

are so equipped prior to January 1, 1929; provided, that nothing in this section shall be construed to inhibit the passage of a locomotive engine not so equipped with such mechanical stokers, moving under its own steam with or without a train, when such movement is from a point without the state through or to a point beyond its borders, or from a point without the state to a point within it, or from a point within the state to a point without it, if such passage is for the purpose of moving it to or from a repair shop or shops for the purpose of repairing such locomotive engine, and when it is not intended for service within the state.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon passage and publication.

### CHAPTER 410.

AN ACT designating Robert M. La Follette as one of the deceased residents of this state of historic renown whose statue is to be erected in the hall of fame (statuary hall) in the national capitol at Washington, providing for the erection of this statue and making an appropriation.

WHEREAS, By act of congress, each state is invited to provide and present to congress for erection in the old hall of the house of representatives, now generally known as the hall of fame or as statuary hall, in the national capitol in Washington, marble or bronze statues of two of its deceased residents of historic renown, whom the state shall determine to be worthy of this national commendation; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin heretofore has placed only one such statue in the hall of fame, namely, that of Pere Marquette, the explorer and missionary; and

WHEREAS, Robert M. La Follette rendered most distinguished services to this state and nation; now, therefore  
*The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. Robert M. La Follette is hereby designated as one of the deceased residents of Wisconsin of historic renown worthy of the national commendation of having their statues placed in

the old hall of the house of representatives, now generally known as the hall of fame or as statuary hall, in the national capitol.

SECTION 2. The governor is hereby authorized and directed to have placed in the said hall a statue of Robert M. La Follette.

SECTION 3. There is appropriated from the general fund a sum sufficient to carry out the purposes of this act.

SECTION 4. This act shall take effect upon passage and publication.

### CHAPTER 411.

AN ACT to create section 1.055 of the statutes, empowering the United States of America to acquire lands in the state of Wisconsin by purchase or otherwise for establishing national forests, and to grant to the United States of America all rights necessary for the proper control and administration of lands so acquired.

*The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. A new section is added to the statutes to read: 1.055 (1) Consent of the state of Wisconsin is hereby given to the acquisition by the United States by purchase, gift, lease, or condemnation with adequate compensation therefor, of such areas of land not exceeding one hundred thousand acres as the United States may deem necessary for the establishment of national forests in the state, in accordance with the act of congress approved June 7, 1924, and the commissioners of public lands are hereby authorized to sell and convey for a fair consideration to the United States any state lands included within such areas; provided, that the state of Wisconsin shall retain concurrent jurisdiction with the United States in and over such areas so far that civil process, in all cases, and such criminal process as may issue under the authority of the state of Wisconsin against any persons charged with the commission of any crime within or without said areas may be executed thereon in like manner as if this consent had not been given. Provided, further that any tract or tracts so selected shall be first approved by the governor, the commissioners of public lands and the conservation commissioner.
