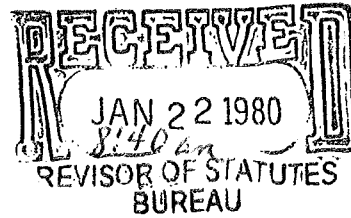



ORDER OF THE STATE OF WISCONSIN
DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, TRADE AND CONSUMER PROTECTION
ADOPTING, AMENDING OR REPEALING RULES

1 Relating to rules concerning uniform premium lists and class
2 requirements for exhibits at county and district fairs.

Analysis Prepared by the Department of Agriculture,
Trade and Consumer Protection

The revisions in Chapter Ag 5, Wis. Adm. Code, make the following changes in rules pertaining to county and district fairs.

1. Lowers the upper age limit for "youth exhibitor" eligibility from "to 21 years of age" to "through 19 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year."

2. Defines class requirements for dry cows in the dairy cattle group and adds the same as a new class entry in the premium list.

3. Re-defines class requirements for sheep and goats in both individual and group classes and amends the premium list accordingly.

4. Increases premiums for various places in a number of entry classes in the open, junior fair and senior citizens divisions. The minimum premium award is increased from \$0.25 to \$0.50.

5. Amends the age classifications for showmanship for livestock and other animals in the junior fair division to the following: beginners, 8-11 years; intermediate, 12-14 years; and senior, 15 years and over.

6. Clarifies terminology and numbering systems for various entry classes and premium lists in all divisions to conform with terms and numbering systems used or desired by county and district fairs.

3 Pursuant to authority vested in the State of Wisconsin Department
4 of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection by sections 93.07(1)
5 and 93.23, Wis. Stats., the department hereby repeals, amends, and
6 adopts rules interpreting section 93.23, Wis. Stats., as follows:

7 1. Sections Ag 5.01(1)(c), (2)(b) and (c), 3(b) and (c),
8 (4)(a) and (e), and (5)(f) of the Wisconsin Administrative Code are
9 amended to read:

10 Ag 5.01(1)(c) Wis. Adm. Code sections Ag 5.01, 5.02, and
11 Ag 5.07 shall be published in ~~their~~ premium books to be used at a
12 fair for which state aid is requested.

13 (2)(b) Exhibitors in ~~the educational department~~ and school
14 departments shall not be required to purchase exhibitors' tickets.

1 Other exhibitors may be required, when no entry fee is charged, to
2 purchase an exhibitors' season ticket at a price not to exceed that
3 charged for non-exhibitors' season tickets.

4 (2)(c) Exhibitors shall not be required to become members of
5 the fair society, or be required to make any donations or refunds to
6 the society.

7 (3)(b) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actu-
8 ally on display in exhibit buildings or actually shown in the show
9 ring during the regular fair dates- except as split dates are pro-
10 vided for under sub. (6). State aid will not be paid on D.H.I.A.
11 records, transportation aids, production contests, or the like, un-
12 less special approval is granted under Wis--Adm--Code section
13 Ag 5.02(8)+, Wis. Adm. Code.

14 (3)(c) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the
15 fairgrounds before 4 p.m. of the last day of the fair, or such
16 other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior ap-
17 proval of the department ~~or the local fair management.~~ Authority
18 for earlier removal may be granted by the department in the case of
19 meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the
20 beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be
21 granted by the local fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small ani-
22 mal pet classes shall be judged during the regular fair but are not
23 required to remain present during the entire fair. The local fair
24 may prescribe the length of time horses shall remain on the grounds
25 for junior exhibitors.

26 (4) JUNIOR FAIRS. (a) In the junior fair division, state aid
27 will be paid on prizes offered to exhibitors ~~from~~ who are 8 to 21

1 through 19 years of age ~~in the following classes:-- club products,~~
2 ~~demonstration teams, judging teams, showmanship contests, and educa-~~
3 ~~tional booths.~~ on January 1 of the current fair year except exhibitors
4 under section Ag 5.06(35) Wis. Adm. Code may be pupils of school age
5 as defined in s. 118.14, Stats. State aid will not be paid on
6 prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or any project
7 which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.

