)(h), and in Section 11, as it relates to the effective date of the bill.

Assembly Bill 450 establishes a pilot program to permit unemployment insurance beneficiaries to participate in specialized occupational training and receive a stipend to help offset the costs of participating in the training. This program will not only assist unemployment insurance beneficiaries in finding employment sooner, but businesses with skilled worker vacancies can train individuals to meet specific needs.

I have exercised the partial veto in Section 7, as it relates to s. 108.04 (16m)(h), because it conflicts directly with other provisions of the bill. In Section 3, the bill provides that a program trainee is an employee of the employer for worker's compensation purposes. This language was included in an amendment to the original bill. However, the amendment inadvertently failed to remove the conflicting language of Section 7, which specifies that a program trainee is an employee of the state for worker's compensation purposes. My partial veto of Section 7, as it relates to s. 108.04 (16m)(h) ensures that trainees will be considered employees of the participating employer for purposes of worker's

compensation, in accordance with the intent of the amendment.

I have exercised the partial veto in Section 11, as it relates to the effective date of the bill, because delaying the effective date for 180 days would prevent the Department of Workforce Development from collecting meaningful data about the effectiveness of the program. Under the bill, the program sunsets on July 1, 2013. If the bill did not become effective until 180 days after publication, which would be approximately mid-September, the pilot program would last less than a year. This is an insufficient amount of time to evaluate the pilot program's parameters and results. Further, a longer pilot program will match more trainees with more potential employers. My partial veto helps people get back to work and employers to hire workers with needed skills.

Pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes 13.172 (2), I am pleased to submit the annual report of the Wisconsin Justice Information Sharing (WIJIS) program to the legislature.

Wisconsin Statutes 16.971(9) provides the basis for state coordination of automated justice information systems

among state and local criminal justice agencies. The Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance (OJA) housed within the Department of Administration (DOA) has primary responsibility for carrying out this statute.

2011 was a transitional year for the WIJIS program. For the first time, the 2011-2013 biennial budget included stable state funding for staff needed to maintain and operate existing WIJIS products and to fulfill the legislative directive for statewide coordination of automated justice sharing.

The breadth of the justice system (from arrest to community corrections, and all the steps in between) makes a statewide-strategic vision of justice information sharing essential. As an independent and neutral state criminal justice agency that does not have an operational role in the daily administration of justice, OJA is uniquely positioned to facilitate the statewide strategic vision necessary to improve information sharing among the many state and local systems that drive justice system operations.

WIJIS has two main operational products. The Justice Gateway is a web-based search tool that can access multiple data sources stored by local and state agencies in separate data systems at the same time. Workflow Services routes justice information among criminal justice professionals; Workflow Services is a flexible technology that is applicable to solving many justice business process challenges. Additional data submitters and users continue to be added to the Justice Gateway; existing applications of Workflow Services (like eCitations) are well established, and new uses for Workflow Services are in production.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed our annual financial and compliance audit of the State of Wisconsin. This audit satisfies state agencies' audit requirements under the federal Single Audit Act of 1984, as amended, and federal Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133. It also assists us in meeting our audit responsibilities under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats.

In fiscal year 2010-11, state agencies administered nearly \$15.0 billion in federal financial assistance. Included in this amount is approximately \$2.8 billion of assistance received under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. We tested internal controls and a selection of expenditures for compliance with laws and regulations for 31 federal programs that were chosen for review using risk-based assessment criteria established by the federal government.

Our report contains the auditor's reports on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance with program requirements, and our unqualified audit opinion on the State of Wisconsin Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards. We also conducted follow-up to prior audit findings. Overall, state agencies have complied with federal grant requirements and have taken steps to address findings included in our FY 2009-10 single audit report. However, we report both new and continuing internal control deficiencies and areas of federal noncompliance. The federal government will contact state agencies to resolve the findings and questioned costs included in our report.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by state agency staff during our audit. Agency comments on individual findings, along with specific corrective action plans to address the concerns we identified, are included within the agency narratives.

As required by s. 13.94 (1)(de), Wis. Stats., we have completed a financial audit of the Local Government Property Insurance Fund, which provides property insurance to counties, cities, towns, villages, school districts, and other local units of government. The Property Fund is administered by the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance (OCI). As of June 30, 2011, it insured \$50.0 billion in property owned by 1,087 local units of government. We have issued an unqualified opinion on the Property Fund’s financial statements for the fiscal years (FYs) ended June 30, 2011, June 30, 2010, and June 30, 2009.

The Property Fund’s surplus balance, or net assets available to pay future claims, declined from \$41.2 million as of June 30, 2009, to \$20.5 million as of June 30, 2011. A \$12.0 million dividend declared during FY 2009-10 and the highest level of claims activity to date during FY 2010-11 each contributed to the decline in the surplus balance. In response, OCI is implementing premium rate increases and will continue monitoring the surplus balance.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by OCI staff and the private contractors responsible for administration of the Property Fund. OCI’s response follows our report.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002 (11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172 (3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of March 2012.

