ORDER OF THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION CREATING RULES

1 To create Chapter PI 18 relating to high school graduation standards.

Analysis Provided by the Department of Public Instruction

S.118.33, Stats., as created by Chapter 411, Laws of 1983, establishes statewide high school graduation standards and minimum credit requirements. Beginning September 1, 1988, a school board may not issue a high school diploma to a student unless the student has earned in the high school grades at least 4 credits of English including written composition, 3 credits of social studies including state and local government, 2 credits of mathematics, 2 credits of science, 0.5 credit of computer science, 1.5 credits of physical education, and 0.5 credit of health education. In addition a diploma may not be granted unless the pupil has been enrolled in a class or has participated in an activity approved by the school board during each class period of each school day.

The proposed rule outlines the course requirements necessary to meet the high school graduation standards. Basic categories of skills and knowledge to be addressed in approved courses are outlined. Accommodations for pupils with exceptional educational interests, needs or requirements which includes children with exceptional educational needs as defined under s. 115.76(3), Stats., are delineated. Accommodations for these children may be provided for high school graduation.

The proposed rule also specifies the items that must be included in the high school graduation standards policy which must be submitted to the state superintendent by July 1, 1988. Each school board operating high school grades shall certify to the state superintendent that its high school graduation policy is in compliance with s. 118.33(1), Stats., and this chapter. The state superintendent will review and may approve the policy and shall approve any policy equivalent to the requirements under s. 118.33(1), Stats. The school board is responsible for notifying the state superintendent of any changes made in its high school graduation policies following initial review and approval.

- 5 establish course requirements to meet the graduation standards outlined in

- 8 boards will submit reports describing the boards' policies on high school

- 20 PI 18.03 (1) COURSE REQUIREMENTS. Beginning September 1, 1988, a
- 21 board may not grant a high school diploma to any pupil unless the pupil has
- 22 earned a minimum of 13.5 credits in the high school grades as follows:
- 23 (a) 4 credits of English which incorporate instruction in written
- 24 communication, oral communication, grammar and usage of the English
- 25 language, and literature.
- 26 (b) 3 credits of social studies which incorporate instruction in
- 27 state and local government.

- 1 (c) 2 credits of mathematics which incorporate instruction in the
- 2 properties, processes, and symbols of arithmetic and elements of algebra,

- 7 (5) The state superintendent shall approve any board's high school gradu-

The rule contained in this order shall take effect on the first day of the month following publication in the Wisconsin Administrative Register as provided in s. 227.026(1)(intro.), Stats.

high school graduation requirements and the following assumptions—that forty percent of Wisconsin high school students take no more than district required credit totals in any particular subject; and existing teacher capacity employed in Wisconsin high schools and existing course offerings can absorb no more than 20 percent of the students taking additional credits in any subject due to the requirements contained in s. 118.33, Stats., the Department estimated costs as follows:

\$2,360,000 as the cost of funding the requirements in English; \$ 680,000 as the cost of funding the requirements in social studies; \$1,500,000 as the cost of funding the requirements in mathematics; and \$ 600,000 as the cost of funding the requirements in science

The original fiscal note did not address costs for the requirements in computer science, health education, and physical education. Using the same assumptions and procedures as in the original fiscal note, the Department estimates that:

The 0.5 credit requirement in computer science will require some local district investment in hardware as well as for additional teacher costs. The Department assumes that districts will make available one microcomputer for every 12 students taking the required computer science course (one computer per two students utilized six periods per day). A recent DPI survey indicates that school districts currently possess approximately 7,900 microcomputers. It is assumed that one-half of these are utilized primarily by elementary students or students in high schools with a specialized computer training curriculum. It is estimated that 2,833 microcomputers will be needed by school districts to fulfill this instructional obligation (34,000 students per semester divided by 12).

It appears that, on a statewide basis, sufficient hardware capacity exists for districts to fulfill this obligation. Assuming a 10% need due to differential capacity among districts, a maximum of \$354,000 is estimated for costs of hardware.

It is estimated, utilizing the DPI survey on microcomputer use, that approximately 30 percent of senior high school students are receiving computer training roughly equivalent to the proposed requirement. It is assumed that existing teacher capacity can absorb 20 percent of the additional students who will take 0.5 credit requirement in computer science. Assuming 30 students per class for computer training, teacher costs are estimated to be an additional \$3,626,000 (181 additional teachers at \$20,000 year). Finally, some shifting of personnel between elementary and secondary schools may diminish the additional costs of instruction.

Forty-seven percent of Wisconsin high schools currently require less than the required 1.5 credits of physical education. Factoring in a 20 percent absorption rate for existing classes, it is assumed that 25,500 students annually (or 12,775 per semester) will require an additional 0.5 credit in physical education. Assuming an average of 22 students per class it is estimated that 580 additional classes per semester would have to be offered necessitating the hiring of 116 additional teachers at a cost of \$2.32 million (116 x \$20,000/year average salary).

Eighty-four percent of Wisconsin high schools currently require less than the required 0.5 credit of health education. Factoring in a 20 percent absorption rate for existing classes, it is assumed that 45,700 students annually (or 22,850 per semester) will require an additional 0.5 credit in health education. Assuming an average of 22 students per class, it is estimated that 1,039 additional classes would have to be offered necessitating the hiring of 208 additional teachers at a cost of \$4.16 million. However, many schools require health education courses as part of the elementary education sequence so it may be possible to move staff and make course adjustments to include this in the secondary sequence.

The local school districts and the department will face increased paperwork in implementing these requirements. These costs were addressed in the fiscal note filed with SB 600. The department received an appropriation of \$57,100 for the 1984-85 fiscal year to fund two GPR positions (one educational consultant and one program assistant) to handle the review of the reports describing the high school graduation policies.

The total estimated impact of implementing these requirements for the local school districts is \$15,600,000.
