## 2003 Senate Bill 14

## Assembly Amendment 1

**Senate Bill 14**, as amended by Senate Amendment 3, prohibits an individual from entering another person's private property without that person's consent and looking into any individual's dwelling unit if all of the following apply:

- 1. The actor looks into the dwelling unit for the purpose of sexual arousal or gratification and with the intent to intrude upon or interfere with an individual's privacy.
  - 2. The actor looks into a part of the dwelling unit in which an individual is present.
  - 3. The individual has a reasonable expectation of privacy in that part of the dwelling unit.
  - 4. The individual does not consent to the actor looking into that part of the dwelling.

A similar provision applies to looking into parts of a dwelling where no one is present, but in which an individual would have a reasonable expectation of privacy.

Assembly Amendment 1 deletes the provision, described above, as it applies to looking into parts of a dwelling where no one is present, but in which an individual would have a reasonable expectation of privacy.

Assembly Amendment 1 was unanimously recommended for adoption by the Assembly Committee on Criminal Justice on June 11, 2003. The committee also voted unanimously to recommend passage of the bill, as amended.