8 (4)(e) ~~In the junior fair division, state~~ State aid may be
9 used for the payment of no more than one premium awarded an exhib-
10 itor under any one premium or lot number in the junior fair division,
11 except when awarded as a part of a group ~~or special class~~ in live-
12 stock exhibits ~~only.~~ or in showmanship.

13 (5)(f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups,
14 trophy prizes or ~~on horse pulling contests.~~ entertainment contests.

15 2. Sections Ag 5.02(1), (6) and (7) of the Wisconsin Adminis-

17 Ag 5.02 Classes; general. (1) In all prescribed departments,
18 special classes may be established for any item, article, or recog-
19 nized breed (eligible for registry), where none are specified, in-

22 sion. ~~In the open division, grade and crossbred swine classes may~~
23 ~~be established in the senior yearling, senior and junior spring sew~~
24 ~~class.~~ State aid, in amounts prescribed, may be paid for such spe-
25 cial classes.

26 (6) The total of maximum premiums prescribed for the places in
27 any open class of livestock, ~~(except~~ excluding poultry) and rabbits,

1 may be divided into premiums for a greater number of places but the
2 maximum premium for any additional place shall not be higher than
3 the maximum prescribed for the last place in such class.

4 (7) If 16 or more animals, items or articles are entered in
5 any junior fair class, at the discretion of the fair, the class may
6 be divided into ~~two~~ 2 or more approximately equal groups according to
7 weight, age or other identification and each group judged as a
8 class.

2 year.

3 2. A fall lamb for the Cheviot, Southdown, Shropshire, Columbia
4 or Oxford breeds is one born during the period between September 1 of
5 the preceding exhibit year through January 31st of the exhibit year.
6 For all other breeds, a fall lamb is one born during the period
7 between September 1 through December 14th of the year preceding
8 exhibit year.

9 3. A mature ram or ewe is one born before January 1 of the
10 year preceding exhibit year.

11 4. A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the date of birth
12 limitations in subd. 1, 2 and 3. The age of yearlings may be sub-
13 ject to verification by a veterinarian's examination whose findings
14 shall be final.

15 5. A market lamb is one born after January 1 of the exhibit
16 year.

17 (f) Goats. 1. In the open class division, age shall be de-
18 termined as of the opening date of the fair and the following age
19 classifications shall apply:

20 a. Does under 24 months of age that have never freshened may
21 only compete in the junior age classification.

22 b. Does 24 months of age or over that have never freshened may
23 not be shown.

24 c. Does that have freshened at least once, including dry milk-
25 ers, may only compete in the senior age classification.

26 d. A milking yearling is under 2 years old.

27 e. A 2 year old is over 2 and under 3 years of age.

1 f. A 3-5 year old is over 3 and under 5 years of age.

2 g. An aged doe is over 5 years of age.

3 2. In the junior fair division the following age classifica-
4 tions shall apply:

5 a. A junior kid is one born on or after April 1 of exhibit
6 year.

7 b. A senior kid is one born during the period between January 1
8 to March 31 of the exhibit year.

9 c. A junior yearling is one born during the period between
10 July 1 to December 31 of the year preceding exhibit year.

11 d. A senior yearling is a dry doe born before July 1 of the
12 year preceding exhibit year but less than 24 months of age.

5. A pen of market lambs shall consist of 2 market lambs owned by the exhibitor.

(d) Goats. 1. An exhibitor's herd shall consist of one doe under one year, one yearling doe, and one doe 2 years or older, all owned by the same exhibitor.

2. A senior get of sire shall consist of 3 does which are the get of one sire, with at least one in milk. The animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.

3. A junior get of sire shall consist of three does under 2 years that have never freshened and are the get of one sire. The animals shall be owned by a single exhibitor.

4. A produce of dam shall consist of 2 does of any age which are the produce of one doe. The animals shall be owned by a single exhibitor.
