# 2003 ASSEMBLY BILL 849

February 19, 2004 – Introduced by COMMITTEE ON CAMPAIGNS AND ELECTIONS. Referred to Committee on Campaigns and Elections.

1	AN ACT to repeal 5.77 (2) and 7.23 (1) (g); to renumber and amend 5.77 (1);
2	$\textit{to amend } 5.02 \ (1e), \ 5.02 \ (4m), \ 5.02 \ (24r), \ 5.40 \ (5), \ 5.51 \ (6), \ 5.53 \ (1), \ 5.62 \ (1) \ (a),$

### Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Currently, with limited exceptions, every municipality with a population of 7,500 or more must use voting machines or an electronic voting system at all primaries and other elections held in the municipality. Either mechanical or electronic voting machines may be used. No electronic voting system, including an electronic voting machine, may be used unless the system meets statutory standards and is approved by the State Elections Board for use at elections held in this state. All voting machines must be tested before each election to determine if they are functioning properly. If voting machines are used, ballots need not be printed and distributed to electors, but if electronic voting machines are used, the machines must

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maintain a cumulative tally of votes cast that is retrievable in the event of a power outage, evacuation or malfunction so that the record of the votes cast prior to the time that the problem occurs is preserved.

This bill discontinues the authorization for municipalities to use electronic voting machines at elections held in this state. Under the bill, if an electronic voting system is used, the system must be of a type in which printed ballots are distributed to electors.

#### The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

1	<b>SECTION 1.</b> 5.02 (1e) of the statutes is amended to read:
2	5.02 (1e) "Ballot" means a ballot label, sheet of paper or envelope on which
3	votes are recorded. The term also includes a sheet or card, filmstrip or other device
4	listing or containing information relative to offices, candidates and referenda which
5	is placed <del>, projected or composed</del> on the board <del>or screen</del> inside a voting machine.
6	<b>SECTION 2.</b> 5.02 (4m) of the statutes is amended to read:
7	5.02 (4m) "Electronic voting system" means a system in which votes are
8	recorded on ballots, and the votes are subsequently counted and tabulated by
9	automatic tabulating equipment. The term also includes a voting machine on which
10	votes are recorded and tabulated by electronic means.
11	<b>SECTION 3.</b> 5.02 (24r) of the statutes is amended to read:
12	5.02 (24r) "Voting machine" means a machine which serves in lieu of a voting
13	booth and which mechanically or electronically records the votes cast by electors,
14	who depress levers <del>or buttons</del> located next to the choices listed on a ballot to cast their
15	votes.
16	<b>SECTION 4.</b> 5.40 (5) of the statutes is amended to read:

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1	5.40 (5) A municipality which utilizes voting machines at a polling place shall
2	not utilize the machines to receive the vote of an elector who declares to the chief
3	inspector that, due to physical disability, the elector is unable to depress a <del>button or</del>
4	lever on a machine.
5	<b>SECTION 5.</b> 5.51 (6) of the statutes is amended to read:
6	5.51 (6) All candidates' names for the same office shall be placed, projected or
7	<del>composed</del> on the ballot in the same size, style and color of type. The style and size
8	of type shall conform substantially to the official ballot forms prescribed by the board
9	under s. 7.08 (1) (a).
10	<b>SECTION 6.</b> 5.53 (1) of the statutes is amended to read:
11	5.53 (1) Voting machine ballots shall be placed, projected or composed on a
12	board <del>or screen</del> inside the machine, under s. 5.64 and may be arranged in either
13	columns or rows. The type face shall be easy to read, and the type size may be no
14	smaller than 8 point.
15	<b>SECTION 7.</b> 5.62 (1) (a) of the statutes is amended to read:
16	5.62 (1) (a) At September primaries, the following ballot shall be provided for
17	the nomination of candidates of recognized political parties for national, state and
18	county offices and independent candidates for state office in each ward, in the same
19	form as prescribed by the board under s. 7.08 (1) (a), except as authorized in s. 5.655.
20	The ballots shall be made up of the several party tickets with each party entitled to
21	participate in the primary under par. (b) or sub. (2) having its own ballot, except as
22	authorized in s. 5.655. The independent candidates for state office other than district
23	attorney shall have a separate ballot for all such candidates as under s. 5.64 (1) (e),
24	except as authorized in s. 5.655. The ballots shall be secured together at the bottom.
25	The party ballot of the party receiving the most votes for president or governor at the

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last general election shall be on top with the other parties arranged in descending 1  $\mathbf{2}$ order based on their vote for president or governor at the last general election. The 3 ballots of parties qualifying under sub. (2) shall be placed after the parties qualifying 4 under par. (b), in the same order in which the parties filed petitions with the board. 5 Any ballot required under par. (b) 2. shall be placed next in order. The ballot listing 6 the independent candidates shall be placed at the bottom. At polling places where 7 voting machines are used, each party and the independent candidates shall be 8 represented in one or more separate columns or rows on the ballot. At polling places 9 where an electronic voting system is used other than an electronic voting machine, 10 each party and the independent candidates may be represented in separate columns 11 or rows on the ballot.

