Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

The bill requires the colleges of the Wisconsin Technical College System and the colleges and Universities of the the University of Wisconsin System to accept academic credits for completing International Baccalaureate Diploma (IB) Programme courses if (1) the student completes the IB course with a score of 4 or higher and requests that the course be accepted by the WTCS or UWS institution, and (2) the general subject matter of the IB course is similar to a course accepted by the institution. The credits must be applied to satisfy general education requirements.

It is estimated that this bill would not have a fiscal impact on the WTCS Board or the WTCS district colleges. It is the policy of all Wisconsin technical colleges to award credit for prior learning. According to the Wisconsin Association of IB World Schools, there are approximately 13 public and private schools in Wisconsin that offer an IB Diploma, located primarily in the eastern half of the state. WTCS colleges, such as the Milwaukee Area Technical College and Northeastern Technical College, which are located in areas with larger numbers of high schools that award IB diplomas, are already experienced in awarding academic credit for IB program courses.