On March 1, 2012, the Conservation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$3.5 million. The cash balance was negative until March 14, 2012, when it closed at a positive \$1.6 million. The Conservation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$5.8 million on March 8, 2012.

On March 1, 2012, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2.1 million (its intra-month low). The cash balance was negative until March 20, 2012, when it closed at a positive \$313 thousand.

On March 26, 2012, the Lottery Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$4.2 million. The cash balance was negative through March 31, 2012, when it closed at a negative \$122 thousand. The Lottery Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$6.0 million on March 29, 2012.

The Conservation Fund, Medical Assistance Trust Fund and Lottery Fund shortfalls were due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool

and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed an audit of FoodShare Wisconsin, which is the State's program implementing the federal Food Stamp Act of 1964 to assist low-income individuals and families in purchasing food. The program is administered by the Department of Health Services (DHS). In February 2012, we released a related report on FoodShare benefits spent outside of Wisconsin (report 12-3).

FoodShare expenditures, including administrative costs, totaled \$1.2 billion in fiscal year 2010-11. The number of FoodShare recipients increased from 462,204 in 2003 to 1.1 million in 2011. In addition to the economic recession, several factors account for the increase, including policy changes that have increased the number of individuals eligible for benefits, facilitated the application process, and decreased work- and education-related requirements.

In recent years, the accuracy with which FoodShare applicants' eligibility is determined and benefit amounts are calculated has improved. However, the percentage of FoodShare applications processed within federal time limits decreased from 90.3 percent in federal fiscal year (FFY) 2005-06 to 74.9 percent in FFY 2009-10.

In addition, we quantified problems with program integrity, and we identified concerns associated with the provision of benefits to ineligible recipients. For example, we identified 1,639 individuals who received FoodShare benefits in January 2012 even though they were ineligible: 447 recipients because they were incarcerated in state prisons and 1,192 recipients because they are fleeing to avoid prosecution or confinement for a felony offense or because they are in violation of a condition of probation or parole. We provided information on these cases to DHS and law enforcement for appropriate action. We identify several important questions for DHS to consider in effectively addressing fraud prevention and investigation efforts statewide, including how best to facilitate coordination of these functions among counties.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DHS, county agencies, and the advocacy organizations we contacted in completing our review. DHS's response follows the appendix.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002 (11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172 (3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of April 2012.

On April 1, 2012, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$20.9 million (its intra-month low). The cash balance was intermittently negative through April 30, 2012, when it closed at a negative \$2.6 million.

On April 1, 2012, the Lottery Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$554 thousand. The cash balance was negative until April 6, 2012, when it closed at a positive \$13.2 million. The Lottery Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$1.4 million on April 5, 2012.

On April 16, 2012, the Environmental Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$327 thousand. The cash balance was negative through April 30, 2012, when it closed at a negative \$890 thousand (its intra-month low).

As required by s. 13.94 (1)(dh), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit of the Wisconsin Health Insurance Risk-Sharing Plan (HIRSP) Authority for 2011 and have provided an unqualified audit opinion on its financial statements. The HIRSP Authority provides medical and prescription drug insurance for individuals who are unable to obtain coverage in the private market or who have lost employer-sponsored group health insurance.

Enrollment in the state-based HIRSP Plan increased from 16,381 policyholders as of December 31, 2009, to 21,317 policyholders as of December 31, 2011, or by 30.1 percent. However, recent premium increases may slow the rate of future enrollment growth. More than 80 percent of policyholders are enrolled in options with higher deductibles and lower premiums.

For several years, the state-based HIRSP Plan had net asset balances in excess of target balances. Actions by the HIRSP Authority to reduce these balances, as well as increases in claims costs, decreased the net asset balance to \$9.5 million as of December 31, 2011, or \$6.7 million less than the target balance. The HIRSP Authority is accepting the lower level of net assets, in part, due to uncertainty about the future of the state-based HIRSP Plan as provisions of the 2010 federal health care reform legislation are implemented and the U.S. Supreme Court considers cases challenging the legislation.

In July 2010, as part of the federal health care reform efforts, the federal government contracted with the HIRSP Authority to operate a temporary high-risk insurance pool for individuals who are uninsured because of pre-existing medical conditions. The HIRSP Federal Plan enrolled 998 policyholders at the end of 2011. The federal government funds costs in excess of the premiums collected from policyholders.

For the past several years, the Marquette University National Sports Law Institute has provided research studies to the Board of Directors of the Southeast Wisconsin Professional Baseball Park District (District). Law students from Marquette University have completed research reports and comparative analyses on the complex relationships between communities and professional sports franchises.

This year's project, under the guidance of Professor Martin J. Greenberg, who also serves as a Board member for the District, resulted in a report entitled, "Ten Years Later: Miller Park and Real Estate Development in the Village of West

Milwaukee and the Menomonee Valley” (Report). The Report will be presented to the Southeast Wisconsin Professional Baseball Park District at the June 12, 2012 meeting of the Board of Directors. The purpose of the Report is to determine whether Miller Park has had any impact on the adjacent mixed-use development on Miller Park Way in the Village of West Milwaukee and/or the industrial development along Canal Street in the City of Milwaukee’s Menomonee Valley.