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**SECTION 8.** 5.66 (2) of the statutes is amended to read:

13 5.66 (2) The county clerk or board of election commissioners shall print a 14sufficient number of sample ballots. The municipal clerk or board of election 15commissioners shall print sample ballots whenever the municipality prepares ballots under s. 7.15 (2) (b) or (c). Sample ballots shall be printed on nonwhite colored 16 17paper and shall be overprinted "SAMPLE". Voting machine sample ballots shall be 18 a reduced size diagram of the face of the board or screen inside the voting machine 19 with all candidates, issues and voting instructions as they will appear on the official 20 ballot. Sample ballots to be used with an electronic voting system in which ballots 21that are distributed to electors are used shall be an actual size copy of the ballot. The 22clerk or board of election commissioners printing the ballots shall distribute the 23samples approximately as follows: 45% shall be kept in the clerk's or board's office  $\mathbf{24}$ and distributed to electors requesting them; 45% shall be sent to the municipalities, or, if the municipality prints ballots, 45% shall be sent to the county for distribution 25

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to the electors; and 10% shall be reserved to be sent to the polling places by
municipalities in proportion to the number certified in sub. (1) and made available
to electors at the polls on election day.

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**SECTION 9.** 5.76 of the statutes is amended to read:

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**5.76** Adoption, experimentation or discontinuance of systems. The governing body or board of election commissioners of any municipality may by

ordinance or resolution adopt, experiment with, or discontinue any electronic voting
system authorized by this subchapter and approved under s. 5.91 for use in this state,
and may purchase or lease materials or equipment for such system to be used in all
or some of the wards within its jurisdiction, either exclusively in combination with
mechanical voting machines, or in combination with paper ballots where such ballots
are authorized to be used.

13 **SECTION 10.** 5.77 (1) of the statutes is renumbered 5.77 and amended to read:

5.77 Applicable procedures. So far as applicable, the procedure provided
 for voting paper ballots applies when an electronic voting system employing the use
 of ballots distributed to electors is used.

17 **SECTION 11.** 5.77 (2) of the statutes is repealed.

18 **SECTION 12.** 5.78 of the statutes is amended to read:

5.78 Voting booths. At polling places where an electronic voting system
employing the use of ballots distributed to electors is used, the municipality shall
supply a sufficient number of voting booths for the use of electors as provided in s.
5.35 (2).

**SECTION 13.** 5.81 (1) and (3) of the statutes are amended to read:

5.81 (1) Whenever the statutes provide for the use of separate ballots or columns or rows for offices, parties or referenda, and an electronic voting system in

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which ballots are distributed to electors is used at a polling place, a single ballot may be used for all offices, referenda and parties. The ballot information, whether placed on the ballot or on the voting device, shall, as far as practicable, be grouped and ordered in the same manner as provided for other ballots under this chapter, except that the information on the ballot need not be in separate columns or rows.

6 (3) If a municipality utilizes an electronic voting system in which ballots 7 distributed to electors are employed, absentee ballots may consist of ballots utilized 8 with the system or paper ballots and envelopes voted in person in the office of the 9 municipal clerk or voted by mail.

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**SECTION 14.** 5.85 (2) and (5) of the statutes are amended to read:

11 5.85 (2) The election officials shall examine the ballots or record of votes cast 12for write-in votes and shall count and tabulate the write-in votes. When an 13electronic voting system is used which utilizes a ballot which is distributed to 14electors, before separating the remaining ballots from their respective covering 15envelopes, the election officials shall examine the ballots for write-in votes. When an elector has cast a write-in vote, the election officials shall compare the write-in 16 17vote with the votes on the ballot to determine whether the write-in vote results in an overvote for any office. In case of an overvote for any office, the election officials 18 19 shall make a true duplicate ballot of all votes on the ballot except for the office which 20is overvoted, by using an official ballot of that kind used by the elector who voted the 21original ballot, and one of the marking devices so as to transfer all votes of the elector 22except for the office overvoted, to an official ballot of that kind used in the ward at 23that election. Unless election officials are selected under s. 7.30 (4) (c) without regard  $\mathbf{24}$ to party affiliation, the election officials shall consist in each case of at least one election official of each of the 2 major political parties, whenever officials of both 25

