- 3. Said geological and natural history survey is further directed to extend the survey of the lead and zine region beginning with districts which are at present of greatest economic importance.
- 4. Said geological and natural history survey is further directed to continue the survey of the waterpowers of the state. This last survey may be made in conjunction with the United States geological survey.
- 5. Upon completion of the work named, full reports shall be made to the governor for the use of the legislature.
- 6. The sum of twenty thousand dollars annually, is appropriated to the geological and natural history survey out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, said appropriation to be in lieu of all other appropriations now provided for by law for said geological and natural history survey and to be used to defray the expense of executing the duties assigned to the said survey by the legislature and all other laws appropriating money to said survey in so far as the same appropriate money, are repealed.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 628.

AN ACT to authorize the continuation of the work of the Wisconsin History Commission, and making an appropriation therefor.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Wisconsin History Commission is authorized to continue the work of such commission, and to pay the expenses thereof the sum of two thousand dollars annually, for two years, is hereby appropriated for such commission, to be drawn and accounted for in the same manner money is drawn and accounted for by similar commissions. The unexpended appropriation for the first year may be expended the second year. The superintendent of public property shall furnish such commission the usual and necessary stationery for the transaction of the business of such commission.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