The Report concludes that “before Miller Park, the land on Miller Park Way and Canal Street was contaminated, environmentally tainted, an eyesore, or legally blighted. The construction of Miller Park helped create a new focus, a new identification and a focal point for the area. The efforts and investments of adjacent governmental units (Village of West Milwaukee and City of Milwaukee) directly affected and benefitted the surrounding areas through new infrastructure, transportation, access and aesthetics. With the energized efforts of the Village and the City, following the construction of Miller Park, there has been a rebirth within the adjacent business and industrial corridors and a dramatic increase in assessed valuation in both municipalities.”

According to the Report, “Miller Park has experienced the phenomenon of concentric circles (i.e. real estate development near or surrounding a stadium) like many other Major League Baseball (MLB) stadiums throughout the country. Intergovernmental cooperation has proven to help drive real estate and economic development. The dedicated efforts provided by the Village of West Milwaukee and the City of Milwaukee have resulted in successful developments within both communities.” The Report concludes that “MLB stadiums can be valuable anchor tenants for development districts.”

Enclosed please find a report from the Public Service Commission (Commission) on the rate and revenue impacts of the Wisconsin Renewable Portfolio Standard (RPS). Wisconsin Stat. § 196.378 (4r) requires the Commission to biannually submit a report by July 1 which evaluates the impact of the RPS, Wis. Stat. § 196.378, on the rates and revenue requirements of electric providers and compare that impact with the impact that would have occurred if renewable energy practices of electric providers were subject to market forces in the absence of the requirements of Wis. Stat. § 196.378.

The report notes that as of today, the Commission has approved capital costs amounting to approximately \$1.7 billion since 2007 for new utility-owned renewable facilities. The report includes information regarding the impact of the RPS for calendar years 2008 through 2010. Complete information regarding calendar year 2011 will not become available until late in 2012, too late to include in this report.

Using two different perspectives, the report summarizes the overall effect of Wisconsin’s RPS on Wisconsin ratepayers from 2008 to 2010, concluding ratepayers paid nearly \$210 million from the perspective of new renewable generation or, from the perspective of new renewable electricity sales, approximately \$191 million. These dollar amounts translate into an approximately 1.09 percent and 1.00 percent rate and revenue impact, respectively.

The Commission used a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet methodology to calculate the costs of renewable generation used to satisfy the RPS, and to determine rate and revenue impact estimates. For the next reporting period (2010 through 2012), the Commission may consider changes to this evaluation process to provide additional input to the determination required under Wis. Stat. § 196.378(4r). These could include:

- Seeking utility and stakeholder input on the analysis required by the statute. As noted in the report, a variety of factors may influence utility decision-making and value determination in this area. Additionally, the utilities in particular are uniquely in possession of information that may provide additional insight into the costs and benefits of their decision to provide renewable energy to their customers. Providing an opportunity for outside input (through data requests, the annual RPS compliance proceeding (see Wis. Stat. § 196.378(2)(c) or opportunity to comment on this report) may further inform the statutory determination on rates and revenue requirements.

- Utilizing modeling to analyze the question of rate and revenue requirements with and without the RPS. While it was determined for purposes of this report that the spreadsheet analysis done by staff meets the statutory criteria, it is possible that the Commission could get to a more granular and predictive result by using modeling tools already at the Commission’s disposal (EGEAS and PROMOD). This would take a larger commitment of staff time and would benefit from outside stakeholder review.

Stats., s. 50.04 (5)(fr), I am submitting the Department of Health Services' annual report to the Legislature related to Class A violations committed by nursing homes, and forfeitures assessed on nursing homes for those violations. As defined by s. 50.04 (3b), a Class A violation is "... a violation of this subchapter or of the rules promulgated thereunder which creates a condition or occurrence relating to the operation and maintenance of a nursing home presenting a substantial probability that death or serious mental or physical harm to a resident will result..."

On December 2, 2011, s. 50.04 (4)(am) was enacted to eliminate the issuance of a state violation, when a federal deficiency was issued for the same noncompliance factors. Section 50.04 (4)(am) states "Dual federal and state violations. 1. Notwithstanding s. 50.01 (3), in this paragraph, "nursing home" does not include a facility serving people with developmental disabilities. 2. If an act or omission constitutes a violation of this subchapter or the rules promulgated under this subchapter, s. 49.498, or requirements under 42 CFR 483 related to the operation of a nursing home, the department may not issue under s. 50.04 (4) (a) a notice of violation of this subchapter, the rules promulgated under this subchapter, or s. 49.498 if the department has, in a statement of deficiency, cited the nursing home for the violation under requirements under 42 CFR 483 related to the operation of a nursing home."

The Department issued 12 Class A violations in calendar year 2011. The enclosed report provides details on all Class A violations, including the original forfeiture amount assessed and the status of payment.

Section 36.11 (22)(2)(b), Wisconsin Statutes, requires the Board of Regents to annually submit a report to the chief clerk of each house of the Legislature on the methods used by each UW System institution to disseminate information to students on sexual assault and sexual harassment. The attached report is submitted on behalf of the Board of Regents to fulfill our statutory requirements.

