2	the Visually Handicapped and the impact that closing the Wisconsin School for
3	the Visually Handicapped would have on the lives of blind and visually
4	impaired persons.

## Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This joint resolution requests the joint legislative council to study and report to the legislature on the current mission of the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped and the impact that closing the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped would have on the the lives of blind and visually impaired persons.

- 5 Whereas, the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped is the oldest
- 6 public institution in the state; and
- Whereas, the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped has been
  continuously operating since its founding in 1849, serving thousands of Wisconsin
  children and adults who are blind or severely visually impaired and making a
  profoundly positive impact on their lives; and

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1	Whereas, the staff members of the Wisconsin School for the Visually
2	Handicapped have always willingly provided creative teaching skills, emotional
3	assistance for the students and their families and statewide leadership for all blind
4	and visually impaired children and adults; and
5	Whereas, the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped has been
6	nationally and internationally recognized for its successful pioneering of educational
7	programs; and
8	Whereas, the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped has received, on
9	behalf of the citizens of Wisconsin, the legislature and the department of public
10	instruction, numerous awards over the years for its innovative programming; and
11	Whereas, the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped has, for more than
12	70 years, provided the only state rehabilitative services for adults who have been
13	affected by the onset of severe loss of vision; and
14	Whereas, the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped continues to
15	provide a wide variety of critical activities for children and youth that they are not
16	able to receive in school district programs; and
17	Whereas, a recommendation has been made to close the Wisconsin School for
18	the Visually Handicapped; now, therefore, be it
19	<b>Resolved by the assembly, the senate concurring, That</b> the joint legislative
20	council study the current mission of the Wisconsin School for the Visually
21	Handicapped and the impact that closing that school would have on the lives of blind
22	and visually impaired citizens and report its findings, conclusions and
23	recommendations to the 1999 legislature when it convenes.
