Summary of AB 402

This bill increases the amounts appropriated to the DWD in the next two fiscal years for local youth apprenticeship grants to local partnerships, to be used for implementation and coordination activities listed in statute. (s. 106.13) Under current law the amount appropriated is \$1,773,700 for each of the next two fiscal years. Under the bill, the new amount appropriated per fiscal year would be \$2,273,700.

Testimony provided by Jonathan Barry, Deputy Secretary

Chairperson Loudenbeck and members of the Assembly Committee on Workforce Development:

I am Jonathan Barry, Deputy Secretary of the Department of Workforce Development and I appear before you today to speak in favor of Assembly Bill 402.

As you know, Governor Walker's focus has been on making life better for the residents of our state by growing our economy, developing our workforce, transforming education, reforming government, and investing in our infrastructure. Our budget invested over \$100 million in workforce development aimed at equipping workers with the skills they need to find jobs in the modern workforce. These workforce initiatives are already moving Wisconsin forward. Now we are building on that investment with workforce priorities that will continue to further those goals.

Youth Apprenticeship is a proven, nationally-recognized strategy to develop the next generation of the workforce. It integrates school-based and work-based learning to instruct students in employability and occupational skills defined by Wisconsin industries. Local programs provide training based on statewide youth apprenticeship curriculum guidelines, which is endorsed by Wisconsin businesses. Students are simultaneously enrolled in academic classes to meet high school graduation requirements, in a youth apprenticeship related instruction class, and receive on the job training from a participating employer. Students receive training in industry developed skill-standards, paid on-the-job- work experience and, upon completion, a stateissued skill certificate. The Youth Apprenticeship program is truly a win for both the youth and the businesses of Wisconsin.

This bill's proposal to increase funding will build on the strong investment of nearly \$1.8 million in the most recent state budget for Youth Apprenticeship. The Department of Workforce Development (DWD) has authority to issue \$1,773,700 in each of fiscal years 2013-14 and 2014-15 for local youth apprenticeship grants. In SFY13, DWD turned down grant requests to service an additional 555 students due to a lack of funding. With the additional \$500,000 in funding, DWD's youth apprenticeship program would serve a minimum of 555 additional participants each year. In total, funding over the biennium would be increased to \$4.6 million for Youth Apprenticeship. Consortia all across the state say they can train even more with additional funding.

Along with the other items included in the Governor's fall workforce agenda, this proposal moves Wisconsin forward in our mission to equip our workers with the skills they need to succeed and help employers attract the skilled workers they need to meet demand.

Chair Loudenbeck and Committee Members:

As the author of Assembly Bill 402, I thank you for holding a hearing on this legislation which would provide additional funding for Wisconsin's Youth Apprenticeship program in order to develop the next generation of our state's workforce.

Wisconsin's Youth Apprenticeship program is a one or two year elective program designed for high school students as part of a statewide School-to-Work initiative. Apprentices train into a technical vocation of their choice through a combination of technical college-level instruction at their local high schools and hands-on training at a worksite.

This program is a nationally-recognized, successful model of how to develop technical skills in our youth. It is a proven strategy to get individuals employed and meet employers' needs. In fact, over 80% of program graduates receive job offers from the employer who provided the training.

Assembly Bill 402 proposes to allocate an additional \$500,000 in the current and the next fiscal year to meet the demands for the Youth Apprenticeship program. Last year, nearly 1,900 apprentices were trained at 1,300 participating worksites, touching 210 school districts.

I urge you to support additional funding for this proven job training and workforce development program which builds on the strong investment that our state has already made in our students as they choose a career and enter the workforce.
