1995 ASSEMBLY BILL 42

January 26, 1995 – Introduced by Representatives Musser, Ladwig, Goetsch, Grothman, Silbaugh, Hahn, Dobyns, Ainsworth, Porter, Ziegelbauer, Schneiders, Kreibich, Wilder, Boyle, Freese, Gunderson, Otte, Albers, Morris-Tatum, Huebsch, Brandemuehl and Hasenohrl, cosponsored by Senators Zien, Moen and Breske. Referred to Committee on Children and Families.

AN ACT *to create* 946.71 of the statutes; **relating to:** giving false information to mandatory reporters of suspected child abuse or neglect and providing penalties.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Under current law, physicians, social workers, school teachers and other specified persons must report cases of suspected child abuse or neglect regarding a child seen in the course of professional duties. This bill prohibits a person from knowingly giving false information about child abuse or neglect to a person who is required to report child abuse or neglect. Upon conviction, violators may be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned for not more than 90 days or both.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

- **Section 1.** 946.71 of the statutes is created to read:
- 946.71 False information to person required to report about child
 abuse or neglect. (1) In this section:
- 7 (a) "Abuse" has the meaning given in s. 48.981 (1) (a).
- 8 (b) "Neglect" has the meaning given in s. 48.981 (1) (d).

SECTION 1

(2) Whoever knowingly gives false information concerning abuse or neglect to
a person who is required to report under s. 48.981 (2) is guilty of a Class B
misdemeanor.
