CHAPTER 84.

AN ACT to amend subsection 2 of section 926—125m of the statutes, relating to the vacation of public grounds, streets and alleys and parts thereof.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Subsection 2 of section 926—125m of the statutes is amended to read: (Section 926—125m) 2. The common council shall thereupon direct the city clerk to cause notice of *the presentation* of such petition to be given to the owners and occupants of such abutting premises, which notice shall contain a description of such abutting premises and the premises sought to be vacated, shall state that application will be made to the circuit court of the county *at a specified time and place* for the selection of a jury to view such premises and to determine whether the vacation sought is necessary, * * * *shall be signed by the city clerk, be posted in three public places in the ward wherein the premises affected are located not less than four weeks before the day fixed for the hearing and be published in the official or some other newspaper printed in such city once a week for three successive weeks before said day.*

SECTION 2. This act takes effect when published.

CHAPTER 85.

AN ACT to amend section 925m—311 of the statutes, relating to powers of councilmen under commission form of city government.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 925m—311 of the statutes is amended to read: Section 925m—311. The council shall have power from time to time to create and fill offices and fix the term of service and salaries other than those described in the preceding section and to discontinue any office *so created or any office included within section 925m—309* according to their judgment of the needs of the city.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
