2011 Wisconsin Act 111 [2011 Senate Bill 208]

Motor Vehicle Child Safety Restraint Systems

2011 Wisconsin Act 111 relates to the use of child restraint systems in motor vehicles.

Wisconsin law requires a child to be properly restrained in a specific type of car seat depending on the particular age and size of the child. If a child is:

- Less than one year old, or weighs less than 20 pounds, the child must be placed in a rearfacing car seat.
- Between one and four years old, or weighs between 20 and 40 pounds, the child must be placed in a forward-facing car seat.
- Between four and eight years old, weighs between 40 and 80 pounds, and is 57 inches or less in height, the child must be placed in a booster seat.

Act 111 revises the law to explicitly allow a child to be placed in a more protective car seat, for the preceding younger age and smaller size category. For example, a child who has reached one year of age, and is over 20 pounds, may either be placed in a forward-facing car seat, or in a rear-facing car seat.

Effective date: Act 111 takes effect December 21, 2011.