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1 parties are present. Write-in votes shall be counted as provided in s. 7.50 (2) (d). The  $\mathbf{2}$ original ballot upon which there is an overvote shall be clearly labeled "Overvoted 3 Ballot" and the ballot so produced "Duplicate Overvoted Ballot", and each shall bear 4 the same serial number which shall be placed thereon by the election officials, commencing with number "1" and continuing consecutively for each of the ballots of  $\mathbf{5}$ 6 that kind in that ward or election district. The election officials shall initial the 7 "Duplicate Overvoted Ballot" ballots and shall place them in the container for return 8 of the ballots. The "Overvoted Ballot" ballots and their envelopes shall be placed in 9 the "Original Ballots" envelope. Ballots bearing write-in votes marked in the place 10 designated therefor and bearing the initials of an election official and not resulting 11 in an overvote and otherwise complying with the election laws as to marking shall 12be counted, tallied, and their votes recorded on a tally sheet provided by the 13 municipal clerk. Ballots and ballot envelopes shall be separated and all ballots 14except any which are defective or overvoted shall be placed separately in the 15container for return of the ballots, along with the ballots marked "Duplicate Overvoted Ballots". 16

17(5) If the municipality has designated a central counting location to be used to count ballots under s. 7.51 (1), the inspectors shall count and deposit the paper 18 19 ballots in the container. The inspectors shall then place the slip made out under sub. 20 (4) in the container. The inspectors shall also place the tally sheet recording the 21write-in votes and other votes cast on paper ballots, and all other ballots, or the 22record of the votes cast on an electronic voting system where no ballots are 23distributed to electors, in the container and shall thereupon immediately seal the 24container with an adhesive seal provided by the municipal clerk for the purpose in such manner that the seal completely covers the opening in the container, and each 25

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of the inspectors shall sign the seal. The "Defective Ballots" envelope, and "Original 1  $\mathbf{2}$ Ballots" envelope each shall be securely sealed and the flap or end thereof of each 3 signed by the inspectors and returned to the central counting location with the box for return of the ballots, enclosed ballots and returns. Thereupon, the municipal 4 5 clerk or 2 of the election officials shall forthwith and by the most direct route 6 transport the container and envelopes to the central counting location designated by 7 the municipal clerk. Unless election officials are selected under s. 7.30 (4) (c) without regard to party affiliation, the election officials shall consist in each case of at least 8 9 one election official of each of the 2 major political parties, whenever officials of both 10 parties are present.

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**SECTION 15.** 5.91 (6) of the statutes is amended to read:

12 5.91 (6) The voting device or machine permits an elector in a primary election 13 to vote for the candidates of the recognized political party or the independent 14 candidates of his or her choice, and the automatic tabulating equipment or machine 15 rejects any ballot on which votes are cast in the primary of more than one recognized 16 political party, except where a party or independent candidate designation is made 17 or where an elector casts write-in votes for candidates of more than one party on a 18 ballot that is distributed to the elector.

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**SECTION 16.** 5.91 (7) of the statutes is amended to read:

5.91 (7) It permits an elector to vote at an election for all persons and offices for whom and for which the elector is lawfully entitled to vote; to vote for as many persons for an office as the elector is entitled to vote for; to vote for or against any question upon which the elector is entitled to vote; and it rejects all choices recorded on a ballot for an office or a measure if the number of choices exceeds the number

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1	which an elector is entitled to vote for on such office or on such measure, except where
2	an elector casts excess write-in votes upon a ballot that is distributed to the elector.
3	<b>SECTION 17.</b> 5.91 (9) of the statutes is amended to read:
4	5.91 (9) It prevents an elector from voting for the same person more than once
5	for the same office, except where an elector casts excess write-in votes <del>upon a ballot</del>
6	that is distributed to the elector.
7	<b>SECTION 18.</b> 5.91 (15) of the statutes is created to read:
8	5.91 (15) It requires the use of an individual printed ballot that is distributed
9	to the elector.
10	<b>SECTION 19.</b> 5.94 of the statutes is amended to read:
11	5.94 Sample ballots; publication. When an electronic voting system
12	employing a ballot that is distributed to electors is used, the county and municipal
13	clerk of the county and municipality in which the polling place designated for use of
14	the system is located shall cause to be published, in the type B notices, a true
15	actual-size copy of the ballot containing the names of offices and candidates and
16	statements of measures to be voted on, as nearly as possible, in the form in which they
17	will appear on the official ballot on election day. The notice may be published as a
18	newspaper insert. Municipal clerks may post the notice if the remainder of the type
19	B notice is posted.
20	<b>SECTION 20.</b> 6.82 (2) (a) and (b) of the statutes are amended to read:
21	6.82 (2) (a) If an elector declares to the presiding election official that he or she
22	cannot read or write, or has difficulty in reading, writing or understanding English
23	or that due to disability is unable to mark a ballot or depress a <del>button or</del> lever on a
24	voting machine, the elector shall be informed by the officials that he or she may have
25	assistance. When assistance is requested, the elector may select any individual to

