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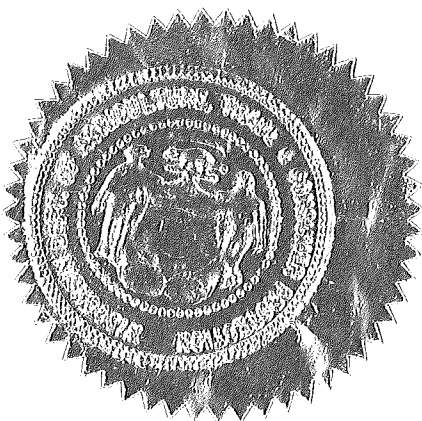

PROPOSED ORDER
OF THE STATE OF WISCONSIN DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE
TRADE AND CONSUMER PROTECTION
ADOPTING RULES

1 The Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer
2 protection proposes the following order to renumber
3 Ag 5.07 through Ag 5.09; to repeal and recreate Ag 5.01 through
4 Ag 5.06; and to create Ch. Ag 5, Subchapter III (title); relating
5 to county and district fairs.

Statutory authority: ss. 93.07(1) and 93.23(1)(a)2, Stats.

Statute interpreted: s. 93.23, Stats.

This rule is a revision of the premium list for county and district fairs established by the department pursuant to s. 93.23, Stats. The rule is updated every four years with changes being made on the recommendation of the Wisconsin Association of County and District Fairs. The 1989 revisions include an increase of \$2.00 each in dairy, beef, and horse premiums, \$1.00 each for swine, sheep and goat premiums, and 50 cents each for all other entry classes.

Other changes are made in entry class definitions for dairy and beef cattle in order to be consistent with the nomenclature and age ranges of exhibited cattle which are currently in use by various breed associations and the Wisconsin State Fair. A new market wool class is added in the sheep department and a veal class is added in the beef department. Further class additions include exotic domesticated animals in both the open and junior divisions and draft horses in the junior division. Exotic domesticated animals are defined as llamas, buffalo, beefalo, and other similar animals bred and raised in captivity. Another new class added in the proposed rule is a Christmas tree class in the natural sciences department of the open division.

1 classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division,
2 open division and senior citizens division.

3 (4) "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation
4 assigned by a local fair for a specific category of exhibits
5 within a class.

6 Ag 5.02 PREMIUM REQUIREMENTS. (1) GENERAL. (a). The state
7 aid authorized by s. 93.23(1), Stats., may be paid only on net
8 premiums, which consist of total premiums paid less total entry
9 fees received. The department may withhold state premium aid
10 from any fair which does not enforce the animal health provisions
11 required under ch. Ag 10 for all classes of livestock exhibited
12 at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually
13 paid by bank check or draft.

14 (b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an
15 exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition
16 rules established by the fair association are violated. A
17 written statement of violation shall be submitted to the
18 department to justify action taken by a local fair.

19 (c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No
20 decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of
21 the financial condition or the organization or for any other
22 reason.

23 (d) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded
24 an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division
25 individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no
26 more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and

1 rabbits.

2 (e) To be eligible for state aid, no animal or article shall
3 be entered in competition for more than one premium at any county
4 or district fair in this state except as part of a herd group,
5 carcass class, or a performance class.

6 (f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups,
7 trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

8 (2) PREMIUM LISTS. (a) Premiums for which state aid is
9 requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the
10 uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these
11 rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit
12 to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the
13 fair, as required under s. Ag 5.92(3)(d).

14 (b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the
15 premium list to other associations, societies, or boards
16 conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.

17 (c) Sections Ag 5.01 through Ag 5.07 and Ag 5.91 shall be
18 published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is
19 requested.

