## 2005 Wisconsin Act 365 [2005 Assembly Bill 556]

## Trailers or Semitrailers Used to Transport Livestock

Under *current law*, with limited exceptions, no one may operate a single vehicle that exceeds 40 feet in length without obtaining a permit from the Department of Transportation. One exception allows a person to operate, without a permit, a two-vehicle combination *transporting livestock* if the trailer is not longer than 53 feet, the trailer axles are either separated by at least eight feet or are three axles in tandem, and the towing vehicle is not a truck or tractor that weighs 10,000 pounds or less.

With reference to this two-vehicle livestock combination exception, 2005 Wisconsin Act 365 eliminates the requirement that the trailer axles be separated by at least eight feet or be three axles in tandem, and instead replaces it with the requirement that the trailer or semitrailer (the Act adds "semitrailer") be equipped with at least two axles. The Act specifies that a two-vehicle combination within this exception must be designed and primarily used for transporting livestock (i.e., adds "designed and primarily used for").

Effective Date: The Act takes effect on May 4, 2006.
