Description Presumption of reasonableness in a criminal or civil case involving self-defense										

Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

The State Public Defender (SPD) is statutorily authorized and required to appoint attorneys to represent indigent defendants in criminal and certain commitment proceedings. The SPD plays a critical role in ensuring that the Wisconsin justice system complies with the right to counsel provided by both the state and federal constitutions. Any legislation has the potential to increase SPD costs if it creates a new criminal offense, expands the definition of an existing criminal offense, or increases the penalties for an existing offense.

Current law, in general, provides that a person who uses force in self-defense or in the defense of another person may not be convicted of a crime stemming from that use of force if the amount of force used is reasonable and the person uses that force to prevent or stop what he or she reasonably believes is unlawful interference with himself or herself or another person. Current law also confers immunity from civil liability for a person who uses force that is intended to or likely to cause death or great bodily harm if the person reasonably believed that the force was necessary to prevent death or bodily harm of himself or herself or another person. This bill repeals the presumption of reasonableness in criminal and civil actions, and removes the current legal provisions awarding attorney fees, court costs, compensation for income loss, and other expenses incurred by a person who is sued civilly for using force that is intended to or likely to cause death or great bodily harm.

The SPD does not expect a significant change in the number of cases in which it provides representation due to the provisions in this bill. We are unable, however, to quantify the number of cases that might occur due to the provisions in the bill. The SPD's average cost to provide representation with a private bar attorney in a felony homicide case was \$4,337.09 and \$556.21 a felony in fiscal year 2013. Because of the annual caseloads for staff attorney positions specified for budgeting purposes under § 977.08(5), Stats., it would be more cost effective to add staff attorney positions if a significant number of SPD cases resulted from this provision of the bill.