20 (3) ENTRY FEES. (a) Entry fees not in excess of 10% of the
21 purse offered on any specific article may be charged exhibitors.
22 When no entry fee is charged, stall rents may be charged in the
23 horse, cattle, sheep, goat, swine, poultry, rabbit, and per stock
24 departments. Stall rents shall not exceed \$1.50 per single stall
25 or animal or \$3.00 per box stall for horses; \$1.00 per single
26 stall or animal or \$2.00 per box stall for cattle; and \$0.50 per

1 animal or \$2.00 per pen for swine, goats or sheep. A standard
2 pen for swine, goats or sheep is approximately 64 square feet.
3 Cage rents may not exceed \$0.50 per head for poultry, rabbit and
4 pet stock exhibits.

5 (b) Exhibitors in educational and school departments shall
6 not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other
7 exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to
8 purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed
9 that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

10 (4) SPLIT FAIR DATES. No state aid may be paid to fairs
11 having split dates, unless prior written approval is granted by
12 the department. Extreme hardship must be established by the fair
13 organization before approval can be granted. A split date is one
14 where exhibits or contests are judged, and premiums paid at more
15 than one time or at more than one location during the current
16 year. When split dates are approved, all blue ribbon winners
17 shall be required to repeat their demonstration or exhibit at the
18 regular fair dates, unless exempted by the department in hardship
19 cases. The repeated demonstration or exhibit may be presented
20 though the use of audio-visual media, still photography or an
21 educational display. Split date approval may not be required for
22 clothing revue, demonstration, favorite foods revue or dogs and
23 small animals.

24 Ag 5.03 EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS. A county or district fair
25 shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to
26 be eligible for state premium aid.

1 (1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a
2 county or district fair shall require an exhibitor to become a
3 member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the
4 fair, nor shall the sponsoring organization make any deduction
5 from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or
6 require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the
7 society.

8 (2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits
9 or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid
10 may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor
11 having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency
12 unless the fair secretary provides the department with an
13 affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically
14 located within the state.

15 (3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals
16 actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in
17 the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split
18 fair dates is obtained under s. Ag 5.02(4). State aid may not be
19 paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records,
20 transportation aid, production contests or other special
21 educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s.
22 Ag 5.04(8).

23 (4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the
24 fair grounds before 4 p.m. of the last day of the fair, or such
25 other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior
26 approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be

1 granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other
2 special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair.
3 In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the local
4 fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may
5 be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain
6 present during the entire fair. The local fair may prescribe the
7 length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their
8 animals on the grounds.

9 Ag 5.04 JUNIOR FAIR DIVISION; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS. (1) AGE.

10 In the junior fair division state aid will be paid on prizes
11 offered to exhibitors who are 8 through 19 years of age on
12 January 1 of the current fair year, except for exhibitors under
13 ss. Ag 5.65(1) and Ag 5.80 who may be 5 through 8 years of age on
14 January 1 of the current fair year. State aid will not be paid
15 on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or
16 project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.

17 (2) All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be
18 members of 4-H, FFA, FHA-HERO, Scouting programs, breed groups,
19 or any other recognized youth organization under adult leadership
20 and with an education program approved by the local fair.

21 (3) Exhibits in the junior fair shall be a result of the
22 exhibitor's own labor and may include a study, merit, or other
23 special project, a skill area or a supervised occupational
24 experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled.

25 (4) State aid may be used for the payment of no more than
26 one premium awarded an exhibitor under any one premium or lot

1 number in the junior fair division, except when awarded as part
2 of a group in livestock exhibits or in showmanship.

3 (5) Premiums in the educational department shall be paid
4 directly to the exhibitor who made the exhibit and not to the
5 school or teacher, except for group premiums offered to inter-
6 school competitive classes. No aid may be paid on education
7 department premiums unless a complete list of exhibitors and a
8 complete set of judges' sheets for the education department,
9 similar to those required in other departments, is filed with the
10 department. All educational exhibits shall be displayed at the
11 fair regardless of whether they are judged prior to or at the
12 fair.

13 (6) If 16 or more animals, items or articles are entered in
14 any junior fair class, the class may be divided into 2 or more
15 approximately equal groups according to weight, age or other
16 identifying characteristic and each group judged as a class.

