## **Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

The State Public Defender (SPD) is statutorily authorized and required to appoint attorneys to represent indigent defendants in criminal and certain commitment proceedings. The SPD plays a critical role in ensuring that the Wisconsin justice system complies with the right to counsel provided by both the state and federal constitutions. Any legislation has the potential to increase SPD costs if it creates a new criminal offense, expands the definition of an existing criminal offense, or increases the penalties for an existing offense.

This bill allows a county to seek reimbursement for any expenses incurred by the county in relation to the crime for which a person was confined in jail, regardless of whether the person was sentenced to county jail, placed on probation or sentenced to a state prison. Current law allows the county to file a suit against a person for expenses if the person was placed on probation and confined in the county jail or is sentenced to a county jail.

The SPD is unable to estimate the amount of additional revenue to the county that might occur due to the provisions in the bill. Revenue estimates would be dependent on counties filing a suit against a person in circuit court and then actually collecting the funds if a person is required to pay for their confinement expenses.

Allowing counties to seek reimbursement of these costs reduces the ability for clients of the SPD to pay other fees and fines, including the modest cost of counsel charged by the SPD to provide representation. It is impossible to quantify the effect this might have on SPD collection of this program revenue.