The law requires UW System institutions to incorporate into their orientation programs for newly entering students oral and written information on sexual assault and sexual

harassment, including information on: (1) sexual assault by acquaintances of the victims; (2) the legal definitions and penalties for sexual assault; (3) generally available national, state, and campus statistics on sexual assault; (4) the rights of victims; and (5) protective behaviors including methods of recognizing and avoiding sexual assault and sexual harassment. In addition, each institution must annually supply to all students enrolled in the institution printed material that includes information on all of these topics.

This law was enacted in April 1990, and this report has been compiled for the Legislature each year since its enactment. This report summarizes the primary methods used by each institution to comply with s. 36.11 (22), Wisconsin Statutes. The summaries are not exhaustive of all efforts underway at the institutions. Instead, they summarize the programs institutions have identified as their "best practices" to respond to victims of sexual assault and provide information about sexual assault prevention to all students.

Overall, UW System institutions are (1) continually updating and improving the scope and quality of information provided to students; (2) integrating presentations, small-group discussion of the issues, and interactive dramatizations relating to sexual violence into new student orientation programs; (3) providing educational and resource information required by s. 36.11 (22), Wisconsin Statutes, on the web or in print form; (4) offering educational programs addressing the topic in a wide range of venues, including residence halls, student unions, classrooms, student organization gatherings, and private housing facilities; and (5) establishing effective and important connections among campus and health personnel, local police, community service agencies, and regional hospitals to address sexual violence in a coordinated manner.

As required by s. 13.94 (1)(dm), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit of State Fair Park. We have issued an unqualified opinion on State Fair Park's financial statements for fiscal year (FY) 2010-11. In addition, we have continued to monitor its financial condition.

State Fair Park's operating revenue exceeded expenditures by \$2.4 million in FY 2010-11, on a cash basis, primarily because of a successful 2010 Wisconsin State Fair. State Fair Park's cash deficit was reduced to \$235,000 as of June 30, 2011. State Fair Park projects positive operating results for FY 2011-12 that would allow it to eliminate the deficit.

Although State Fair Park's financial condition continues to improve, close monitoring of the operations of the Milwaukee Mile racetrack, the Wisconsin Exposition Center, and the Wisconsin State Fair's ride and amusement area will be important. We note that State Fair Park continues to be involved in a legal dispute with a former racetrack promoter, the outcome of which may affect State Fair Park's financial condition in the future.

We again report a weakness in State Fair Park's internal controls related to financial reporting, which we discuss in the Report on Internal Control and Compliance included in this report. Although State Fair Park has made some improvements to the financial reporting process, we identified material errors in the FY 2010-11 financial statements. State Fair Park corrected the financial statements and agreed to take steps to continue to improve its financial reporting.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by staff of State Fair Park. A response from the Chief Executive Officer follows the appendix.

We have completed a review of the State's economic development programs, as required by s. 13.94 (1)(mm), Wis. Stats. The Department of Commerce and seven other state agencies administered 196 economic development programs at some point during the 2007-09 and 2009-11 biennia. These programs provided grants, loans, bonding authorization, tax credits, and direct services to businesses, local governments, and others. In the 2009-11 biennium, state spending on economic development was an estimated \$226.5 million.

2007 Wisconsin Act 125 required the eight state agencies to evaluate the effectiveness of each economic development program and to annually report publicly on program results. We evaluated agency compliance with these requirements and identified a number of concerns with the completeness of information tracked and reported. For example, Commerce provided us with information on results for less than 75.0 percent of the programs it administered during the 2009-11 biennium as the State's lead economic development agency.

In July 2011, Commerce was abolished and the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC) became the State's lead economic development organization. Although

insufficient time has passed since WEDC's creation for us to assess its administration of economic development programs, we include recommendations it could use to improve program effectiveness and accountability. As required by statutes, we will conduct an audit in 2013 to assess WEDC's financial management and evaluate its programs.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by WEDC and the eight agencies we reviewed. WEDC's response follows the appendices.

As required by s. 13.94 (1)(em), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit of the Wisconsin Lottery, which is administered by the Department of Revenue. We have issued an unqualified opinion on the Wisconsin Lottery's fiscal year (FY) 2010-11 and FY 2009-10 financial statements. We also found that the Wisconsin Lottery was in compliance with statutory spending limitations related to prizes, product information, administrative expenses, and retailer compensation.

During FY 2010-11, the Wisconsin Lottery generated total ticket sales of \$502.7 million, which was 4.5 percent more than FY 2009-10. Instant ticket sales increased \$29.4 million as a result of an increase in sales of \$20 instant scratch-off tickets and an increase in the number and timing of new scratch-off games offered during FY 2010-11. Sales of lotto tickets, which are sold through terminals at lottery retail locations, declined \$7.6 million during FY 2010-11 primarily because there were fewer large Powerball jackpots. As ticket sales increased during FY 2010-11, so did the Wisconsin Lottery's operating expenses.

