CHAPTER 584.

AN ACT to amend 20.01 (1) (Introductory paragraph) and to create 20.01 (1) (f) and (g) of the statutes, relating to compensation and mileage to members of the legislature.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. 20.01 (1) (Introductory paragraph) of the statutes is amended to read:

20.01 (1) (Introductory paragraph) Compensation, * * * mileage, and a monthly allowance for expenses to each member of the legislature, as follows:

SECTION 2. 20.01 (1) (f) and (g) of the statutes are created to read:

20.01 (1) (f) Any member of the legislature who has signified, by affidavit filed with the secretary of state, the necessity of establishing a temporary residence at the state capitol for the period of any regular or special legislative session shall be entitled to an allowance of \$100 per calendar month, or part thereof, for expenses incurred for food and lodging during the first 6 calendar months of each regular session and during the first 2 calendar months of each special session. Such allowances shall be paid in advance of the first legislative meeting held each calendar month.

(g) All members of the legislature shall be entitled, in addition to the mileage allowed in paragraph (b), to an allowance for transportation expenses incurred in going to and returning from the state capitol once every week during each regular legislative session, at the rate of 3 cents per mile for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the state capitol on the most usual route. Such allowances shall be paid in advance of the first legislative meeting held each calendar month.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect January 1, 1947.