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assist in casting his or her vote. The selected individual rendering assistance may 1  $\mathbf{2}$ not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a 3 labor organization which represents the elector. The selected individual shall certify on the back of the ballot that it was marked with his or her assistance. Where voting 4 5 machines are used, certification shall be made on the registration list. 6 (b) The individual chosen shall enter the voting booth or machine with the 7 elector and shall read the names of all candidates on the ballot for each office, and ask, "For which one do you vote?". The ballot shall be marked or the lever or button 8 9 depressed according to the elector's expressed preference. The individual selected 10 to assist may not disclose to anyone how the elector voted. 11 **SECTION 21.** 6.82 (3) of the statutes is amended to read: 6.82 (3) USE OF PAPER BALLOTS. Whenever, in a municipality in which voting 1213machines are used, an elector declares to the chief inspector that, due to physical 14 disability, the elector is unable to depress a button or lever on a voting machine, the 15inspectors shall permit the elector to vote using a paper ballot and voting booth. 16 **SECTION 22.** 7.15 (3) (a) of the statutes is amended to read: 177.15 (3) (a) Where voting machines are used or where electronic voting systems 18 are employed, the municipal clerk shall provide at least 2 duplicate sample ballots 19 for each ward in diagram form showing the board or screen inside each voting 20machine or the front of each ballot as it will appear in the voting machines or booths

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21 on election day.

22 **SECTION 23.** 7.23 (1) (f) of the statutes is amended to read:

7.23 (1) (f) Except as authorized in pars. (b) and (g) par. (b), ballots, applications
for absentee ballots, registration forms, or other records and papers requisite to

voting at any federal election, other than registration cards, may be destroyed after
22 months.

3 SECTION 24. 7.23 (1) (g) of the statutes is repealed.

4 **SECTION 25.** 7.37 (4) of the statutes is amended to read:

5 7.37 (4) BALLOTING PROCEDURE. At polling places which utilize paper ballots or 6 electronic voting systems in which ballots are distributed to electors, 2 inspectors 7 shall be assigned to take charge of the official ballots. They shall write their initials 8 on the back of each ballot and deliver to each elector as he or she enters the voting 9 booth one ballot properly endorsed by each of them. Where paper ballots are used, 10 the inspectors shall fold each ballot in the proper manner to be deposited before 11 delivering it to the elector. If asked, inspectors may instruct any elector as to the 12proper manner of marking the ballot, but they may not give advice, suggestions, 13 express any preferences or make any requests as to the person for whom, the 14question on which or the ballot on which the elector shall vote.

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**SECTION 26.** 7.51 (6) of the statutes is amended to read:

16 7.51 (6) ELECTRONIC VOTING SYSTEMS. The procedure for canvassing of votes cast 17 at polling places utilizing an electronic voting system in which ballots are distributed 18 to electors shall follow the procedure for canvassing paper ballots insofar as 19 applicable, and the procedure for canvassing of votes cast at polling places utilizing 20 an electronic voting machine shall follow the procedure for canvassing of mechanical 21 voting machines insofar as applicable, except as otherwise provided in ss. 5.85 to 22 5.89.

SECTION 27. 9.01 (1) (b) 6., 8. and 10. of the statutes are amended to read:
9.01 (1) (b) 6. In recounting the votes cast on a voting machine in which the
record of the votes cast is contained in the machine, the board of canvassers shall

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make a record of the number of the seal, if any, the number of the protective counter or other device, if one is provided, and shall open the recording compartment of the machine, and without unlocking the machine against voting, shall recount the votes thereon. If the machine is an electronic voting machine utilizing a detachable record of votes cast, the record shall be retabulated under s. 5.90.