In FY 2010-11, lottery proceeds used for property tax relief totaled \$144.9 million, which included \$129.1 million for the Lottery and Gaming Tax Credit. On November 1, 2011, the Department of Administration and the Legislature's Joint Committee on Finance authorized the use of \$137.6 million in Wisconsin Lottery proceeds for the Lottery and Gaming Tax Credit for property tax relief in FY 2011-12.

Attached please find the Department of Administration's (DOA) Contractual Services Purchasing Report for Fiscal Year 2011 (FY11) pursuant to §16.705 (8), Wis. Stats. Overall, contracting increased seventeen percent since Fiscal Year 2010 however the State of Wisconsin has reduced contractual spending by \$62.9 million since Fiscal Year 2005.

The report also includes information on cost-benefit analyses produced by state agencies and campuses during FY11. Wisconsin Act 89 requires state agencies and campuses to conduct a cost-benefit analysis prior to any proposed contractual service procurement over \$25,000. A summary of the 355 cost-benefit analyses produced during FY11 is included in this report.

As required in 2011 Wisconsin Act 32, the Department of Corrections has completed a report on juvenile delinquency-related services provided by the state and counties. The Act required the Department to include in the report a list of all providers of juvenile delinquency services, the number of juveniles receiving each service, whether each juvenile was supervised by the county or the state, and an

accounting of the costs of the services provided. To collect the required information, the Department worked with county staff to develop and administer a survey of all 72 Wisconsin counties and reviewed Division of Juvenile Corrections records on the juvenile correctional services provided or purchased. The report includes information as of CY 2010, which represents the most current data available at the time the effort was undertaken. It should be noted the Department was not able to independently audit the information provided to us by counties, and due to differences in counties' services and accounting methods, some figures may be approximations.

In CY 2010, the Department billed counties and the state \$46.5 million to serve 942 youth in juvenile correctional institutions and 560 youth in the community under the Department's supervision. The Department also provided or purchased additional services for youth, including residential services, therapy, and mentoring. Counties collectively spent \$69.4 million on intake and supervision services in CY 2010 and an additional \$84.7 million on residential and other juvenile delinquency-related services, excluding services provided by the Department.

We appreciate the cooperation extended to us by county human service departments, county courts, and other county agencies involved in providing the information contained in this report. All counties will be receiving a copy of the report.

It is the plan of the Department of Corrections (DOC) to operate and maintain facilities in a manner to cost effectively reduce energy consumption and costs whenever possible. Due to constraints on capital spending and staffing, plus the mandated requirements of safety and security for inmates and personnel, regulatory compliance, and court-ordered spending, it may not be possible to pursue every energy cost saving opportunity. The current and forecasted cost of fuel supplies, with natural gas being plentiful and relatively low cost at the moment, make long term energy project justification difficult in the near term.

In the July 1, 2012, to June 30, 2014, report period, DOC plans to implement using All-Agency Capital funds only one project that is specifically designed for energy cost savings for

which the savings is expected to exceed the cost of the installation over the life of the equipment: installation of a waste heat economizer on boiler number 4 at Waupun Central Generating plant. The cost of \$300,000 is expected to reduce fuel costs by \$30,000 per year through improved boiler efficiency with waste heat recovery. Other building and equipment replacement projects will be designed in accordance with Executive Order #63 dated March 9, 2012, which requires meeting or exceeding commercial code energy efficiency by at least 10 percent.

DOC has also initiated a series of Energy Performance Contracting projects that will be implemented during the report period in accordance with DOA/DSF procedures. These projects will utilize funding from the PRSB energy bonds that will be paid back with the energy savings generated over the term of the project. DOA has indicated an initial commitment of \$20 million in PRSB funds, subject to State Building Commission approval, for the cost of projects. Potential overall energy cost savings potential is estimated to be about \$2 million per year once all projects are implemented.

On June 1, 2012, the Environmental Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$7.7 million. The cash balance was negative until June 29, 2012, when it closed at a positive \$1.7 million. The Environmental Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$9.1 million on June 28, 2012.

The Medical Assistance Trust Fund and Environmental Fund shortfalls were due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, were not in excess of the statutory interfund

We have completed our review of crime victim and witness assistance surcharge revenue, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. Statutes require circuit courts to assess a \$92 surcharge for each felony conviction and a \$67 surcharge for each misdemeanor conviction. Circuit courts collect most surcharge revenue, which is deposited into two Department of Justice (DOJ) appropriations that fund two crime victim services programs and a sexual assault victim services grant program.

Questions have been raised regarding the reasons surcharge revenue declined from \$5.9 million in fiscal year (FY) 2008-09 to \$5.7 million in FY 2010-11, despite a \$7 increase in the surcharge that began in FY 2009-10. From FY 2008-09 through FY 2010-11, the number of criminal charges filed that could result in assessed surcharges declined by 13.6 percent, and the number of convictions declined by 12.4 percent. Judges have the discretion to reduce the surcharge, but the available data indicate that they seldom did so in recent years. However, individuals have not made any payments on \$12.7 million in surcharges that were assessed from FY 2006-07 through FY 2010-11.