17 (8) Special educational exhibits may established if the
18 proposal is presented to the Wisconsin association of fairs
19 before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment
20 and the exhibit is approved by the department.

21 (9) In all departments in the junior fair division under
22 subch. IV, special classes may be established where none are
23 specified for the item, article, or a recognized breed, including
24 special classes for grade and crossbred females in beef, swine
25 and sheep. State aid may be paid for the created special classes
26 in amounts equal to comparable established classes in the same

1 department.

2 Ag 5.05 OPEN DIVISION; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS. (1) The total
3 maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division
4 livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided
5 into premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum
6 premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than
7 the maximum for last place in the class.

8 (2) State aid for premiums awarded for horses in open
9 division classes shall be limited to horses which are owned by
10 the exhibitor.

11 (3) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by
12 the exhibitor, except as provided in s. Ag 5.09.

13 Ag 5.06 SENIOR CITIZENS DIVISION; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS. (1)
14 The age of exhibitors in the senior citizens division is limited
15 to persons 62 years of age or over.

16 (2) Exhibitors in the senior citizens division may not enter
17 identical items or articles in both the senior citizens division
18 and in the corresponding classes of the regular open division.

19 Ag 5.07 CLASSES; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS. (1) Classes may be
20 combined if the number of entries in several single classes is
21 insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be
22 limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class
23 of animals, items or articles in that department.

24 (2) No state aid may be paid on premiums awarded for any
25 sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats,
26 swine or horses exhibited in any class unless the animal is a

1 registered purebred as verified by a certificate of registry from
2 the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the
3 application for registration.

4 (3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be
5 exhibited in a class for individual animals.

6 (4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine
7 department unless their tusks have been removed.

8 Ag 5.08 CLASS DEFINITIONS; INDIVIDUAL CLASSES. (1) DAIRY
9 CATTLE. (a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of
10 the exhibit year.

11 (b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between
12 December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28
13 or 29 of the exhibit year.

14 (c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between
15 September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit
16 year.

17 (d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between
18 June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

19 (e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between
20 March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

21 (f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between
22 December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and
23 February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

24 (g) A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between
25 September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the
26 exhibit year.

1 (h) A 2 year-old is one whose date of birth is between
2 September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and
3 August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year, and
4 shall include senior yearlings which have freshened.

5 (i) A 3 year-old is one whose date of birth is between
6 September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and
7 August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

8 (j) A 4 year-old is one whose date of birth is between
9 September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and
10 August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

11 (2) BEEF CATTLE. (a) A junior calf is one born on or after
12 January 1 of the exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4
13 months old at the time of exhibit.

14 (b) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between
15 September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit
16 year.

17 (c) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between
18 May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

19 (d) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between
20 January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

21 (e) A senior yearling is one whose date of birth is between
22 September 1 and December 31 of the second year preceding the
23 exhibit year.

24 (f) A 2 year old or older cow is one born before September 1
25 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and which has
26 calved during the past year.

1 (3) STEERS. (a) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is
2 between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the
3 exhibit year.

4 (b) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between
5 May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year, and
6 which has all milk teeth in place.

7 (c) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between
8 January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year,
9 and which has all milk teeth solidly in place and shows no
10 nicking at the gums.

11 (4) SWINE. (a) A junior yearling boar or sow is one whose
12 date of birth is between January 1 and June 30 of the preceding
13 the exhibit year.

14 (b) A senior boar or sow is one whose date of birth is
15 between July 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit
16 year.

17 (c) A senior spring boar or sow pig is one whose date of
18 birth is between January 1 and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit
19 year. A local fair board may subdivide this entry class into
20 January-born and February-born sows or boars.

21 (d) A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the
22 month of March of the exhibit year.

23 (5) SHEEP. (a) A spring lamb for the Cheviot, Southdown,
24 Shropshire, Columbia or Oxford breeds is one born on or after
25 February 1 of the exhibit year. For all other breeds, a spring
26 lamb is one born on or after December 15 of the year preceding

1 the exhibit year.