6 8. If upon the recount it is found that the original canvass of the returns has 7 been correctly made from a voting machine and that a discrepancy still remains 8 unaccounted for, the board of canvassers shall publicly unlock the voting and 9 counting mechanism of the machine, and shall proceed to examine and test the 10 machine to determine the cause of the discrepancy in returns from the machine. A 11 similar test shall be performed for electronic voting machines to ascertain whether 12there is any malfunction in the machine. 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**SECTION 28.** 10.01 (2) (b) of the statutes is amended to read:

10.01 (2) (b) Type B—The type B notice shall include the relevant facsimile
ballots and the relevant portions of voting instructions to electors under s. 10.02 for
each office or referendum and shall specify the date of the election. In counties or
municipalities where an electronic voting system in which ballots are distributed to

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1 electors is used, the notice shall include the information specified in s. 5.94. The type 2 B notice shall be published once by the county clerks, and for primaries and other 3 elections in municipalities or special purpose districts, once by the clerk of the 4 municipality or special purpose district on the day preceding each primary and other 5 election.

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**SECTION 29.** 10.02 (3) (b) 1., 2., 2m., 3. and 4. of the statutes are amended to 7 read:

8 10.02 (3) (b) 1. If an elector wishes to vote for all candidates nominated by any 9 party, the elector shall make a cross ( $\boldsymbol{X}$ ) or depress the lever or button next to the 10 party designation shown at the top of the ballot. Unless a name has been erased or crossed out, another name written in, a cross made next to the name of a candidate 11 for the same office in another column or a sticker applied, a cross next to a party 1213 designation at the top of the column is a vote for all the party's candidates listed in 14the column. If an elector does not wish to vote for all the candidates nominated by 15one party, the elector shall make a cross ( $\boldsymbol{X}$ ) next to or separately depress the levers 16 or buttons next to each candidate's name for whom he or she intends to vote, or shall 17insert or write in the name of a candidate.

2. At a special partial primary, the elector shall select the party ballot of his 18 19 or her choice and shall make a cross (X) next to or depress the lever or button next 20 to the candidate's name for each office for whom the elector intends to vote, or shall 21insert or write in the name of the elector's choice for a candidate.

222m. At the September primary, the elector shall select the party ballot of his 23or her choice or the ballot containing the names of the independent candidates for 24state office, and make a cross ( $\boldsymbol{X}$ ) next to or depress the lever or button next to the candidate's name for each office for whom the elector intends to vote or insert or write 25

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in the name of the elector's choice for a party candidate, if any. In order to qualify
for participation in the Wisconsin election campaign fund, a candidate for state office
at the September primary, other than a candidate for district attorney, must receive
at least 6% of all votes cast on all ballots for the office for which he or she is a
candidate, in addition to other requirements.

3. When casting a presidential preference vote, the elector shall select the party
ballot of his or her choice and make a cross (X) next to or depress the button or lever
next to the candidate's name for whom he or she intends to vote or shall, in the
alternative, make a cross (X) next to or depress the button or lever next to the words
"Uninstructed delegation", or shall write in the name of his or her choice for a
candidate.

4. At a nonpartisan primary, the elector shall make a cross (X) next to or
depress the button or lever next to the candidate's name for each office for whom he
or she intends to vote, or insert or write in the name of his or her choice for a
candidate.

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**SECTION 30.** 10.02 (3) (c) and (d) of the statutes are amended to read:

17 10.02 (3) (c) In presidential elections, unless the elector wishes to vote for all 18 candidates nominated by any party, the elector shall make a cross (X) next to or 19 depress the button or lever next to the set of candidates for president and vice 20 president for whom he or she intends to vote. A vote for candidates for president and 21 vice president is a vote for the presidential electors of those candidates.

(d) On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross (X) next to or depress
the button or lever next to the answer which he or she intends to give.

24 **SECTION 31.** 10.06 (3) (e) of the statutes is amended to read:

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1	10.06 (3) (e) When electronic or mechanical voting machines or electronic
2	voting systems <del>in which ballots are distributed to electors</del> are used in a municipality
3	at a municipal election, the municipal clerk shall publish a type B notice on the
4	Monday before the election. The notice shall include all offices and questions to be
5	voted on at the election. The cost of this notice shall be shared under s. 5.68 $\left(2\right)$ and
6	(3).
7	<b>SECTION 32.</b> 12.13 (3) (j) of the statutes is amended to read:
8	12.13 (3) (j) When called upon to assist an elector who cannot read or write, has
9	difficulty in reading, writing or understanding English, or is unable to mark a ballot
10	or depress a lever <del>or button</del> on a voting machine, inform the elector that a ballot
11	contains names or words different than are printed or displayed on the ballot with
12	the intent of inducing the elector to vote contrary to his or her inclination,
13	intentionally fail to cast a vote in accordance with the elector's instructions or reveal
14	the elector's vote to any 3rd person.