We found some surcharge revenue was not appropriately deposited into the two DOJ appropriations. As a result, the sexual assault victim services grant program received an estimated \$204,000 less than was statutorily required in recent years, and that amount was instead provided to the two crime victim services programs. Other errors in allocating revenue from surcharges assessed in prior years continue to occur, which will result in the sexual assault victim services grant program receiving an undetermined amount of additional funding in the future. Because these errors are related only to the allocation of surcharge revenue, they do not affect the overall amount of surcharge revenue collected or explain the decline in surcharge revenue.

We appreciate the cooperation extended to us by the state agencies involved with this review, as well as by county clerk of court offices and district attorney offices. DOJ’s response follows the appendix.

As required by 2005 Wisconsin Act 125, we have reviewed the pupil test score data provided to us by the School Choice Demonstration Project, which is a group of privately funded education researchers who are studying the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program. The Choice program provides publicly funded private school tuition for children in Milwaukee.

Project researchers conducted a five-year longitudinal study of Choice and Milwaukee Public Schools (MPS) pupils first selected in the 2006-07 school year. The representative sample includes 2,727 Choice pupils who were in the third through ninth grades in fall 2006 and a comparable group of 2,727 MPS pupils. The researchers tracked changes in Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination scores to determine how participation in the Choice program affects academic achievement. Their five-year study has now concluded, and we have fulfilled our responsibilities under 2005 Wisconsin Act 125.

We reviewed the project's data for the 2010-11 school year, which is the last year the researchers arranged to receive test scores of Choice pupils who took the Wisconsin Knowledge

and Concepts Examination. Using different methodologies, we and the researchers found separate instances in which the average change in Choice pupils' test scores from the 2006-07 school year to the 2010-11 school year was greater than the average change in MPS pupils' test scores, and the differences in average test score changes were statistically significant. However, these test score results must be interpreted carefully.

To interpret their findings, the researchers reported evidence suggesting that increases in Choice pupils' test scores in the 2010-11 school year resulted, at least in part, from a new testing and reporting requirement, rather than solely from participation in the Choice program. Beginning in the 2010-11 school year, all Choice schools were statutorily required to administer the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination to pupils and report the results to the Department of Public Instruction. As a result, we and the researchers believe the extent to which the Choice program affects pupil achievement cannot be definitively determined based on the test score results obtained from the longitudinal study.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by project researchers as we conducted this review.

We have completed our review of the Department of Administration's (DOA's) Division of Gaming, as required by s. 13.94 (1)(eg), Wis. Stats. The Division oversees Indian gaming, charitable gaming activities, and pari-mutuel racing in Wisconsin. However, the last operating greyhound racetrack in Wisconsin closed in December 2009. Statutes continue to authorize pari-mutuel racing in the State, but the Division has not received applications from businesses seeking to operate racing venues.

In fiscal year (FY) 2011-12, the Division's expenditures to regulate gaming activities totaled \$2.3 million in program revenue. We analyzed a judgment sample of its expenditures over a three-year period and found that reimbursements were sufficiently documented and appear to be reasonable.

Indian gaming represents the most significant gaming activity in Wisconsin. In June 2012, 11 tribes operated 25 casinos. In 2011, tribal gaming revenue was \$1.3 billion, tribal gaming expenses were \$742.1 million, and tribal gaming profits were \$566.7 million. In FY 2011-12, the State received \$52.1 million from tribes under the revenue-sharing provisions of the negotiated gaming compacts.

The Division conducts on-site financial and compliance audits to independently verify the amounts wagered on Class III gaming and to ensure that casino operations are consistent with standards established in the gaming compacts. From January 2010 through July 2012, the Division conducted 66 financial audits and 55 compliance audits. We analyzed a random selection of working papers associated with audits completed in 2011 and 2012. The documents we reviewed were sufficient to show that the Division followed its audit procedures.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Division. The Division's response follows the appendix.

This report presents statements of fund condition and operations (budgetary basis) of the State of Wisconsin for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012. This satisfies the requirements of sec. 16.40 (3), Wisconsin Statutes. Displayed are major sources of revenues and major categories of expenditures for the General Fund and other funds compared to the prior year.

The General Fund has an undesignated balance of \$342.1 million as of the end of the fiscal year. This is \$50.5 million higher than the balance of \$291.6 million projected in appropriation summaries under Chapter 20 of the Wisconsin Statutes, approved in the August 10, 2012 meeting of the Legislative Joint Finance Committee.

General-purpose revenue taxes were \$13.515 billion compared to \$12.912 billion in the prior year, an increase of \$603 million or 4.7 percent. Collections increased in fiscal year 2011-12 with individual income and sales tax collections 5.1% and 4.4% more, respectively, than the prior year.

General-purpose revenue expenditures, excluding fund transfers, were \$13.381 billion compared to \$13.565 billion in the prior year, a decrease of \$184 million or 1.4 percent. In fiscal year 2012, the State of Wisconsin continued to devote the major share of state tax collections to assistance to local school districts, municipalities and counties. Local assistance accounted for 53.7 percent of total general purpose revenue spending. Aid payments to individuals and organizations represented 22.4 percent of total general purpose revenue

expenditures. The University of Wisconsin accounted for 6.8 percent of total general purpose revenue spending and state operations spending for all other state agencies accounted for 17.1 percent of the total.

