

WISCONSIN LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL AMENDMENT MEMO

2009 Assembly Bill 222

Assembly Amendments 1, 2, and 3

Current law sets the minimum age for hunting at 12 years of age. A person under the age of 12 may possess a firearm only if enrolled in a hunter's education class, is carrying the firearm to or from the class, cased, unloaded, and under the supervision of a parent or guardian, or is handling or operating the firearm during the class under supervision of the instructor.

Assembly Bill 222, among other things, creates an exception from the restriction on the possession and control of a firearm by a person under age 12 if he or she is engaged in target practice and is accompanied by a parent or guardian, or accompanied by a person who is age 18 or over and designated by the parent or guardian. **Assembly Amendment 1** specifies that "target practice" includes trap shooting or a similar sport shooting activity regardless of whether the activity involves shooting at a fixed or moving target.

Assembly Bill 222, among other things, creates a hunting mentorship program. One requirement under this program is that the mentor and the mentee may jointly have only one firearm, or if hunting with a crossbow, only one crossbow, in their possession or control while hunting. Assembly Amendment 2 adds the requirement that the mentor and mentee may jointly have only one bow in their possession or control while hunting.

Assembly Bill 222, if enacted, would take effect on the first day after the date of publication. **Assembly Amendment 3** provides that the bill, if enacted, would take effect on September 1, 2009.

Legislative History

Assembly Amendment 1 was offered by Representative Vruwink on May 8, 2009. On May 13, 2009, the Assembly Committee on Fish and Wildlife recommended adoption of Assembly Amendment 1 on a vote of Ayes, 10; Noes, 0.

Assembly Amendment 2 was offered by Representative Molepske Jr. on May 8, 2009. On May 13, 2009, the Assembly Committee on Fish and Wildlife recommended adoption of Assembly Amendment 2 on a vote of Ayes, 9; Noes, 1.

Assembly Amendment 3 was offered by the Assembly Committee on Fish and Wildlife on May 13, 2009. On the same date, the committee recommended adoption of Assembly Amendment 3 on a vote of Ayes, 9; Noes, 1.

On May 13, 2009, the Assembly Committee on Fish and Wildlife recommended passage of the bill, as amended, on a vote of Ayes, 10; Noes, 0.