1 (b) A fall lamb for the Cheviot, Southdown, Shropshire,
2 Columbia or Oxford breeds is one whose date of birth is between
3 September 1 of the preceding exhibit year and January 31 of the
4 exhibit year. For all other breeds, a fall lamb is one whose
5 date of birth is between September 1 and December 14 of the year
6 preceding the exhibit year.

7 (c) A mature ram or ewe is one born before January 1 of the
8 year preceding the exhibit year.

9 (d) A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the date of
10 birth limitations in par. (a) through (c). The age of yearlings
11 may be subject to verification by a veterinarian's examination
12 whose findings shall be final.

13 (e) A market lamb is one born after January 1 of the exhibit
14 year.

15 (6) GOATS. Goats may be entered in one of the following
16 individual classes. The age of the animal for determining the
17 appropriate class shall be computed from the opening day of the
18 fair. Male goats and goats with full natural horns may not be
19 entered unless full natural horns are a standard for a specific
20 breed. Does which have freshened shall be shown in the
21 appropriate class under subd. 5 to 8.

22 (a) Junior doe kid; under 4 months of age.

23 (b) Senior doe kid; at least 4 months but under 7 months of
24 age.

25 (c) Junior yearling doe; at least 7 months but under 12

2 (d) Senior yearling doe; at least 12 months but under 24
3 months of age and the doe is not in milk.

4 (e) Yearling milkers; under 2 years of age and in milk.

5 (f) Junior milkers; at least 2 years but under 3 years of

10 Ag 5.09 CLASS DEFINITIONS; GROUP CLASSES. (1) DAIRY AND BEEF
11 CATTLE. (a) A dairy junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals
12 which are the offspring of the same bull. All of these animals
13 shall be under 2 years of age, and not more than one may be a
14 bull. A beef junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which
15 are the offspring of the same bull and are animals in the junior
16 calf, senior calf, and/or the summer yearling, bull and heifer
17 classes, with both sexes to represented.

18 (b) A dairy and beef senior get of sire shall consist of 3
19 animals which are the offspring of one sire. All of these
20 animals shall be 2 years of age or over. In either a dairy or
21 beef breed get of sire, the name of the sire shall be designated
22 by the exhibitor. The animals need not be owned by a single
23 exhibitor.

24 (c) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 animals of any age
25 or sex which are the produce of one cow.

26 (d) A group of 3 best female cattle shall consist of 3

1 animals of any age which were bred and are owned by the
2 exhibitor.

3 (2) SWINE. A pen of 3 feeder pigs shall consist of swine of
4 either sex each weighing between 40 and 60 pounds. Any male pigs
5 included in the pen shall be castrated and healed.

6 (3) SHEEP. (a) A get of sire shall consist of 4 lambs or
7 yearlings, or both, of either sex, from one sire, which were bred
8 and are owned by the exhibitor.

9 (b) An exhibitor's flock shall consist of one yearling or
10 ram lamb, 2 yearling ewes and 2 ewe lambs which are owned by the
11 exhibitor.

12 (c) A junior division pair of lambs may include a spring or
13 fall ram and spring or fall ewe lamb owned by the exhibitor.

14 (d) A junior division flock shall be comprised of 3 sheep
15 consisting of a yearling or lamb ram, a ewe lamb, and a yearling
16 ewe, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.

17 (4) GOATS. (a) An exhibitor's herd shall consist of one doe
18 under one year of age, one yearling doe and one doe 2 years old
19 or older, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.

20 (b) A senior get of sire shall consist of 3 does which are
21 the get of one sire, with at least one in milk. The animals need
22 not be owned by the same exhibitor, but all shall be in the
23 senior age group.

24 (c) A junior get of sire shall consist of three does under 2
25 years of age which have never freshened and are the get of one
26 sire. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor.

1 (d) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 does of any age
 2 which are the produce of one doe. Both animals shall be owned by
 3 the same exhibitor.

4 (e) A dam and daughter shall consist of one doe of any age
 5 and its dam. The animals need not be owned by the same
 6 exhibitor.
