

Fond du Lac and Green Bay military road intersects the line between sections twenty-three and twenty-six, in township seventeen north of range eighteen east.

SEC. 2. The said commissioners shall receive such Compensation for the time and services actually spent in laying out said road, as may be allowed by the boards of supervisors of the counties through which said road shall be laid, and no part of the expense thereof shall be paid by the State.

SEC. 3. Said road, when so laid out, and the survey Road to be thereof legally recorded, may be opened for public use opened and immediately, and shall not be discontinued or altered by not discontinued the supervisors of any town for two years after the same shall be laid out, and the commissioners above named are hereby authorized to receive subscriptions in money or Receive sub-labor, and apply the same to the opening and working of scriptions. said road.

SEC. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 339.

[Published April 28, 1860.]

AN ACT to permit the board of supervisors of the several towns in the county of Milwaukee to lay out and open highways of the width [width] of three rods.

*The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. The board of supervisors of the several Town boards towns in the county of Milwaukee, are hereby authorized authorized to and empowered, whenever application is made to them, open high-ways. to lay out and open any highway in their respective towns, to cause the same to be laid out and opened, of the width of three rods, whenever, in their judgment, the interests of the public will be thereby subserved.

SEC. 2. Said highways shall be laid out in accordance How laid out. with the provisions of chapter 19, of the Revised Statutes, which chapter is hereby declared to be applicable to them, in all respects, as to the width aforesaid.

SEC. 3. This act shall be printed and take effect immediately after its passage.
