CHAPTER 65.

AN ACT to create section 1636o of the statutes, relating to appropriation by municipalities for humane societies.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. There is added to the statutes a new section to read: Section 1636o. 1. Whenever a society for the prevention of abuse or neglect of children or cruelty to animals shall be incorporated for the enforcement of the law relating to said subjects within any county of this state it shall be lawful for the county board of such county or the council of any city or village within such county to appropriate for the maintenance and support of such societies in the prosecution of the work for which it is organized any sum of money not otherwise appropriated, not exceeding in the aggregate twelve hundred dollars in any one year. Such aggregate to include all appropriations by the county or other municipal corporation or corporations within the county.

2. No part of such appropriation shall be expended for the payment of the salary of any officer other than the authorized and active agent of such society.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 66.

AN ACT to amend section 387 of the statutes, relating to the admission of both sexes to the different schools and colleges of the University of Wisconsin.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 387 of the statutes is amended to read: Section 387. * * * *All schools and colleges of the university shall, in their respective departments and class exercises, be open without distinction to students of both sexes; and all able-bodied male students in whatever college therein may receive instruction and discipline in military tactics, the requisite arms for which shall be furnished by the state. Any person who has graduated from a regular collegiate course at the university.*

and after such graduation shall furnish evidence to the state superintendent of good moral character and of successful teaching for one school year in a public school of this state, may have his diploma countersigned by said superintendent, which shall then have the force and effect of * * * *an unlimited state certificate*, subject to the exercise of the power vested in the state superintendent to revoke the right given by his signature to such diploma.

SECTION 2. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 67.

AN ACT to amend section 4404 of the statutes, relating to arson.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 4404 of the statutes is amended to read: Section 4404. The preceding sections of this chapter shall severally extend to a married woman who may commit either of the offenses therein described, though the property burnt or set fire to may belong partly or wholly to her husband; *and said sections shall also severally apply to a married man, though the property burnt or set fire to may belong partly or wholly to his wife, and though said property may be occupied by such married man or married woman, or by such married man and wife as a residence.*

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
