2011 Wisconsin Act 159 [2011 Senate Bill 317]

Electronic Prescriptions for Schedule II Controlled Substances

A Schedule II controlled substance is a substance that has a high potential for abuse; has a currently accepted medical use in treatment in the United States, or a currently accepted medical use with severe restrictions; and is a substance whose abuse may lead to severe psychological or physical dependence.

Prior to Act 159, except when dispensed directly by a practitioner, other than a pharmacy, to an ultimate user, no controlled substance included in Schedule II could be dispensed without the written prescription of a practitioner. However, in emergency situations, as defined by rule of the Pharmacy Examining Board, Schedule II drugs could be dispensed upon oral or electronic prescription of a practitioner, reduced promptly to writing, and filed by the pharmacy.

2011 Wisconsin Act 159 provides that, except when dispensed directly by a practitioner, other than a pharmacy, to an ultimate user, a Schedule II controlled substance may be dispensed by a pharmacy by either a written hard copy or electronic prescription of a practitioner.

Act 159 also provides that when a Schedule II controlled substance is dispensed upon an oral prescription in an emergency, the prescription must be reduced promptly to a written hard copy or electronic record.
