Good morning committee members. Thank you for hearing my testimony on Assembly Bill 555.

AB 555 was originally introduced as a law revision bill, to clarify a provision that was placed in the 2013-14 budget. The intention of the budget provision was to expand the opportunity for home schooled children to attend up to two classes at the K-8 grade level in a public school. Under prior law this opportunity was only afforded to students at the high school level.

Unfortunately, the way in which the provision was written in the budget and incorporated into the statutes left a certain amount of ambiguity and led to the possibility the provision could be misinterpreted. So AB 555 makes no substantive change to current law, only clarifies it. This is one of the criteria for a bill to be introduced as a law revision bill.

At the public hearing in Law Revision a representative from DPI testified that the Department is already using the statute as intended, in other words affording home schooled children at the K-8 level the opportunity to attend up to two classes in public schools, and did not object in any way to the budget provision.

The policy of the Law Revision Committee is to require a unanimous vote for approval of bills. One member of the committee objected to AB 555. Therefore, I am reintroducing the bill. I want to reiterate that this bill makes no changes to current law, only provides clarity. I would appreciate your support, look forward to your questions and will be glad to answer any questions.
