Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

The bill makes several change to statutes related to local zoning ordinances.

Local Fiscal Effect

Exact costs to local government are characterized as indeterminate because it is difficult to determine how many towns/counties would take advantage of the provisions of the bill.

However, it is foreseeable that:

- 1. Every 3 years counties could be faced with the indeterminate workload and fiscal impact of adopting or repealing ordinances and the loss/gain of zoning jurisdiction.
- 2. Towns could also be faced with an indeterminate workload and fiscal impact. If a town decides to withdraw from county zoning and the county responds by opting to repeal ordinances for all towns that are subject to those ordinances, then the bill requires all of the towns in that county to adopt a comprehensive plan, a zoning ordinance and an official map.
