

SECTION 2. The secretary of state shall, on the application of the said James Reynolds and John Fellenz, draw his warrant for the said sum, and deliver the same to the said James Reynolds and John Fellenz, and their acceptance of the same shall completely and fully release and discharge the state from all the claims, demands, matters and things mentioned in section one of this act, and shall be a full and complete bar in all courts and places to any suit, action or proceeding for or in behalf of the said James Reynolds and John Fellenz or either of them for the recovery of the claims or demands mentioned herein or any part thereof.

Warrants when drawn.

Acceptance of same shall release the state from all claims.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 218.

[Published March 24, 1874.]

AN ACT to confer upon the Waupaca Agricultural and Mechanical Association the same appropriations, rights and benefits conferred upon county agricultural societies by chapter 80 of the revised statutes, and the acts amendatory thereto.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows :

SECTION 1. There is hereby conferred upon the Waupaca Agricultural and Mechanical Association, a corporation duly created by chapter 233 of the private and local laws of the state of Wisconsin for the year 1871, all the rights, privileges and benefits conferred upon county agricultural societies by chapter 80 of the revised statutes, and acts amendatory thereto, which corporation shall be entitled to the same aid as other county agricultural societies, by complying with the conditions upon which said aid is granted.

Entitled to aid as other county agricultural societies on conditions, etc.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect from and after its passage.
