Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

AB 285 would specify that if DOT receives only one bid for a contact from a competent bidder and the bid exceeds 110% of the estimated reasonable value of the work under the contract, as determined by DOT, the Department would be required to reject the bid and re-advertise for bids in a manner likely to increase the number of bidders. Specify that if DOT determines that re-advertising the contract for bids would adversely affect public safety or the project's construction timelines, DOT may award the contract to the sole bidder, if upon request, the Joint Committee on Finance approves the award. Specify that these provisions would first apply to advertised contracts on the effective date of the bill.

The bill would not affect revenue or state appropriations. To the extent that the provisions would increase bid competition on certain state highway projects, the costs of such projects could be reduced. Conversely, if these provisions require additional bid announcements and lets, or require the Joint Finance Committee to meet and approve a single bid, a project's construction timeline and staging could be adversely affected, and costs could be increased.
