Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

SB 682 creates a \$50,000 annual grant program in which the Wisconsin Technical College System (WTCS) Board may award grants of up to \$1,000 to technical college students who are enrolled in WTCS courses associated with their apprenticeship program. The grants are awarded to help students in paying for expenses associated with their apprenticeship training program including the cost of purchasing tools, clothing, equipment and supplies. The bill requires the WTCS Board to establish an application process and criteria for awarding the grants. The criteria must include the financial need of the students and anticipated or actual expenses of the student. WTCS Board and WTCS districts (i.e., colleges) will incur minor costs related to the development of the application process, marketing of the scholarship to eligible students, evaluation of the applications and selection of the recipients. The WTCS Board and Districts plan to absorb these costs.