The State of Wisconsin expects to publish its comprehensive annual financial report in December of 2012. The report will be prepared under generally accepted accounting principles.

The 2011-13 Biennial Budget (2011 Wisconsin Act 32) was balanced in part on achieving the following required lapses and transfers of funds to the general fund:

- DOA-allocated lapse of \$174.3 million from GPR and PR appropriations with cash balances, of which \$51,005,664 remains to occur in fiscal year 2012-13;
- PR lapses related to employee compensation changes, elimination of long-term vacant positions and across-the-board reductions;
- GPR and PR lapses related to the 2 percent pay increase received by represented employees in June 2009.

This memo focuses on the allocation of the \$51 million remaining from the \$174.3 million DOA-allocated lapse requirement under s. 9255 (1)(b) and the review and approval

process for all of the required lapses. Attached are the lapse allocation amounts for each of the lapses listed above. As in the past, specific exemptions were granted for high-priority programs, and lapses may not be taken from sum sufficient or federal appropriations. Unlike past biennia, the lapses may not be taken from segregated appropriations or any program revenue appropriations within the University of Wisconsin System. Finally, these lapse allocations may only be taken from sum certain GPR or PR appropriations that have a positive cash balance.

Agencies should submit lapse plans for those required under Act 32 to Brian Hayes, State Budget Director, by Monday, November 19th, outlining how the fiscal year 2012-13 lapses will be taken. These plans should minimize layoffs of state employees and should take advantage of high vacancy rates that exist in most state agencies. Any proposals that require

changes in statutory language should be noted. After the plans have been reviewed and approved, a consolidated plan that outlines the DOA-allocated lapse under s. 9255 (1)(b) will be submitted to the Joint Committee on Finance under its 14-day passive review authority.

These lapses will present operational challenges and opportunities to state agencies. The Governor remains committed to putting Wisconsin's state government on a stable fiscal footing while ensuring that it functions as efficiently and effectively as possible.

We appreciate the efforts of you and your staff in identifying creative ways to manage these reductions.

At the request of the Department of Safety and Professional Services and the Department of Administration, and in

accordance with s. 13.94 (1s), Wis. Stats., we have completed a financial audit of the State of Wisconsin Petroleum Inspection Fee Revenue Obligations Program for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2012, and June 30, 2011. We have provided our unqualified audit opinion on the cash-basis Statement of Changes in Program Assets.

Under the program, the State was authorized to issue \$386.9 million in revenue bonds and commercial paper to provide financing for payment of claims under the Petroleum Environmental Cleanup Fund Award (PECFA) program. These revenue obligations are not general obligation debt of the State. Instead, they are to be repaid primarily from the \$0.02 per gallon fee charged to suppliers of petroleum products sold in Wisconsin. As of June 30, 2012, a total of \$188.7 million in revenue obligations remained outstanding, including \$117.5 million in revenue bonds and \$71.2 million in commercial paper.

The State collected \$74.3 million in petroleum inspection fees in fiscal year (FY) 2011-12. In part because the State previously refinanced the revenue bonds, no principal balance was repaid during our audit period and only \$7.8 million of the inspection fees needed to be retained by the program in FY 2011-12 for debt service and other purposes. This allowed \$66.5 million of inspection fees to be deposited to the Petroleum Inspection Fund in FY 2011-12, of which \$6.9 million was used to pay PECFA claims. The remaining \$59.6 million was used for a variety of purposes, including required transfers to the Transportation Fund. Because some fees were not spent, the Petroleum Inspection Fund balance increased from \$2.5 million at the end of FY 2010-11 to \$17.8 million at the end of FY 2011-12.

2011 Wisconsin Act 32, the 2011-13 Biennial Budget Act, required transfers totaling \$25.8 million from the Petroleum Inspection Fund to the Transportation Fund in each year of the 2011-13 biennium. In part to ensure funding is available for the transfers, the spending authority in the appropriation used to pay PECFA claims was reduced from \$19.2 million for the 2009-11 biennium to \$9.1 million for the 2011-13 biennium. Consequently, it is likely that PECFA claims will exceed the available spending authority in FY 2012-13.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002 (11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172 (3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the “temporary reallocation of balances” authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of October 2012.

On October 1, 2012, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$4.4 million (its intra-month low). The cash balance was negative until October 23, 2012, when it closed at a positive \$187 thousand.

On October 1, 2012, the Critical Access Hospital Assessment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$98 thousand (its intra-month low). The cash balance was negative until October 2, 2012, when it closed at a positive \$113 thousand.

The Medical Assistance Trust Fund and Critical Access Hospital Assessment Fund shortfalls were due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

It's my pleasure to share with you some of the successes we are seeing with Wisconsin's electronics recycling program, E-Cycle Wisconsin. This program, which expands electronics recycling options for Wisconsin households and schools with financial support from electronics manufacturers, is helping create jobs in our state and reducing costs for local taxpayers.

With more than 400 collection sites in 69 of the state's 72 counties, E-Cycle Wisconsin is making it easier for us all to properly recycle the old TVs, computers and VCRs sitting in our basements and closets. During the most recent program year, Wisconsin households and schools recycled 39.1 million pounds of electronics, allowing the metal, plastic and glass to be used in new manufacturing rather than sitting in a landfill. That's about 6.8 pounds per person, one of the highest collection rates in the nation. By the end of 2012, we expect the program will have collected 100 million pounds since it began in January 2010.

Enclosed is the annual report on Wisconsin's electronics recycling law, required under s. 287.17 (10), Wis. Stats. The report includes a summary of program results to date, an update on implementation of the bans on landfilling or incinerating electronics, and a summary of the law's economic impacts. As required under the statute, the report also includes a discussion of potential challenges and

recommendations for small tweaks to the law to help it work better for businesses and consumers.

As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed a review of the extent to which state and local governments employ individuals receiving annuities from the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS). If individuals have good-faith terminations from employment, statutes allow

them to receive annuities and return to work for employers participating in the WRS.

From January 2007 through March 2012, the University of Wisconsin System and state agencies on Central Payroll hired 2,783 annuitants who had terminated employment from 2007 through 2011. Because some of these annuitants were not working in positions eligible to participate in the WRS, not all are considered to be rehired annuitants. Most annuitants we identified were hired by the agencies that had employed them before retirement, worked part-time for less than one year, and were paid an hourly wage that was the same or lower than they had been paid at retirement. However, a small number of annuitants we identified worked for several years or were paid an hourly wage more than they had been paid at retirement.

A total of 1,169 respondents to our survey of all school districts and local governments indicated that they had hired 2,599 annuitants from January 2011 through March 2012. Most annuitants were paid hourly wages less than the wages they had been paid at retirement.

The Department of Employee Trust Funds (ETF) administers the WRS. It may choose to investigate allegations that good-faith terminations from employment may not have occurred. Because statutes provide few restrictions on annuitants who return to work, it is difficult for ETF to determine that good-faith terminations did not occur. We include a recommendation for ETF to develop written procedures for conducting investigations.

We provide several options the Legislature could consider if it chooses to modify statutes governing how annuitants are able to return to work for WRS-participating employers. In addition to these options, the four midwestern states we contacted and the federal government have placed other restrictions on the conditions under which annuitants in their respective retirement systems may be hired.

As directed by 2011 Wisconsin Act 32, we have reviewed the University of Wisconsin (UW) System's use of broadband services and its relationship with WiscNet. WiscNet provides internet and other services to UW System institutions and other governmental and educational entities, including approximately three-fourths of Wisconsin's public school districts.

Although WiscNet is a membership-based nonprofit research and education association, its staff are UW System employees

and its operations are integrated with those of UW System institutions. For example, UW-Madison serves as WiscNet's fiscal agent. WiscNet typically charges less for its services than commercial providers charge for similar services, in part, because WiscNet does not incur all of the costs that commercial providers do. The lack of sufficient written agreements between UW-Madison and WiscNet for the provision of goods and services lead us to question the adequacy of reimbursements.

In order to receive internet service from WiscNet, its members must obtain internet connections from other providers. Most obtain these connections through BadgerNet, a state-supported network operated by a consortium of private telecommunications companies. However, UW System has also developed its own network. In 2010, UW System institutions received \$35.0 million in federal stimulus funds for the construction of networks that will provide internet connections to UW System institutions and other entities.

2011 Wisconsin Act 32 made statutory changes affecting the provision of telecommunications services by UW System institutions and their involvement with WiscNet and the grant-funded networks. Because UW System's future plans for obtaining internet services and its future role in the grant-funded networks have not been finalized, we could not assess its compliance with Act 32 at the present time. Therefore, continued monitoring will be necessary.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by UW System, WiscNet and its members, the Department of Administration, and commercial telecommunications providers in completing this evaluation. UW System's response follows the appendices.

We have completed a financial audit of the State of Wisconsin Educational Communications Board (ECB) to meet our audit requirements under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats., and as requested by ECB to fulfill the audit requirements under s. 440.42(3), Wis. Stats., and of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. The Corporation requires audited financial statements of public broadcasting entities to determine future funding levels. Our audit report contains ECB's financial statements and related notes as of and for the years ended June 30, 2012, and June 30, 2011.

ECB, which is an agency of the State of Wisconsin, operates a television network of 5 digital stations and 3 radio networks consisting of 14 FM stations and 1 AM station. The financial activity of the Wisconsin Public Broadcasting Foundation, Inc., which was organized by ECB for the exclusive purpose of raising funds for its television and radio networks, is included as part of ECB's financial statements. ECB reported a total of \$20.6 million in revenue during fiscal year 2011-12, including state support, member contributions, funding from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, and various other grants.

We were able to issue an unqualified independent auditor's report on ECB's financial statements and related notes as of and for the years ended June 30, 2012, and June 30, 2011. In our report on internal control and compliance, we note that ECB continues to take steps to improve its financial reporting process. However, given the number of errors we identified in its financial statements and notes, we again report a significant deficiency in its financial reporting process.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by ECB staff during the audit.
